<u>Program</u>

President Wally introduced our speakers Andrea (Andie) Gill and her daughter, Angela Beck, from Hilo Hep

Cats, a group which promotes fun swing dancing and will be the hosts of the Club's social on Saturday the 19th.



Andie Gill welcomed us with a "Merry Christmas" and then introduced the topic of the day: "Dancing Makes You Smarter." She shared various perspectives of dance –as entertainment, as freedom of expression, "as a vertical expression of a horizontal desire" (George Bernard Shaw), and, per research published in the New England Journal of Medicine, a cerebral function.

Social dancing with "improvisational movements" builds synapses resulting in greater "neuroplasticity." Yes, as we age, it's important not to lose neural pathways in the brain and to take steps that reduce risks of dementia. With social dancing, in contrast to choreography, there are multiple split-second decisions to be made, with these actions enhancing the brain's ability to find alternate ways of dealing with a situation. (We lose pathways as brain cells die and synapses weaken.)

Andie noted that people with neuroplasticity are more resistant to the effects of dementia, citing research of a twenty-one year study of senior citizens that shows the following: reading – a 35 % reduced risk of dementia; working crossword puzzles a minimum of four days/week – a 47% reduced risk; the three activities of biking, swimming, and golf which had 0% reduction in dementia (though with other benefits to the body), and dancing, which reduces the risk of dementia by 76%.

Andie and Angela then demonstrated improvisation in dance, stopping mid-way to illustrate the quick responses to "swing out," "rotation out," and other moves that call for quick decisions and actions. Mike Robinson, a longtime friend, of Andie, then queried, "Are you implying that women (who usually follow rather than lead) are smarter than men?" Andie quickly and wittily responded, "I could say that explicitly."

Clearly the message was that dancing integrates brain functions and that dancing with multiple partners calls for more creative adapting than just dancing with the same partner—whose moves you learn. We learned that the more brain pathways we have, the better, and that dancing is a great way to use the brain.

Time ran out, so we lost out on a final dance demo.

In Closing.

President Wally presented Andie and Angela with Rotary cups to remind them of their visit today and encouraged us to attend the 19th Holiday Day party to learn new moves and interact socially.

He then called on Connie Ichinose to lead the Club in the 4-Way Test of the things we Think, Say, or Do, and the meeting was adjourned.

After the meeting, your reporter learned that donations to date for Server Donation Day totaled \$642. Mahalo!
