




30TH ANNIVERSARY – ROTARY CLUB OF CANBERRA SUNRISE – Reflections from Frank Craddock

Rotary Clubs become involved in many and varied activities according to the interests and aspirations of members and the needs of their communities. Perhaps the most important goal of a Rotary Club is the promotion of fellowship within the Club and, in some cases, the extension of fellowship by the formation of new Rotary Clubs. The Rotary Club of Canberra North was invited, on three occasions, by the District Governor of the day to assist in the formation and chartering of new Clubs. The third club they chartered was Sunrise.

Bill Poole of Canberra North was Governor of District 9710 in 1992-93 and he agreed that a 'Breakfast Club' would be an asset to Rotary in Canberra. Canberra North accepted the challenge and Past President (PP) Harold Pennay was appointed as DG Bill's Personal Representative and the name "Rotary Club of Canberra Sunrise" was chosen.

Harold assembled a committee from Canberra North and efforts were made to find people interested in becoming part of the Rotary Family. Two obvious avenues of potential Members were identified: the commercial area of Mitchell and interested young ladies (as Rotary had been opened-up in 1989 to allow women to join). A number of young ladies had been associated with Canberra North for some years through Rotary programs such as Youth Exchange, Group Study Exchange, R.Y.L.A, and Rotaract.

They were contacted and a group soon began to meet at the City Gate Motel, Lyneham. The aim was to have the new Club Chartered by 30 June 1993 while Bill Poole was still District Governor, but that deadline slipped and the new Club was Chartered in October 1993.

The Rotary Club of Canberra Sunrise continues to flourish 30 years after being Chartered, with several Charter Members still active.

May "Canberra Sunrise" enjoy many more years of Rotary Fellowship.

Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)



The club's flagship program, and the one for which it has become best known within the wider Rotary community, [and attracted most press and Rotary Down Under (RDU) coverage], is MUNA. Each August since 1997, the club has held an Australian National MUNA Conference at Old Parliament House, now known as the Museum of Australian Democracy, for teams from high schools and senior colleges across Australia.

MUNA was first introduced to Rotary in Australia at Lake Cargelligo NSW in 1980 and the concept was then passed on to the Forbes Rotary Club in 1984. Graham Hicks brought the MUNA concept to Canberra Sunrise in 1997. Bruce Harvey chaired the first MUNA Committee, with Graham Hicks as the Coordinator. Graham continued as Coordinator / Registrar for many years and was widely known as 'Mr MUNA'.

David Elder presided over the first MUNA proceedings as Secretary-General and has undertaken that role at most MUNAs since. Others who have made regular appearances in the role include Garth Britton, Peter

McDermott, Jonathan Lyall and Bruce Osborn.

David also took on the role of MUNA
Committee Chair from 1999. This role has
also been undertaken by Bob Nield, Peter
McDermott, Greg Hood, but significantly
by Garth Britton for about 8 years. After
Graham concluded as MUNA coordinator,
the Registrar role (separated from
Coordinator) was undertaken by
Rosemary Everett and Peter Hill. Joint
Registrars for 2022 & 2023 were Helen
Deutsch and David Elder.

The first MUNA dinner was held at the National Press Club. The Saturday evening dinners were then held at the CIT in Reid until an ongoing sponsorship arrangement with the Australian National University (ANU) commenced in 2002. The dinners were subsequently held at University House, Bruce Hall and Burgmann

College. Most recently, the main dinner was held at Canberra Park. Over the years, renowned Keynote Speakers have been engaged for the main dinner which is now recognized as one of the highlights of the weekend.

A consistent aspect of MUNA has been the high quality of student contributions to the debates - recognized by adjudicators who, in addition to Sunrise members, have been largely drawn from local Rostrum clubs and other young

professionals. Gabrielle Evans, a RYLA participant and an ANU honours student, led the Adjudication team in 2023. Participant feedback indicates that involvement has changed the lives of many student participants. It has been a very satisfying event for the Club to hold and has been recognised with many District awards. One RDU article provided by a Sydney District once referred to MUNA as 'The jewel in the crown of Canberra Sunrise'.

MODEL UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY (MUNA) 2023 / 12 - 13 August 2023

An outstanding national Model United Nations Assembly event facilitated by the Rotary Club of Canberra Sunrise was held at the Museum of Australian Democracy (MoAD) from 12-13 August 2023 - 17 teams from across Australia, with 47 delegates - a series of truly spectacular debates with some of our nation's brightest students

In 2022-23, Jennifer E. Jones was the first woman to undertake the role of Rotary International President. And 2022-23 has had much to celebrate. At the MUNA Dinner on Saturday 12 August, Immediate Past President 2022-23 Margaret Atkin presented a Paul Harris Fellow (PHF) award to the Australian Human Rights Commissioner Lorraine Finlay, following her Keynote Speech. Lorraine was a Sunrise member some 18 years ago. We acknowledged Lorraine's ongoing contributions to peace and goodwill in the world. She continues to demonstrate Service Above Self. District Governor 2023-24, Andrea Grosvenor, was present to assist with the PHF award presentation.

