OVERVIEW OF A YEAR OF CHALLENGE

RY 2024/5 has been a year of challenge. We have not only survived but prospered. Looking at the range of activities we have undertaken and the funds we have disbursed, we are providing support to the Canberra Community far beyond what our numbers would suggest. Not only did we do some great things, but we had fund in doing so.

We started the year with 22 members, with three leaving in December 2024 - Randal Markey, Amardeep Singh, and Marwan Altalib – so we finished with 18 Active Members and one Honorary member. We started a 'Friends and Supporters' program in August 2024. All recent departees have been invited to become either friends or supporters with 100% take-up. Even with reduced numbers over the past 2-3 years, we are still a middle-sized club in the district.

We continued with our trial of two formal meetings per month, with one social activity per month (which enabled many in our Friends and Supporters to continue their connection with RCCS). After our forced move out of the Commonwealth Club at the end of RY 2023/4, we started the RY with two possible venues - Mercure and the Canberra Golf Club. In August members agreed that the Mercure was the preferred venue for meeting. Mercure have been exceptionally accommodating and flexible and are happy to cater for our small numbers (averaging 12 Rotarians per meeting).

At the planning day held in March 2024, members indicated they wanted RCCS to explore merging with another club as the best option for its continuation. The Board agreed to discreetly explore options for the future. Four other clubs - Woden Daybreak, Canberra, Canberra Burley Griffin, and Murrumbidgee Canberra Rotary were contacted to ascertain their interest in an amalgamation or merger. Of these, only Canberra Burley Griffin indicated that they wished to proceed with discussions towards a merger. Much discussion and consultation took place, but on 12 February 2025, the Rotary Club of Canberra Burley Griffin advised that they would not be proceeding with the proposal to merge with RCCS. In a Special General Meeting on 3 April 2025, members agreed in a majority decision to 'Continue to operate the club under the current constitution and governance arrangements (contingent on sufficient members being available to fill Board positions)'.

Highlights for the year were MUNA and the Dream Cricket Gala Day. Both events showed two important points: we as a club can do great things with a smaller number of members than before; and secondly, we have many folk, Rotarians and others, who are always willing to help us in our endeavours. RCCS does, due to the hard work and commitment of our members 'punch well above its weight' and by doing so, has made our beloved club a power of strength in D9705. I thank every member for their support in this challenging but rewarding year.
