This is a photo of Andrea Feast prior to her visit to Portugal in May-June. Unfortunately my camera failed me at the last meeting so I couldn't get a shot of the "new" Andrea who was guest speaker at last weeks meeting. My apologies Andrea, we'll have to get a more recent photo soon. Rotary Foundation Director, Mike Honeybell commented that Andrea had grown markedly as a result of the GSE trip and all agreed that the new Andrea was a very poised and confident lady who presented a very comprehensive and

entertaining talk. Highlights of the 4 week trip included visits to the Sintra National Palace (built in the 14th century) and the Mayuri Palace (built in the 18th century) which is now 50% monastery and 50% library.and the Portugese monument below that commemorates famous Portugese people including their many explorers when Portugal was at the forefront of sea navigation and discovery.



Cork oak plantations were visited plus several Rotary Clubs where the GSE team made presentations and learnt more about the Portugese people and their culture. Most young people are fluent in English but many of the older Rotarians are not. Andrea had previously studied Spanish so was able to make herself understood in Portugese. A live radio interview (the first for Andrea) was a great experience as were vocational visits to a Helen Keller School, a cancer treatment centre and at Centro hospital in the haematology/oncology laboratory, Andrea was thrilled to be able to see under a powerful microscope, a Philadelphia chromosome, the result of an abnormality due to interaction (translocation) between chromosome 22 and chromosome 9, often associated with chronic myelogenous leukemia. This was something she had studied and learnt about but to see this with her own eves obviously made a

great impression. Well done Andrea, you have been a great ambassador for Rotary and our Club.

And now in my last bully for the year, I thank all members for their patience and fortitude when the dates for their birthdays, anniversaries and induction anniversaries as posted in the bully were wrong or worse, left out all together. Thanks to all those who sent in contributions. But as an indulgence and to fill this last page I couldn't resist the opportunity to end with a piece of Billy Shakespeare's play, Cymbeline. Cymbeline has been described as a tragedy, a romance and a comedy but it never made it to the top hit list unlike Macbeth which has that great image of the three witches sitting round a steaming cauldron chanting:

"Double, double toil and trouble; Fire burn and cauldron bubble.

But Cymbeline has some pretty good verse too.

Plot: Cymbeline was a mediaeval, Celtic King of Britain who had a daughter Imogen who runs off with a commoner to the annoyance of Cymbeline and the Queen. The Queen who is a nasty piece of work plots to poison Cymbeline and Imogen so her bogan son, Cloten from a previous marriage can inherit the throne by marrying Imogen. Imogen rejects Cloten much to his annoyance. The court medico when asked to mix up some poison on the Queens orders suspects evil intentions and instead produces a potion that when taken will knock the person out so as to appear dead but in time will recover and wake up. Cloten meets up with the two sons, (Guiderius and Arviragus) from King Cymbeline's earlier marriage. A fight breaks out and Cloten has his head cut off.

Later, showing a bit of remorse, Guiderius and Arviragus decide they should conduct a funeral service for Cloten on account of his link to the throne. So here is what they say. Remember this is set in mediaeval Britain when the Roman occupation was in force and there was enormous class distinction between the top and the bottom in society. I love the imagery.
