City Club has begun with the purchase of 13 computers. Telestream, also a project sponsor, purchased additional needed computers. There will be a workday soon to unbox the computers and set up the lab. We sang to April birthdays (ahead of schedule) and then President Bob recognized Rod Fivelstad with his Paul Harris Fellow +8 and Susan Fivelstad with her +7. Congratulations and thank you to Rod and Susan for their continuing support of The Rotary Foundation!

In response to a question President Bob received about why we have two fundraisers, Bob gave an excellent summary of why we decided to move away from Casino Night (didn't want to sell tickets, event has run its course, wanted a fundraiser more community and family oriented). We settled on the Gold Country Challenge which brings in 2/3 of its money from outside the community, showcases Western Nevada County, benefits our city and is not about gambling and drinking! To support the Club's projects and donations, we need about \$22,000 a year. Ideally, bike ride sponsors cover the costs of the event itself (just under \$13,000) and rider fees create income to the club. 200 riders (which we hope to have this year) produce \$13,500; 300 riders, \$20,500 and 400 riders. \$36,500, do-able over time. So far this year we have \$5500 of our needed \$13,500 in sponsorships - we need help for more. Please

Why can't we add an easy ride and shoot for over 1000 riders like the rides in Reno and Sacramento? We simply do not have an 'easy' course - everything has fairly significant elevation. So our ride will remain one of the 10 most difficult in CA but one that fits a niche and is well produced.

Sandra Barrington introduced our guest speaker Rob Riley from the Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital Ambulance Service. Rob is a Nevada County native and began his emergency medical services career in 1985. He ioined the Sierra Nevada Ambulance Service in 1988 and become manager in 2001. In addition to managing the Ambulance Service, Rob teaches emergency medicine at Sierra College. Rob explained that our model of a hospital owned ambulance service is a rarity but has distinct advantages, which include quality control and a cohesive team approach between the Emergency Department and ambulance staff, including training together. Also, in terms of responding to transfer needs, our hospital and its patients are a priority. We learned that when calling 911, calls from cell phones are routed first to Sacramento CHP while calls from a landline go direct to our local command center dispatch. What about staffing? Rod finds many of his staff from his Sierra College EMT classes. If we think we could be experiencing a heart attack, should we call an ambulance? Yes! Calling the ambulance is far better. Not only will you avoid someone driving under stressed conditions and then

needing to go through the emergency room check-in process, the ambulance actually saves time by evaluating you and calling ahead so that everything is ready the minute you arrive. Additionally, for certain heart attacks, the ambulance will take you directly to the closest facility with a cath lab. Great program! And Bob Lenhard drew the white marble.
