Some children don't have internet and packets have been sent home to those who can't connect to the internet. The gap is going to be seen with families from disadvantaged homes that don't have the resources and structure that others have. Locally, schools have really reached out to support families. Dual emersion Spanish program is still running and receiving Spanish instruction.

On Friday, Scotten School organized a parade and drove around town reaching out to kids which was well received. We don't know yet when the schools will open again but not likely in July as the Governor suggest-

ed. The superintendents are meeting and a task force has been formedto look at what we can do and do the best to make plans. A lot of people are wondering what are the school doing with grades. The grades stopped at this last trimester with k-8th graders. This is more of a challenge with High School students who need credit and grade point averages for college and scholarships. The high school is working to make sure the students still get credits they need. The district has two open principle positions. Lyman Gilmore is looking for a new principle and hired her last week. Lisa Lowell has been a teacher since 2001 and has been very involved in the school. She will take over on July 1st. Scotten is still intervening for their principle position and hoping to have a new superintendent by June.

Providing lunches for children is important. The food service program provides breakfast and lunch at 3,500 meals a week for families in the district. Some families would not have food if they didn't receive the school lunch program. Penn Valley is actually sending the meals around on buses. Bond projects are currently taking place which is a positive of our current situation. Construction and repair of the school parking lots is happening now and will be ready in the school year.

United Way has a high school food pantry that became mobile. They are making sure food is getting to the students. This started as a pilot at NU and is helping students at NU and Bear River. United Way will come soon and chat with us about what they are doing with project.
