Polio News

August 21, 2019 marked three years since Nigeria last reported a case of wild poliovirus. This is an important public health milestone for the country and the entire Africa Region, which is now a step now closer to polio-free certification.

However, despite progress, there is still much left to be done. Continued work to reach every last child with the polio vaccine, as well as strengthening surveillance and routine immunization across the region, will be key to keeping wild polio at bay and protecting the gains achieved.

Should there be no more cases in Nigeria or from countries in the Africa Region, and surveillance data submitted by countries meets evaluation criteria, the Africa Regional Certification Committee (ARCC) could certify the Region as wild polio-free as early as mid-2020.

September RYE Corner

As we move into the new Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) year, so much has already happened. Our 2018-2019 outbound students have returned from their year-long experience, healthy and much more in-tune with the world around them. If your club sponsored an outbound RYE student, make sure you bring them into your club to share their experience with you. This presentation alone will inspire you to encourage more and more high school students to consider this program.

The District 5190 RYE Committee held the Rebound (conversion of the outbound label to the now rebound label for returning students) meeting on August 3, 2019. Our ROTEX group (past Rotary Outbound exchange students) are fully incorporated in this meeting. The ROTEX students are most familiar with the feelings being experienced by a recent rebound. ROTEX is a valuable asset to our RYE program and each year the group grows as our rebounds want to participate with the new and past outbound students.

Our next meeting was held on the weekend of August 23 – August 25, 2019 in Minden, Nevada. To watch these newly-arrived students find their way in a new and making new exchange friends with whom to share that newness is so much fun. For most areas, school has started and the inbounds are finding out how to “fit” into their new lives with their first host family and how to make friends with their *different* schoolmates.

Our agenda is one that not only introduces the students to each other and the District RYE Committee members but also lays out the *rules* they are expected to follow. Our three main goals are: 1) that each student is safe and secure while here in the U.S.; 2) that each student experiences the U.S. in a way that ends up with a successful exchange; and 3) that we protect our program from rules infringements which would jeopardize District 5190 from

continuing this valuable youth program. We urge them to try new things, to explore areas they might not have thought about, but to do all with common sense, respect, and an eye to the program rules. The rules are not overwhelming or very restrictive – but then, these *are* teenagers.

So as we have welcomed back out outbounds (now rebounds) from last year and our new inbounds for this year, we are also ready to begin the application and selection process for outbound students for the 2020-2021 Rotary/RYE year. Not to be repetitive, but to *remind* District 5190 Rotary clubs of what needs to be done at this time of our RYE year in order to find Outbound RYE students.

We are looking for high school students with a spirit of adventure. Outbound RYE Preliminary Applications for high school students between the ages of 15 ½ and 18 ½ years old when they leave on their exchange will be available very soon.

District 5190 RYE would like to send out 24 to 30 young students for 10 to 11 months to be educated and explore the culture in their host country in our 2020-2021 exchange year. This is a priceless opportunity to live in Europe, Eastern Europe, Asia, South America or Mexico and gain the confidence that living

abroad under the safe umbrella that Rotary will provide. The education of living abroad far exceeds what a young student can learn in a standard high school program.

At our Exchange Briefing Orientation for parents and students (October 19, 2019 to be held Carson City) we explain the program, parent responsibilities and clarification of student expectations. In the meantime, Preliminary Applications are available at www.rye5190.org from the [Downloads & Forms](#) tab (download the Preliminary Long-Term Application). This form will give us background on the family and information on the potential outbound student. In this application there is a section to identify which Rotary Club in District 5190 will sponsor the student. If the student does not have an association with a club, contact RYE Executive Secretary Jon S Greene (ryeexecsec@rye5190.org) for information on how to submit the application. The instructions are specific and clear and will let us know more about student expectations and whether this is a realistic program for them at this time. Remember, this Briefing is designed to answer all the basic questions that help a family determine whether RYE is appropriate for the family.

