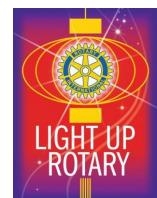

Polio Today. Today, there are only three countries that have never stopped transmission of the wild poliovirus: Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. Fewer than 250 polio cases were reported worldwide in 2012, which is a 99% reduction since the 1980s, when the world saw about 1,000 cases per day. If we don't stay the course, experts say polio could rebound to 10 million cases in the next 40 years

Kimo Carvalho and Connie addressed our club from IHS the Institute for Human Services. IHS is a comprehensive social and support services agency offering emergency homeless shelter, case management, food, as well as mail service and an address which homeless people do not have. IHS Provides temporary shelter and work to end chronic homelessness through innovative collaboration and strategic programs. IHS is Oahu's first and largest 24-hour emergency walk-in shelter for men, women and families with children who are homeless. They also provide rental assistance and short term case management. The also provide more than 500 individuals with meals, hygiene, information and referral services.

The homeless are just like you and me which has led to a project started by IHS called "Just Like Us".

IHS Core Values include the following; Hookipa—Hospitality for the homeless, Kuleana—Responsibility in the homeless future in caring for themselves. Laulima - Collaboration with the program leaders, Malama Aina - Taking care of themselves for their department and 'Ohana - Helping every person and his responsibility. Sub - Population Assessment - Triage includes In - Crisis individuals which includes many people, Youth - very vulnerable not knowing where to get a meal day to day, getting to school, etc. Seniors. Tourist who come to Hawaii looking for a better life and finding cost greater than anticipated. The Chronic homeless who are on Drugs and have medical problems and Families with many under age of five.

IHS Case Managers at the shelter assist clients with re-integrating into community by helping them develop skills and knowledge that increase their self-sufficiency, and provide them with the means and access to the things they need to achieve it.
