Polio Plus message given to Federal Health Minister

On 15 October 2029, a number of D9710 Rotarians joined Past RI President Ian Riseley, at Parliament House (Canberra). The purpose of the gathering was to acknowledge the progress made to eradicate Polio around the world.

This event was a lead up to World Polio Day, which is to be celebrated on 24 October 2019.

Federal Health Minister Greg Hunt, with a number of other prominent politicians, confirmed their commitment to support the various agencies involved in the quest to end Polio. Rotary's longterm efforts were adequately recognized by Mr Hunt and his fellow politicians.

Lukla – Gokyo Lakes- Everest Base Camp -19 days




- This is one of the world's great classic treks, with the additional challenge of reaching Gokyo Lakes and the negotiating Chola Pass at 5420m ASL.

when you're feel like you can't go on and be there to pinch you if you can't believe the views and what you are experiencing.

> Over the last 30 years, through partnerships, donations and awareness, there are now only 3 endemic countries, where Polio has not been eradicated.

Is this trip right for you?

- There are 16 days of strenuous trekking on this trip. You'll be trekking up to 8 hours a day and at altitudes over 5500m at times. We can't underestimate how important it is to be in excellent fitness and health, which means training in the lead up to your trip in order to be best prepared.
- The trekking lodges, known as teahouses, that we stay in on the trek are very simple with only basic facilities. Hot water may not always be available and may cost extra, as will access to electricity points for charging devices. Wifi is available at some locations, but connections may be poor.

These international groups of Rotarians, family members, program participants, and alumni, are experts in a particular field or passionate about topics such as economic development, peace, addiction prevention, the environment, or water. They provide opportunities to engage in service activities within one or more of Rotary's six areas of focus.

District Grant Helps Establish Libraries in PNG



Four Canberra Rotary clubs are taking on the challenge of improving child literacy in Papua New Guinea (PNG). Building on successful club stationery projects in 2018, they are now helping


establish libraries in needy schools across the country.

They are doing so by funding Buk bilong Pikinini, an established literacy organisation set up by Canberra based Anne-Sophie Hermann, to provide library kits to re-establish depleted school libraries.



The Rotary Club of Canberra-Weston Creek club was awarded a Rotary Foundation District Grant of \$3,600. Generous donations from the Rotary Clubs of Belconnen, Bungendore and Canberra Sunrise and from Weston Creek raised the funds available to \$6,600. Buk bilong Pikinini is now delivering library kits of between 250-1000 books to PNG schools drawn from those shown in the chart.

The first donations were made in September during Rotary's Education and Literacy month. Not only will the grant and project help children in those areas improve their reading, their ability to read will open up new opportunities for their families and communities.