One achievement the club can be particularly proud of is the successful relationship it forged over many years with the Galilee School, now part of Communities at Work and the assistance it was able to leverage for Galilee from the corporate sector and other community organisations.

The club's long term support included membership of the school board, fund raising events and dinners which culminated in the club's Rotary Centenary Project, with President Peter McDermott's Big Hairy Audacious Goal (BHAG). This raised over \$150,000 in 2004 and 2005 to rebuild a school building destroyed in the 2003 bushfires.

The Prime Minister's Golf Days





Fundraising by Canberra Sunrise over the past seven years - a few BBQ statistics!

Hats off to Sunrisers for substantial funds raised from BBQs at various Bunnings. From the club's 19 Bunnings BBQs over the past 7 years, just imagine:

- Sausages 14,000 (1050 kgs)
- Onions 330 kgs
- Bread 700 loaves
- Profit \$28,100 (=average of \$4K per year)

Without the two (2) years during Covid when there were no Bunnings BBQs, the club averaged 4 Bunnings sausage sizzles per year, with an average profit of \$1,480 from each BBQ. Substantial funds raised were directed to the Rotary Youth Programs, including: NYSF, YEP, MUNA, RYLA, RYPEN.

In addition to the BBQs held at Bunnings, the club has run a number of BBQs over the past few years, in support of:

- Leukemia Foundation's Light of the Night
- Epilepsy ACT's Awareness Walk, and
- Dementia Australia's Memory Walk & Jog

where the profit raised from these events has been donated to these charity organisations. Also, Sunrise has run a number of community-based or project-based BBQs throughout the 30 birthday years, including: Dream Cricket Gala Days, Galilee School reopening, holidays and birthdays, other Rotary Club events, and the like.

Special thanks to the many BBQ Coordinators over the time, including Graham Hicks, Jonathan Lyall and Simon Cullen.

From fundraising information in the archives – From 1993-2013 the Club 'raised over \$83,000 from sausage sizzles and in doing so dispatched over 50,000 sausages.' No mean feat! So over 30 years, well over \$100,000 has been raised for club projects alone from BBQs, in addition to the substantial funds raised for specific community organisations. A fantastic effort.

Other community or fundraising BBQs during the club's early years included for Dragon Boat Regattas, Air Safety Conferences, Million Paws Walks, Driver Reviver, Calvary Hospital Fetes, the Girl Guides, Mental Health Fun Runs, at Magnet Mart and the Canberra Show.

Special memories of the Italian Opera Gala 2009 & 2010 by Sunrise – from Margaret Atkin



This has been one of the most creative and exciting projects which Sunrise has produced - at least that is my opinion. The genesis of the idea came from a Rotary brainwave, modelled on "Opera in the Vineyards" interstate, to be used as a fundraiser for Rotary's community youth activities. Rotarians excel at networking, and this project epitomised the power of Rotary's work. In 2009, it succeeded beyond our wildest dreams, with more than 700 people in Llewellyn Hall for the event.

Proceeds from the Rotary collaboration with Melbourne Opera, ANU School of Music and the Embassy of Italy - supported Rotary's opera scholarships. In 2010, the Rotary Regional Classical Voice Scholarship Winners were Stephanie Phillips (Shoalhaven Anglican School NSW) and Jazmin Wills (Woolgoolga High School NSW). Our aspiration was eventually to fund a postgraduate scholarship for the study of classical operatic singing in Italy.

Special artists in 2009: Antoinette Halloran, Roy Best, Roger Howell, Greg Hocking together with the Canberra Opera Chorus.

Special artists in 2010: Joanna Cole, Roy Best, Phillip Calcagno, Christina Wilson and Alan Hicks. Also: Daniel Brinsmead, Ben Connor, Ben Lattimore and Rebecca MacCallion. And again: the Canberra Opera Chorus, with ANU students and the Canberra Chorus.

The Canberra Sunrise team negotiated with key players, including: Greg Hocking (Musical Director for Melbourne Opera, trading as South East Regional Touring Opera), Professor Adrian Walter AM (Head of the ANU School of Music), and His Excellency Mr Gian Ludovico de Martino di Montegiordana (Italian Ambassador). It was a wonderful step towards raising the Club's profile, and showing what Rotary can achieve in the community.

