Program for the Day – Tisha Gill Waste Management Public Relations Manager; About Grass Valley Hauling: There are 17 compressed natural gas trucks; they have 29 truck drivers, 95% of which live in the community. She shared the hours of operation for a number of different waste and recycling services. There are also transfer stations at North San Juan and Washington, in addition to the McCourtney Transfer Station. Green Waste is

composed in Lincoln, approx. 10,000 tons of green waste; 48k tons of Municipal Household Waste, which goes to Lockwood Landfill in Sparks, Nevada, where it is buried. The recycling goes to the Sacramento Recycling Transfer Station, which is a "clean MRF" (Materials Recycling Facilities), which means that we have pre-separated the trash from the recycling. With the clean MRF, we can recycle more paper, but the "dirty MRF" (like Roseville where they put all recycling and trash in one bin and the employees sort the recycling) gets potentially more recyclables but the paper tends to get contaminated. Safety is a number one priority for WM. YouTube has a 4-minute video online where you can see what the Sacramento Recycling Facility looks like. Evolution of the Recycling Industry: it started as a big initiative to have the public separating. Now, WM wants less contamination of recycling, which comes in 3 types of contamination: 1) non-recyclable products are in the recycling bin (diapers for example), 2) the recyclable is dirty (peanut butter still in the jar), 3) markets for various recycling products (even though almost everything is recyclable today, there is not always a local or regional market to process various products). We now have much stricter contamination rates from recycling buyers within the last year, especially China which has a less than 1% contamination standard (typically they see 15-25% contamination from customers). The message used to be "when in doubt, put it in the recycling", but now it has to be "when in doubt, please throw it out," as it is too expensive to sort to the 1%

standard. The value of the recycling product has gone down 48%! The residue/contaminants in our area has really increased. What is recyclable?!?! Check the WM website. Batteries can go in a Ziploc bag on top of your recycle (or trash)
