**DATE: APRIL 13, 2021**  
**PRESIDING: PRESIDENT RICH PROCTOR**

**President Rich Proctor** called to order the Rotary Club of Honolulu meeting at 12:00 noon.

“Here we are! Thank you all for coming and for being here for the April 13 meeting of the Rotary Club of Honolulu. My name is **Rich Proctor** and I am honored to be your Club President for the remainder of this Rotary year, ending on July 1st.” **Rich** announced the agenda for the day and welcomed visitors. He announced that “five of our newer members will be telling us about their interests, or what makes them tick.” **Rich** thanked and asked **Brian Dunkel**, our Virtual Meeting Maestro, to mute everyone for ease of listening to speakers.

**OPENING CEREMONIES**

*Inspiration by **Rob VanTassell** – Dalai Lama XIV quote from *The Art of Happiness**

Sometimes when I meet old friends, it reminds me how quickly time passes. And it makes me wonder if we’ve utilized our time properly or not. Proper utilization of time is so important. While we have this body, and especially this amazing human brain, I think every minute is something precious.

Our day-to-day existence is very much alive with hope, although there is no guarantee of our future. There is no guarantee that tomorrow at this time we will be here. But we are working for that purely on the basis of hope. So, we need to make the best use of our time.

I believe that the proper utilization of time is this: if you can, serve other people, other sentient beings. If not, at least refrain from harming them. I think that is the whole basis of my philosophy.

So, let us reflect what is truly of value in life, what gives meaning to our lives, and set our priorities on the basis of that. The purpose of our life needs to be positive. We weren’t born with the purpose of causing trouble, harming others.

For our life to be of value, I think we must develop basic good human qualities—warmth, kindness, and compassion. Then our life becomes meaningful and more peaceful and thus happier.

Prior to our reciting the *Pledge of Allegiance* led by **Bob Robinson**, he shared the following: At school when I was a boy, we daily pledged allegiance to our flag, but something was missing. On Sunday, February 7, 1954, the church, which Abraham Lincoln attended, celebrated Lincoln’s upcoming birthday. The President, Dwight Eisenhower was sitting in Lincoln’s pew. The sermon was based on the Gettysburg address, incited Lincoln’s words, “under God” as defining words that set the US apart from other nations. It was something missing in our Pledge of Allegiance.

The next day, February 8, 1954, acting on Eisenhower's request, a Bill was introduced in Congress to include "under God" to the pledge and on June 14, 1954, President Eisenhower signed it into law. Citizens, please join me in our Pledge.

Members and visitors of the RCOH then joined **Bob** in reciting our *US Pledge of Allegiance*.

**Lyla Berg** stated "In keeping with tradition of the RCOH and following **Bob's** pledge and especially **Rob's** inspiration" she requested that we all sing both the *National Anthem and Hawai'i Pono'i* "because in our state, the truth is, we have two anthems." We all joined Lyla in singing both anthems and **Robyn** screen shared the words for *Hawai'i Pono'i*.

What makes **Jack** tick: He enjoys his work and likes to see different companies from local non-profit, to private investor, to contract company, to the high end of investments and trust, to see how each operates, what those groups do and how they interact. This blends over into his learning every day on the job and he finds it interesting to come up with solutions to problems that he may not have seen before.

**Jack** states, “Echoing **Rob’s** inspiration from the Dalai Lama,” he enjoys serving people, and especially those within his industry. He finds it very rewarding to help others “who find themselves in a bind and need to expand.” He receives joy from others being thankful and finds helping others inspiring.

### **Madeliene Gardner**

My name is Madeleine Gardner. I am going to tell you a little bit about where I’m from, where I’ve lived, my professional background and what I’m working on now.

I was born in New York, but I don’t really consider it home because I’ve lived in so many different places to include, California, Maryland, the UK, Scotland, Wales, Zimbabwe, Canada where I lived for a year as a Rotary Exchange Student, Bali, and now Hawai’i. Of all the places in which I’ve lived, Hawai’i is the only place I’ve ever called home. (Fun Fact!)

**My Professional background is in education** – first as an operations administrator and then in academia. I was a teacher and then an academic director. I then started my own private tutoring company, which I was expanding to include experiential learning through travel and volunteering when COVID hit.

COVID led me to more of a virtual environment to conduct business and connect with others. These connections turned into self-empowerment sessions with a party and celebration theme. And I conducted them in my dining room in front of a large painting that I call the pink square.

This gave me the idea of developing a learning platform with an entertainment twist. I am now developing a talk show called the Pink Square Show that brings people together for the purpose of meaningful connection, interaction, education, and

entertainment. It's a virtual learning party/event, where we dress up, have tea, talk story if you will, laugh, cry, share, and learn.

I want people to share their stories, get ideas, support each other, support their communities, and have fun while doing this. Everyone is welcome to the party, but I currently have access to a captive audience of a few thousand international 18-24 year olds who are predominately from Europe, South America, and Asia; many of them are former students who I've kept in contact with directly or through social media.

