My RYE So Far... Rose Kerr

Rotary Club of South Bunbury

Hosted by Santana de Parnaiba de Centro Historico RC

Hello to all of the Rotarians back in Bunbury! I cannot believe I have been in Brazil for a mo nth and a half now. It feels like a long time since I got here, but at the same time, it has gone quite quickly.

Flying out at Perth airport was hard, to leave everybody behind, but also very exciting. Havin g all the other exchange students on the first flight was great, there was about 20 or so of us. When I finally arrived in Sao Paulo, it was a whole 30 hours later. I was so exhausted! Despite a long wait in customs (Brazil's queues are crazy) my first host family were there waiting for me.

My current host family is made up of my host mother, my host father, and my 16 year old host brother. However, a week after I arrived in Brazil, he left for Orange in NSW on exchange. From what I have heard he is having a wonderful time, seeing the Sydney Harb our, and settling in to the Australian way of life. He has seen 5 kangaroos already; unfortunat ely they have all been hit by cars on the side of the road!

Where I live is called Alphaville. It's a gated community and is for the richer part of society. There are many residential areas which are set up kind of like American

suburbs, with houses all close together and a small communal area with a pool and bbq area. The security is huge here, to get into the residency you must have a finger print or facial reco gnition scan. Then, outside of the residences, there is a commercial centre, with shopping centres, restaurants, gyms, and much more. There is a lot to do, its just a matter of finding it!

I attend Escola Morumbi, a school near my home. It is a private school, and I am enrolled with another exchange student from France in the final year. I haven't really settled into school yet, the language barrier makes things difficult, however it is improving my Portuguese. Unlike schools in Bunbury, you have to take about 13 compulsory subjects, ranging from Portuguese to maths, physics, etc. School starts at 7am and goes until 1.20pm, with twice a week students having an hour off at 1.20pm before r eturning and staying until 6pm. Fortunately I am not required for the extra hours, as this is wh en the students study for exams. I am hoping to fit into my school better as time goes on and make some friends. I miss the practical classes back at Bunbury Catholic College!

I am enjoying living in Alphaville because, although the houses are close together and this challenges me when I am used to a big property out in Gelorup, I get to become part of th e residential community. All the teenagers group together and it means making friends here has been easier, and they live close by. Unfortunately none of these people go to my school but they take me out on weekends with them. One of the unique experiences I have had with them is to go to a 15th birthday party. 15th birthdays in Brazil for girls mark when they go from a child to a woman. So, a huge party is thrown, it is a lmost like a wedding, with ball gown changes, camera crews, caterers and hundreds of people. In a traditional party, the birthday girl has to dance with her father, and th en 15 couples dance around her. The one I went to wasn't as traditional but it was a lot of fun !

Some of the sights I have experienced in Brazil include; a soccer game, a samba restaurant, open markets (I love these, so much fruit and food, handmade art,etc), the line at the federal police (we waited for 3 hours to get my details processed!) and shopping. I love the Brazilian food too, typically lunch is the biggest meal of the day and we eat beans and rice, or pasta. If you go out though, you eat a lot of food. I have been told that when someone says they will "take care of you" they really mean they will feed you a lot of food! Desserts are my favourite here, with the traditional dessert being "brigadeiro" a small ball made of condensed milk, butter, and cocoa powder. It tastes a bit like icing off a cake but more rich. It is very tasty. I was shocked at the international food here, Brazilians love pizza, pasta and especially Japanese food.

I have been to a rotary orientation for inbounds and met about a dozen exchange students who arrived about the same time as me. There were many Australians, but none from WA! There was also a students from New Zealand, South Africa, Timor and Mexi co. We all became very fast friends! Especially myself and 2 Australian girls, we bonded very quickly with our stories of eating vegemite on toast for breakfast here! I really enjoyed the orientation, also to get to know the Rotex group, who will help organise events for us over the year. I have learnt now that there are many exchange students in my district here in Brazil, from all over the world. Many meet up regularly, howe ver I live to far away to go very often. However, we are organising an exchange student ball, which everyone will come to.

Telling everyone about Australia is always really fun. The look on people's faces when you te Il them you have kangaroos in your backyard is priceless. They are disappointed to hear we d ont have koalas in WA but always want to know the strangest things about Australia, like if w e are scared of kangaroos or if we are the same as America. There are a lot of things I miss ab out home, like the smell of the bush, our sense of humour, and my family and friends, but I k now the best times are yet to come and I just have to pull through the next few months. I am very excited to be going on a trip to the Amazon in May, s o it isn't hard to make myself want to stay for that! To fill the long hours in the day after school when I don't have much to do, I am looking at doing volunteer work.

My councillor has found me two opportunities, one working with dogs in a shelter, and the ot her helping out disabled children. I am really looking forward to starting these, as something t o do, to give back to the community, and to make friends.

Thank you so much to the rotary club of South Bunbury, this unique experience would not be possible without your support. I will continue to make the most of opportunities and hopefully do you all proud. I look forward to coming home and sharing my adventures with you all.