Sponsorship was received from Canberra Sunrise, Melbourne Opera, ANU School of Music, Embassy of Italy and also Patersons Securities Limited, ActewAGL, Escala Shoes & Accessories, Canberra Serviced Apartments, Shaw Vineyard Estate and John McGrath Ford. Melbourne Opera Sponsors: The Ian Potter Foundation, Roy Morgan Research, The Robert Salzer Foundation, The Angior Family Foundation, Maureen Wheeler, Co-Founder Lonely Planet Publications, Dr Douglas Mitchell, Henkel Brothers, Dingle Partners. We were generously loaned from the Sicilian Association of Canberra - the decorated "Carretto Siciliano" cart, with a 200 year history.

Something the club can be very proud of is its continuing involvement in the broader Rotary world. Youth Exchange Program (YEP)

Sunrise has regularly hosted youth exchange students, with its first student, Juliana Grizzi, arriving from Brazil in 1996. Since then, the club has hosted students from Belgium, Denmark, Finland, Sweden, Turkey, France, Italy, Taiwan and, on multiple occasions, Germany.



In turn the club has sponsored outbound students to countries as far afield as Canada, Brazil, Finland, Norway, Belgium, Denmark, Turkey, and Germany and continues to support the program, although these days hosting is usually in conjunction with another Canberra club.

YEP Hosting Chynna from Taiwan 2022-23



And who could forget the Bulbs

The club coordinated the sale of Floriade bulbs in 1995; the *Canberra Times* reporting on 16 October that 'The unruly behaviour at last year's post-Floriade bulb give-away prompted administrators at City Parks ... to make other arrangements.' The Rotary Club of Canberra Sunrise has agreed to sell them...'

A contractor was to lift, separate and deliver the bulbs to a Braddon oval for sale on Saturdays in October and November. However, the bulbs arrived in tonnes of soil; volunteers from our club and other charity groups, in a mammoth effort, extracted and sorted the bulbs and subsequently sold over 30,000 of them to the public. Sales (or rather supplies) did not live up to expectations and club members had a crash course in handling public complaints. The 1 November Bulletin reported that the Bulb Bash "was an unmitigated disaster ...rain, small delivery of bulbs, ran out of stock quickly. But a great hands-on effort by the club. Many thanks to Allen Oliver."

Buk bilong Pikinini (BbP)

A regular International Service project since 2016 has been the collection of children's books and literacy materials in support of Buk bilong Pikinini, a not-for-profit organisation seeking to help increase literacy rates in Papua New Guinea (PNG) through the establishment of children's libraries and the provision of high-quality education programs and books.

Initial collections were sourced from club members; however, the bulk of recent collections have come from ACT school libraries. (Enabled by Gabrielle Quadraccia's contacts with the ACT school librarians' network.)

Club members regularly collect surplus books from schools for subsequent delivery to the BbP office at the PNG High Commission. The club has also provided some financial support to BbP for literacy materials and transport, including with the assistance of a District Grant in 2018-19.

Rosie's Honey Mustard Dressing and the Rotary Club of Canberra Sunrise - from Kim Barrett[^]

In 2013 I was helping the Rotary Club of Canberra East with a BBQ at Cotter Dam, when Genevieve Power asked what I was up to these days - to which I replied that Shirley and I had just purchased a caravan and were

going to do some travelling.

Genevieve then asked if I would be interested in joining a farm hub project being led by some Canberra East members who were Salvation Army rural chaplains.

So, on 7 May we set off to undertake substantial work to make the local shop in Quambone, NSW somewhat livable and functional for the new interstate owners who had purchased it sight unseen. It was the only shop in town, contained the local post office, and was a vital part of the community. After our team had started work replacing posts, repairing the roof, and painting the building, members of the local community heard what was happening and

provided some wonderful country cooking and hospitality. This culminated in a community family BBQ evening where Shirley and I first met Rosie and her husband Simon. What delightful people they are.

All the team were given a bottle of dressing as a thank you - my Rosie's Dressing journey started that night. We asked if there was a story behind the dressing. What we heard and have learnt over time, of Rosie and Simon, and many others from country farms, is of their resilience to survive. Rosie has worked tirelessly on the farm dealing with many years of drought, mice plagues, floods and then drought again. I've kept in contact, and when talking with Rosie, she never complains, saying, there are plenty worse off than us.

Rosie began making the dressing on their property during the drought in 2005 to bring in some extra income, selling it initially at local markets. Word soon spread, the kitchen relocated to Warren and while still handmade, the dressing is now sold all over Australia.

After that initial trip, I introduced Rosie's Dressing to Canberra Sunrise members who have been very supportive. I obtain it at wholesale price and Sunrise members purchase it at a price lower than retail. The profit goes to Canberra Sunrise.

Freight costs from Warren have always been an issue. Over the years Rosie has assisted with the transport and Sunrise members and their family members have also assisted.

I continued to help with the farm hubs for several years, sometimes twice a year, however Shirley's health unfortunately stopped her from continuing.


