This is my third season volunteering at the North Star Mine Powerhouse Museum and I am constantly amazed at some of the volunteers that help us out.

I noticed some of our outdoor exhibits have small plaques with a Rotary Club insignia. Asking the other docents, I was told the plaques are from projects donated by the Rotary Club of Grass Valley. As time went on the men and women of the Rotary Club showed up and painted, landscaped, and made a new enclosure for the Pelton Wheel on the Cornish Pump. Rotarians installed a new handrail along the back driveway and made concrete pedestals to display our sheave wheels.



Through research I discovered that our relationship with the Rotary Club started when

the museum was formed in the late 60's. Rotarians and Museum Director Glenn Jones were instrumental in organizing the rebuilding of the powerhouse and starting the museum. One example of their service is when 30 Rotarians installed a roof on the recently rebuilt building. With Rotary Club support, mining equipment was moved into the powerhouse and turned into exhibits.

Throughout the years Rotarians continued to improve and maintain our museum with projects like painting our outdoor exhibits, building a display for our man skip, and more. Hats off to the Rotary Club of Grass Valley, thanks for your service.

Area 8

The eight Area 8 Rotary Clubs have been quite busy this Rotary Year and have many plans. As an area, we have several interesting projects including:

1. Achievement Beyond Obstacles (ABO) – This scholarship program helps high school seniors that are graduating from high school who have had very difficult lives, succeed at the next level of education. Currently, a team of Rotarians are working with high school counselors to select the students for 2019-20 and prepare them for the Leadership Weekend in November with Dean and Rochelle Whellams (of RYLA and REGL fame). There are several other events to help prepare the students for college after Jan 1, 2020. (Reno South, Reno, Sparks and Reno Central)

2. Eddy House – Is a Drop-in Center for at risk and homeless youth that meets basic needs and connects the youth with appropriate support organizations. Eddy House is transitioning from a 1500 sq ft facility open 40 hours a week to a 16,000 sq ft facility operating 24/7. Clubs are assisting and adding some of the furnishings for the new facility. We will also be looking for additional ways to assist. (Reno Sunrise, Sparks and Reno Sunset, Sparks Centennial Sunrise)
3. Bridges Out of Poverty – Rotary is now partnering with Opportunity Alliance and several other Washoe County organizations to teach those in poverty the skills necessary to get out of poverty. Many Rotarians in Area 8 volunteer to make Bridges a successful program. Most Rotary Clubs in Area 8 have contributed to Bridges and this year Reno South and Reno Central are financially supporting the program.
4. KNPB Young Writers Contest – Area 8 is again supporting the Young Writers Contest which will take place in the Spring 2020. This program encourages kids in grades K to 3 to write a story which will be judged, and the winners will be included in a book. (Reno, Reno Central, Sparks Centennial Sunrise)
5. Rotary Means Business is a networking/social event sponsored by a Rotary Club where they meet at a member's business to learn more about the business and get to know Rotarians from other clubs. July event was held at Eddy House sponsored by Reno Centennial Sunset. The September event was at Scotty's Transmission & RPM Automotive Sponsored by Sparks RC.
6. Sparks Centennial Sunrise and Sparks are teaming up with the City of Sparks to replace and improve and all access playground at the Sparks Marina.
7. Reno Rotary is holding a Halloween Party on Oct 26. Admission is open to all Rotarians and guests. See the poster on page 9.

Life After Vocation

A Retirement Snapshot

Vocational Service, the second Object of Rotary, encourages Rotarians to support each other in our business and professional lives. Today this has become a way of life for Rotarians, offering support to each other both during the development of a new business and one that has been successful for many years. We don’t always take time to celebrate long-time successes. In this edition of the newsletter we are going to do just that: celebrate the successful business, Pioneer Auto Body, owned and operated by Past District Governor Alan and Jeanne Cain. Alan is also the Rotary guru of Alturas Rotary, never failing to answer tricky questions and offer honest, clear answers. In Alan’s words:

Pioneer Auto Body came into being on April Fool’s Day, 1982. Originally conceived as a partnership between my dad and myself, we elected to incorporate the business in 1989, primarily to avoid the estimated quarterly income tax payments, which always came due when we were low on funds.

Over the years the business experienced highs and lows, but over the course of 37 years it always grew in sales a little each year. Challenges always lurked in the shadows, mostly in the form of cash flow and, more recently, overbearing governmental regulations, taxes and fees, and mandatory insurance requirements. Sorry to say, but the climate for small businesses in California is not a friendly one.

Looking on the bright side, we have so much to be grateful for. We’ve had employees stay with us for 35 years, 30 years, and several others in excess of 12 years. Our greatest rewards come from the relationships and friendships that we have developed with our customers. Back in 1982 we created the motto, “Pioneer’s in Craftsmanship and Service”, and this led us all these years. Quality work in a timely and friendly manner is the value that customers seek, and keeps them coming back. Not to brag, but we were following Rotary’s Four Way Test long before we knew it existed. The value of this standard is crystal clear to me as a result.

Looking ahead, I feel that I’ll always want to be busy. Travel, family, service, and relationships, with the latter being the most important. Looking in the rear view mirror...these last 37 years seem to have been in the blink of an eye. Time does truly fly when you’re having fun.

October RYE Corner

As we look at our world today, too often you might think that we are in trouble if we don't make changes. But then there's always room for improvement and things will take care of themselves, right? So who will be there to usher in these needed changes? Who will make the world better? Who can we count on?

