Andrew Rosen from the Hawaii State FCU spoke of Tech Banking and its future in the banking industry. He spoke of how banking has changed in the last 20 years when there was no computer contact, email, facebook,

twitter, etc. that we have today. Some statistics he gave were if Facebook today was a country it would be the second largest company in the world. In 2004 there was no Facebook. In 2005 YouTube came on line along with Google Maps, 2006 saw Twitter, 2007 Iphone 2008 was the Android and 2010 the Ipad. One of the things the banking Industry is trying to avoid is becoming another Blockbuster or Tower Records, Borders, Barns and Nobel or the Publishing Industry, all of which have gone out of business. The changing behavior shows bank consolidations included the top ten banks 60% consolidation, other 34% with FCU's at 6%. He explained the EMV chip being imbedded into credit cards and ATM machines for protection from virus and scammers. Europe and Asia have been using the technology for the past 20 years with the US just now beginning to use it. Online banking and bill paying have become very popular with 55% of the population using smart phones. Apple Pay which has just become available is being used by 800 million people. What will we be seeing in the next 10 years nobody knows but the smart wrist watch is already in use with eliminates the need for a smart phone and in most cases a computer and you can already send cash by mobile phone without a card or checks. By the end of the decade we will see 40% of banks and 50% fewer Credit Unions. We are on the cusp of major changes.