I am working with a professional branding and production company (the name of Universal Admedia) as well as a local professional film crew, who all produce broadcast quality work. (Universal Admedia has worked on campaigns for companies such as SC Johnson, Calvin Klein, Diane Von Furstenburg, Tumi, Puma, Harvard University, IBM, and other brands).

I just interviewed my first guest who is a former lawyer now turned social advocate and certified yoga instructor. She spearheaded successful political campaigns for two presidents and two senators. She's the co-founder of a wonderful organization that has found a way to combine the principles of yoga and social advocacy.

Due to COVID she was forced to close the doors of her yoga studio, but after our episode, we have been in talks to help promote a virtual platform through which she will revive her business. I am also going to use my platform to promote her business and possibly work with her to create some retreats and events in different locations when it is safer to travel.

I'd like to use *The Pink Square Show* to contribute to the community this way and even find ways to fundraise for individuals, communities, and organizations – including the Rotary Club (it would be amazing to help this organization further it's reach).

**Karen** eventually left the accounting firm and got a job in film industry, which is not easy to do. She worked on production; screen plays, and thoroughly enjoyed it. All while her husband

worked in medicine and went back to school to work in an Emergency Room. Then they became pregnant and then 9/11 happened, which she said is a story for another time. Their twins were born September 12<sup>th</sup> in Manhattan. She shares they were safe and healthy and was so glad they were born when they could give her something else to focus on.

After 9/11 we moved to Virginia, outside of Washington D.C. where the kids went to school and I realized I wanted to do something else with my life. This is when I became involved with education and non-profit organizations. My first non-profit job was working for an elementary school system developing programs for kids. I then moved on to the *Public Just Foundation*, which is a public interest law firm that does ground breaking legislation and really protects the underdog civil rights and environmental rights.

**Karen** then stated that she moved to *Best Buddies*, an organization that promotes social inclusion for people with intellectual and development disabilities. She worked there for seven years while the kids grew up in Virginia and loved it. Once the kids graduated, it was decided to work for the *Best Buddies* counterpart here in Hawaii. They moved here in January “and the world shut down.”

[With laughter and smiles] I thank you all at Rotary because you are the only people I’ve met so I do so look forward to seeing you every week even though I don’t get to see you in person. I am grateful for your presence. I am grateful for your friendship. I am grateful for your service. I get to spend time with you guys and I get to spend time with another charity called *HI Help Is On the Way*, which started as a way to feed Kupuna when it was not safe for them to be out of their homes.

As we were talking in the Breakout Rooms, I am a dog person. My husband has entirely given in and we are getting another puppy to go with the 11-year-old hound we have here! I am very excited about that! And I am really excited to meet you all in person when it is safe to do so. Again, I thank you for being my lifeline during these times.

### **Lucci Pinoliad**

**Lucci** states she isn’t good as talking about herself, so she chose to go through the questions given to her the day before.

**Lucci** was born at her Grandfather’s beach home in the Central Philippines. Everyone was expecting a boy, including her mom, but low and behold, she got **Lucci**!

**Lucci** came to Hawaii in 2014 for her last duty assignment in the Army. She attended an all-girls Catholic school from Kindergarten through High School, then an all-women’s college after. She said, “even though I didn’t go to a local school here [Hawaii], *Mills College* and Hawaii have a very close connection.” The Founders of *Mills College* are Cyrus and Susan Mills. Cyrus Mills was as a President of the *Punahou* High School and Susan was the first female faculty at *Punahou*. A couple of notable alumni who attended *Mills College* were Emma Metcalf and Helen Wilder. **Work:** She is affiliated with IBEX International, an Individualized Management Consulting group whose focus is on “start-ups.” She came into this field of work “by accident” but she loves “the problem solving parts” so much she stayed in the field.

**Passion:** Currently, **Lucci** has taken up the torch to keep Mills College as an all-women’s college! She is passionate about this and is working hard to find funding for the school.

**Rotary:** She likes the idea of expanding education to other areas of the world, as well as providing, clean accessible water to everyone.

**Alice** shared she wanted to go to *Mills* but her parents wanted her close to home, so she didn’t go. **Linda Coble** said that is the one college she would have gone to and thanked **Lucci** for trying to keep it all female, stating that “many people don’t realize how that can be such a beneficial learning experience and environment. I thank you for doing that out of the realm ‘and wink-wink’, but stick with it!”

In true **Lucci** fashion, after she shared that her mom only allowed her to go to *Mills* because it was an all-women’s school that was a safety issue for her (mom), she said, “I am grateful for *Mill* because if *Mills* was a co-ed I would probably still be at home, carrying babies and [with a shiver and laugh] and it would have been – Uuugh!” **Lucci** loves to hike and swim, and looks forward to being able to do it again. She thanked everyone!

**Bob Sigall** echoed our member sentiments by telling her he looks forward to meeting in person, along with several other members.

