Rotary Community Corps

A Rotary Community Corps (RCC) is a team of non-Rotarian men and women who are committed to their community's long-term development and self-sufficiency. An RCC is sponsored by a Rotary club and, like Rotaract and Interact clubs, is one of Rotary's partners in service. The main principle of the program is to enable RCC members to personally address and solve problems in the area where they work or live.

Sponsoring an RCC is a great way to initiate and implement enduring service projects. RCCs carry out create and sustainable solutions to address a wide array of community issues such as lack of safe water, hunger, pollution, illiteracy, and inadequate housing. An RCC works with its sponsoring Rotary club to consult with the local community, identity needs, and plan, implement, monitor, and evaluate a service project. Every community's needs are different, but what unites RCC members is the idea that no problem is too large to solve.

## **PROGRAM GOALS**


All RCCs share four major goals:

## **RCC HISTORY**

The RI Board of Directors officially adopted the RCC program in 1988, following its introduction in 1985 by M.A.T. Caparas, who was then RI president-elect. The RCC was envisioned as an organization of community members who wish to improve the places where they live or work. Until 1999, RCCs were referred to as either Rotary Village Corps or Rotary Community Service Corps.

Today, the RCC program continues to grow worldwide, with more than6,700 corps in over 75 countries and geographical areas.

otary youth Leadership Awards

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is Rotary's leadership training program for young people. RYLA participants can be ages 14-30, but most clubs and districts choose to focus on a narrower age range, such as 14-18 or 19-30.

RYLA emphasizes leadership, citizenship, and personal growth, and aims to:

- Demonstrate Rotary's respect and concern for youth
- Provide an effective experience for selected youth and potential leaders
- Encourage leadership of youth by youth
- Recognize publicly young people who are rendering service to their communities

Hawaii Rotary You

The Hawaii Rotary Youth Foundation (hereafter referred as HRYF) was chartered as a non-profit charitable corporation in 1976 when Maurice J. Sullivan was the Rotary District Governor in Hawaii. One of its objectives is to provide scholarships for Hawaii's youth to further their education.

HRYF administers a scholarship aid program for Hawaii high school students attending a 4-year university or college in Hawaii and the U.S. mainland. Funds are derived from gifts and investment income from Hawaii Rotarians and The Harry & Jeanette Weinberg Foundation, Inc.

Eligibility Criteria:

- A graduating Hawaii high school senior who will be applying as a full-time student to an accredited 4-year college or university in Hawaii and the U.S. mainland to earn a baccalaureate degree. A full-time student shall be defined as taking a minimum of twelve (12) credit hours per semester.
- 2. Must be a U.S. citizen and legal resident of Hawaii
- 3. Ineligible are Rotarians or their spouse, children, grandchildren stepchildren, brothers or sisters. Also ineligible is anyone entering one of the U.S. Military Academies, receiving a "Full Scholarship" or attending a university outside the United States.

The HRYF and Weinberg scholarship programs are administered without regard to race, creed, color, age, religion, sex, national origin or physical disability.

#### Scholarship Application Procedures:

- 1. Scholarship forms are available through your high school counselor, Rotary club in your area, and from our website at www.hryfd5000.org or calling the HRYF office at 735-1073 on Monday or Thursday.
- 2. Contact the Rotary club where you live or where you attend high school to request sponsorship. See listing in back.
- 3. Complete application and submit to one one Rotary club by
- 4. Submit two (2) Recommendation for Scholarship forms (make copy): one (1) from your present faculty member and one (1) from a member of your community (not another student)
- 5. Enclose a certified copy of your high school transcript.
- 6. Submit your Student Aid Report (SAR) or a photo copy of all pages of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form that was sent to the mainland for processing.
- 7. Complete your personal statement indicating area of study you expect to pursue and tell us what it would mean to you and to Hawaii if you were to receive this scholarship.
