The organization was voted into existence in 1944. They are involved in anything that affects air, land, and/or water in Nevada County. Resource conservation districts were established

primarily after the 'Dust bowl' of the "Dirty Thirties" where preventing erosion became a primary concern that needed to be addressed. This includes land, forest, animals, habitat, etc. Their funding is based on "Land Value" not anything that exists on the property.

What does the NCRS do? Conserve land, prevent erosion, focusing on natural resource conservation. Recently collected \$1.2 million in funds for Nevada City projects. Size, length, and effectiveness of a project will determine

Latest project(s): In stage of having MOU to work at Condon

park. Removing nonnative plants, hazardous trees that are in the area. Plans to put in pathways for people to enjoy. Replanting of native plants to help bring land back to a more natural state.

Erosion control project with Alta Sierra school. Gave people from NRCS what to do to install erosion control methods.

BEST QUOTE: "We are not landscapers. We are a resource conservation office!"

INTERESTING FACT: The Federal Government no longer allows people to have collections of "stuffed birds". NCRS is now working together with the Audubon Society to house many such birds that can no longer be owned privately.

NASTY PLANTS OF NOTE:

BLACKBERRIES- Believe it or not, we have a native blackberries in Nevada County. However, these indigenous plants have no thorns at all and can be recognized by the very small berries they produce. The blackberries we have come to know and HATE in Nevada County are the Himalayan blackberry species. These nasty noxious nightmares are non-native (how's that for alliteration) and a fire hazard.

STAR THISTLE- poisonous plant. Has been here forever and not going anywhere! Contrary to rumor, the 49er fire did not cause this plant to spread. Nothing and no one to blame, it's just a nasty plant!

PUNCTURE VINE- low growing vine- yellow flowers. Their spiny seed head will literally puncture tires, trees, posts, and even feet!

KEY WEEDING TIP: Always start in the area of LEAST infestation and move toward the center. Don't start where you have the most weeds and work your way out...you may cause the very thing you wanted to get rid of to spread!