### **Keane Akao (Pronounced “Key In”)**

#### Things you may know about my organization:

- Est. in 1959 and affiliated with Cerebral Palsy National Network
- My organization is located in a past Rotary Gives Thanks Weinberg Project service site
- We have hosted 34 years of Great Hawaii Rubber Duckie Races
- Our donation bins and collection trucks prominently feature a rubber duck
- Our mission is to positively impact the quality of life for children and adults with a cerebral palsy diagnosis or other disabilities with similar service needs in Hawai’i.

#### Things you may not know about my organization:

- Our vision is to empower individuals with choices that provide opportunities for independence and success: a life without limits for people with disabilities.
- We have three focus areas
  - Health - Early Intervention
  - Environmental Stewardship - Reuse and Diversion
  - Education - Social and Community

#### **Health - Early Intervention**

- We serve children and adults with Cerebral Palsy and so much more



- The majority of the families we serve through our Early Intervention program include children with ASD, traumatic brain injury, Down syndrome, physical disabilities and developmental delays
- As a leading provider of family-centered, community-based services, UCP began working in early intervention 60 years ago with the creation of our Child Development Center.
- For the past 30 years, our contracts with the State of Hawai'i's Department of Health, Early Intervention Services have supported infants and toddlers to age 3 with developmental delays or cerebral palsy.
- Our current contract with the State in the geographical area of Honolulu South encompasses a variety of neighborhoods and cultures. The population served includes Micronesian, Chuukese, Chinese and Filipino families, as well as military families and families without homes.
- Our experienced staff includes occupational, physical and speech therapists, teachers and care coordinators who assist the children and collaborate with parents or caregivers in a child's natural environment, which is usually the home. However, for the last 13 months we have provided services via telehealth.
- We help the child experience the benefits of therapy and partner with the family by offering tools and techniques to help navigate challenges with their child's communications, physical, cognitive, social/emotional and adaptive development.

#### **Environmental Stewardship - Reuse and Diversion**

- In 2019, the program serviced 29,653 households, completed 36,000 pick-ups, created 77 local jobs, and diverted 1 million pounds of household items and 1.5 million pounds of cloth from landfills.
- The Reuse and Diversion Program contributes to the State of Hawai'i's Aloha+ Challenge Solid Waste Reduction initiative.
- We offer a free island-wide pickup service. UCP Hawai'i schedules two to three trucks each day to pick up gently used clothing and small household items in most zip codes on the island.
- By increasing the quantity of discarded materials diverted from the landfill and recovering materials through multiple or re-purposed uses.
- Designed to engage the community, the Reuse and Diversion Program prevents waste from entering the landfills, creates local jobs and economic opportunities for local businesses.
- It also provides a free, simple and easy fundraising option for other nonprofits, halau and school programs. (Highlight - Kailua High School Class of 1971) And if you're involved with a school or nonprofit, please feel free to reach out and learn more
- Due to COVID safety protocols collection locations across the island were closed but a selection will reopen later this year.

#### **Education - Social and Community**

- Provide information and link families to community resources for disability services across the state. We answer questions for parents of newly diagnosed children

- We offer a variety of assistive technology resources and equipment: iPad, Hoyer lifts, wheelchairs to improve quality of life and understanding about cerebral palsy and developmental delays
- Partnerships are an integral component of UCP's success. Fostering on-going and new relationships ensures that children and families receive the most comprehensive care and access to services that meet their needs
- Our community partners include: Hawaii Interpreting Services, Pacific Gateway, and Helping Hands Hawaii for interpreter services. We work with the Department of Health support staff, physicians, behavioral support agencies, Child Protective Services, Public Health Nurses, community preschools, nutrition services, ASL services, interpreters and Early Head Start.
- Other community partners include Catholic Charities and its Rent Relief Program, Aloha United Way (211 Information and Referral Service), Hawaii Food Bank, Ho'ala Assistance Program—Council for Native Hawaiian Advancement, SPIN (Special Education Parent Information Network), Association of Fundraising Professionals, and SEAC (Special Education Advisory Council). In addition, UCP stays current with community needs as an active member of the Chamber of Commerce Hawaii and the Native Hawaiian Chamber of Commerce.

**Q&A:** One question asked of **Keane** was if he was married and had children. He does not. He shared that his partner's home burned down in early January and they secured an architect this morning. Regarding the Cerebral Palsy, **Alice** asked where their main source of funding comes from. **Keane** informs us that they have a contract with Savers. "So, call us! Clean out your closets! Clean out all the kitchen gadgets you don't use!" They pick up donations on a four-week rotation. The largest item they could take is a toaster oven. They do not take furniture or computers. However, with computers, **Keane** says to email him and he help you get rid of them through connections. **Dawn** mentions that Helping Hands takes computers. **Keane** informs us, yes but they don't pick up. **Alice** asked how long he has been with UCP and what did he do before? **Keane** answers he has been with *UCP* for two years and prior he was the Executive Director of the *Friends of the Waikiki Aquarium*. He was then asked how they (FWA) are doing and he sadly informed us that everyone he knows were furloughed, retired, or left.