After being involved with Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) for about nine years, I see who that will be: the Youth of today. But then we don't see that universally – it is those of us working with those motivated high school students who take the leap of faith and courage to go on exchange -- even though it is a total unknown with much to face before they can even drink or in some cases vote.

If we don't consider our future and its caretakers, we cannot expect our children and grandchildren to live a life of hope, happiness and satisfaction. There are many public programs that are designed to educate and expand awareness for our children, but not everyone can take part or access those programs. Rotary's Youth Exchange program for students leaving the U.S. for another country and those coming in from other countries is a real adult-builder. The adventure of being abroad, somewhat on their own, gives RYE students the opportunity to face challenges that will strengthen and enlighten them to a future where they can make a difference. The changes we see in returning outbound students, and the change we see in the students that come to the U.S. and stay for the year, are astounding. Not only are they more aware of their surroundings and their impact on the world but they are charged up with energy to go out into the world and *make a difference!*

It is now the time to cast about and locate students between the ages of 15 and 18-1/2 years old who are attracted to the idea of going to another country for a year away from home. These kids are out there but, for the most part, they don't know about our Rotary Youth Exchange program. A club only needs to inform its members who probably know of students eligible for RYE in their community. It could be your hairdresser's son or your insurance agent's girl. You could be standing in the grocery store next to a young person who looks to be the right age: ask them if they have ever thought of going to school abroad for the next year. If we don't ask or inform, the program goes unused by the very people who are going to be our leaders in the world. And those students who would be interested in a future filled with success are the ones who need the benefits that extended travel and full immersion in another culture brings.

Youth Services in every District 5190 club, now is the time to:

1. Announce to your members that now is the time to let the high school students in your community know about our year-long exchange program.
2. Take a trip to your local high school and talk to the administration about announcing that Outbound preliminary applications are being accepted *now*.
3. Have your student candidate go to: www.districtrye.org. From the Downloads & Forms menu, the student needs to download the preliminary application form and follow the instructions for mailing the completed form to Jon Greene. The student will also provide your club with a copy of the application. Once you have received the preliminary applications from your potential outbound candidates, schedule an interview to select your candidate.
4. Select your first candidate and, if you have more than one student who is interested, let Jon Greene know that you have an alternate(s) as well as a selected candidate and, if there are clubs participating in RYE who do not have a candidate, the alternates may still have an opportunity to go out on exchange.

And that will take care of your initial outbound duties. All students selected as candidates or alternates will attend an Outbound Briefing, which explains the program and helps the family make the decision to participate or not. If the family does decide to go further and let their student to be in the program, they will complete a full application and attend the interview/selection meetings the weekend of December 6-7, 2019. If the student is selected as an outbound, they will have 6 months of focused training and orientations to prepare them for their new journey.

And you, Rotary Club of -----, will have helped choose the future leaders of our country (world).

RYLA Grads Off to West Africa

Coincidences means you are on the right path

Three Churchill County High School graduates who will not be attending this week's Homecoming celebrations are Madellynn Christie, Erik Endacott and Blane Merkley. On Monday afternoon they arrived in Dakar, Senegal, to begin a 27-month adventure as Peace Corps Volunteers. Following high school graduation, each student took a different path. Erik Endacott (CCHS 2014) pursued an Agronomy degree from Iowa State in Ames. Madellynn Christie, CCHS Class of 2015 valedictorian, earned a degree in Environmental Science at University of California, Los Angeles, while Blane Merkley studied AG Science with the Wolfpack at University of Nevada, Reno. Unbeknownst to each other, they individually applied and were accepted for Peace Corps service in the Republic of Senegal, West Africa.

If that is not enough of a coincidence, all three of these international service minded volunteers were sponsored by the Rotary Club of Fallon to attend and complete Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA). For those that may not be familiar, RYLA is a highly selective and intensive weeklong leadership experience organized by Rotary clubs and districts where high school students develop leadership skills, make connections and learn to live a life of "service above self."

Both Endacott and Merkley will be serving as agriculture extension agents. Christie's assignment is in Agroforestry. They will spend the next few months in pre-service training where they will receive detailed instruction on language, cross-cultural adaptation, technical skills and maintaining their health and safety during their two years of service. Upon completion of training, they will be sworn in as committed Peace Corps Volunteers and will begin working in their assigned regions. Blane, Erik and Maddie most likely will be living and serving in communities without electricity and running water. If all goes as planned, they will complete their service and return home in late November 2021.

Kennedy established the Peace Corps in 1961, more than 235,000 Americans have served in 141 countries worldwide. Nevada has 35 residents currently serving as Peace Corps volunteers.

The month of August gave us a second month of overall, district-wide membership growth!

Congratulations to the 23 clubs that inducted new members and showed net membership gains for the month. Leading the way with double-digit growth was the *Truckee Sunrise Club* with 14% gain, adding a net of 2 members. Truckee Sunrise is almost 50% larger than it was on July 1, 2018 with a current total of 16 active members.

Also seeing double-digit growth is the *Sierra Passport Club* (with 13% growth in the first two months of the Rotary year!) and *Pollock Pines-Camino* (with 11% net growth!). *Penn Valley* has just reached 40 members for the first time, and *Reno*, our largest club, stands at 151 members. *Sparks* and *Auburn* both have 102 members and are tied for the second-largest club honors.

A total of 12 clubs have had membership declines over the first two months of the year, mostly down just 1 or 2 members with plenty of time to show growth in the next few months.
