"Rotary Clubs all over the world work with communities to enhance economic and community development. Every community has different needs and different opportunities to serve." The "publication is intended to help you ask the right questions, identify real needs, and make the greatest possible impact with the time, energy, and resources you have at your disposal." It is well worth reviewing. While some of the material is obviously global in nature, there is a significant amount of ideas you can use locally.

As Sandy and I visit Clubs, both large and small, we note vacant and boarded up buildings. In addition, many Clubs have commented that their size has dwindled as the community has lost businesses. Working to improve local employment opportunities can have a favorable impact on both our communities and our Clubs.

Economic and Community Development overlaps with many of the things Rotary Clubs do every day including improving literacy and community health. Each Rotary Club needs to evaluate local needs and then take action.

LEADERSHIP IS NOT AN EVENT, IT IS A LIFESTYLE

On Sunday September 25, the second set of REGL students graduated to the applause of their parents. Over the weekend the students completed an eye-opening series of exercises designed to help them understand the impact their actions can have on the world around them.

The key concept is that Leadership is not an event, it is a lifestyle. You can replace the word "leadership" with such terms as "respect", "honesty" and "integrity."



With their parents watching, each student individually stood up and stated to everyone how they would "push their opportunity button" upon returning home and to school. Many of the statements were quite profound and moving.


Calling all RYLA Chairs

How to Prepare for an Open World Project: Lessons Learned

One of the finest international projects a U.S. Rotary club can participate in without having to travel is to host a delegation in the Open World program, sponsored by the U.S. Congress.

Open World helps promote U.S. diplomatic, trade, political, security and cultural interests by providing opportunities for delegates from the former Soviet satellite countries to learn directly about what Americans do in the areas of business, environmental protection, education, democratic form of government, and entrepreneurship.

Our Nevada City Rotary club hosted the first delegation ever from Kazakhstan with Rotary International in September 2015. It was a very rewarding experience, but it required extensive preparation, some of which we had to learn on our own. Luckily, we started organizing six months ahead.

Here are some lessons learned that guided our program to very enjoyable success.

1. Don't start "cold"

Ask Rotary International for names of other Rotary clubs who've received delegations from the same country and contact them to ask for tips on preparing for an Open World program. The Longmont, Colorado Rotary Club highly recommended having a schedule of planning activities with persons responsible and due dates for each task. It was an invaluable tool for organizing and tracking our preparation. We also found that having a program schedule for the delegation and interpreter, and another schedule for volunteers with pick-up points and times for drivers was all invaluable.

Contact clubs in your geographical area for places to visit that appeal to the delegates

Our fellow Nevada City 49er club had hosted two delegations when we approached them, and they recommended taking our Kazakh delegates to San Francisco and Lake Tahoe, or a club meeting with the Truckee club. We created a tour of SF, only to discover that all the delegates really wanted was to go to the beach! They had never seen the Pacific Ocean and some had never seen any ocean.

3. Plan activities to make your program visible to your local community

First, we held a social event at the historic National Hotel with refreshments. The Kazakh delegates each gave presentations describing their lives, careers and facts about their country. The 85+ guests included District Governor Gail Ellingwood, Rotarians from four other clubs, friends, and the general public.

Second, we hosted a radio talk show with listener calls. The DJ interviewed the delegates and Rotary organizers. These two activities generated media coverage and local recognition of Rotary International.

4. Pre-departure: Communicate with your

Cultural Facilitator using video.

A few of our organizers had a wonderful conversation on Skype with our Cultural Facilitator to exchange questions and find out the delegates' specific interests. It was the start of building a relationship with her, and we are still in touch today.

One year later, we re-connect with our delegates and reminisce fondly over our experience of being "citizen diplomats". When our club decides to host another Open World delegation, our "lessons learned" will ease the preparation.

THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES By

I have attended Rotary functions and club meetings where the person leading the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States started by saying "Everyone please join me in the Pledge..." or "Rotarians and guests, the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag". As proud citizens of the United States of America, we show our respect for our flag, and our support for our elected government by reciting the Pledge.

However, we must remember that we are Rotary **International**. And because we are an **International** organization, we may have visitors present (or even club members) who are not citizens of the United States of America, but are proud citizens of their country. At some of the Rotary meetings and functions that I have attended there have been Rotarians visiting from Belgium, Brazil, Canada and India, and inbound Rotary Youth Exchange students.

When we introduce the Pledge with a statement as in the examples above, we are forgetting that our foreign guests should not be asked to join us in the Pledge. (After all, when we are visiting a foreign nation, we are not expected to express loyalty to their government/nation.) Therefore, when we introduce the Pledge, we need to use words that invite citizens of the United States of America to Pledge. Examples of such introductions are: "My fellow Americans, please join me in the Pledge to our flag..." or "Will all citizens of this great nation join me in the Pledge..."