After the Briefing, the family is better able to decide whether or not the student will continue with the Long-Term Application. The District RYE Committee will schedule one-hour interview times with each applicant and their parents the weekend of December 6 – 8, 2019. Both parents and students will be interviewed and selection of the final group of outbound RYE students will be announced in January 2020.

Our clubs generally associate themselves with schools in their communities, providing Youth Services support through our many programs. RYE is a program that takes some planning and effort, but the outcome is more than worth the effort. Connect with your high schools, talking to the language teachers, career counselors or even giving a presentation to the school. Make sure you have a presence at the PTA meetings and in the school newsletters. Remember, in order to make this program available to potential outbounds, they have to know the opportunity even exists.

Watching our inbound students making their impact on our schools, our communities and our clubs is astounding. When your club sponsors and outbound and an inbound student, you will see the miraculous growth in these students. This makes it *all* worthwhile. Get involved with RYE – you won't be disappointed.

Short Term Youth Exchange

Open for application submission

District 5190 Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) committee offers another Youth Exchange opportunity for High School students called Short Term Exchange (STE). It is a family to family exchange that takes place typically during the summer, lasting anywhere from 3 to 6 weeks.

Students and families go through a similar application process as the Long Term Exchange. The application cost is \$500 plus airfare and travel expenses. One student travels to the foreign country first, staying with the family and then the two students travel back to the other family for the rest of the exchange time. Dates and length of the exchange are arranged through the two families. Our STE exchange coordinators, Risa Lange for Nevada District 5190 students, and Lindy Beatie for California District 5190 students, work with the Rotary District in the host country to find a family, and secure the needed paperwork.

During the summer of 2019, four students took advantage of this experience. Eden, hosted by the Rotary Club of Auburn, traveled to Poland to visit with the family of Zuzanna. Here are just a few reflections of her visit: “Over the course of my stay in Poland, I was able to see the majority of the country, and visit most of the major cities. Kielce, the city where my hosts live, is a midpoint between Warsaw and Kraków, and is about the size of Reno. Almost every day in Kielce, me and Zuzanna would walk around the city and go to restaurants or the shopping center. My hosts had also planned many trips to allow me to see almost all of Poland. the week before Zuzanna and I headed back to California was spent on the seaside in Gdynia, where we attended Open'er Festival, the largest music festival in Poland, which featured many American artists, as well as Polish ones.

In the early hours of the morning of July 8, I bid a rather tearful farewell to my host parents, and Zuzanna and I boarded a flight to Amsterdam to connect to one to Los Angeles, then onto San Francisco. I am incredibly grateful for this opportunity that Rotary provided for me to travel to Poland, to experience a new culture and country, and to forge lifelong friendships with my hosts and others who I met there. I feel as though this trip has helped me on my path to my future career goal of becoming a Foreign Service officer in Eastern Europe, and has also helped me expand my worldview and grow as a person, and as a citizen. So, to Rotary Districts 5190 and 2231, thank you, from the bottom of my heart, for this incredible opportunity, and for the best summer of my life.”

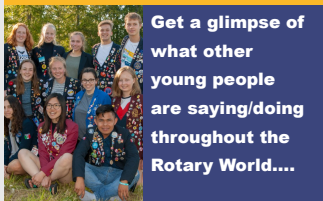

Fostering World Peace and Understanding Through Youth Exchanges

Rotary's Short-Term Exchange Program presents opportunities for students to advance their knowledge by allowing them to visit a different country for a limited period of time. Participating students live with a matched host family in their selected country under the sponsorship of a local Rotary Club.



WHAT IS STE?

- This is a family-to-family exchange
- Students must be in 10th, 11th, or 12th grade when applying
- The exchange in each country is for an equal amount of time. During this period, the student must not have a job or commitments that would interfere with the obligations of hosting. You go live with the student and their family for 3-6 weeks...then you both travel back to the USA and your family hosts the student in your home (or vice versa)
- Cost of travel, Rotary District fees, Rotary insurance, clothing and personal expenses are the responsibility of the participating students and their families.
