NEWSLETTER

Our speaker last week was Rick McDonald. Fifty five years ago Rick was a "highly oriented technol-



ogy programmer" who went on to develop a complete MIS system for a high tech corporation that was part of the most respected technological trade associations in the world. Rick be-

gan working with bar codes in 1979 while running a company which printed an in house directory for Pacific Telephone.

Rick recalled how inventory in grocery stores were tracked prior to 1973, the year that barcode was formally adopted. Prior to barcode, tracking inventory was quite labor intensive, very slow and not very accurate. A team of engineers from IBM introduced the bar code or Uniform Product Code (UPC) system, which was eventually adopted in 1973. The system was flexible enough to allow international expansion simply by adding additional digits. With the adoption of barcode, the economy went from a "push" economy to a "pull" economy. What this means is that it allows the manufacturer to have information about what the customer really wants so there's far less wasted in products that are not in demand and allows for more production of those in most demand. This allowed for greater efficiency and as a result sales volume and profits rose. Without barcode, the age of information would not have evolved as quickly as it has. Coding has made it possible for large amounts of data, product information and automatic classification to be easily stored, retrieved and reconciled. The History Channel recently ranked the top 100 inventions that changed the world; Barcodes ranked in the top 20.
