## Foundation Update - Halfway through the Rotary Year 2015-16

#### District Giving as of Dec. 24, 2015

- D5190 per capita is \$85.37 (#24 worldwide)
- Top three per capita clubs are Tahoe Douglas (\$428), Sparks Centennial Sunrise (\$311) and Greenville (\$288).
- 1,013 members or 40% of the District are Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) and Alturas Rotary is an EREY Club as of now.
- 718 of 2500 or 29% of the District are Sustaining Members giving \$100 or more
- Polio Plus: \$43,500 or 56% of our goal.

## District Service Grants were allocated at \$102,770 for this year. As of now:

- Approved \$64,100
- Available \$32.020
- Pending \$6,650

Reminder: for a club to participate in District Grants (Service or Scholarships); the club must be Qualified with the President, President-Elect, and one other. Attending the Grants Management Training (GMT) every three years will help you club qualify and be eligible to apply for grants. There will be two opportunities to attend GMT in the next 6 months. The dates are February 5th and April 8th.

### Other Foundation related dates to remember are:

- March 31st All DSGs and District Scholarships must be closed
- April 15th Applications must be to the Scholarship Committee for District Scholarships
- April 30th Presidents-Elects Club Spending Plan to the District Foundation Chair
