





President Nancy Cabral called the meeting to order at noon. She asked Membership


Director Connie Ichinose to pick someone to lead the pledge.

Vocational Talk

Newish member Shaun O'Brien (corporate member with Sun Construction) told us about the Pilots Association of Hawaii. Pilots are the highly skilled mariners who pilot large vessels into and out of harbors.

When a vessel approaches Hilo Harbor, they request a pilot. The pilot is delivered to the ship from Hilo on a pilot boat. The pilot boat moves alongside, and while both the boats are underway, the pilot climbs up a rope ladder onto the larger vessel. During the transfer, it's the pilot boat operator who keeps the pilot safe. Shaun is one of the guys who operates the pilot boat (in his off-hours from Sun Construction). He showed us some pictures. The pilot boat is entirely wrapped in rubber, to make close contact with large vessels safer.

Shaun also spoke about learning his craft on the on S/V Machias, a sail powered boat that delivers cargo to small islands in the Pacific. Sounds like that might be a topic for a future speaker program.


Wedding Anniversaries. Alberta Dobbe and her late husband Al were married 67 years ago, on February 6, 1954

Today's Program

Jim Cheney, our inimitable Program Chair, introduced Eric Page, the Archivist at the Lyman Museum. Eric has a Master of Arts in museum studies and a Master of Divinity.

Eric told us the story of Florence and Masao Kubo, a couple who lived in Hilo betweenTet 2929 and 1952. The Lyman Museum got their papers from a relative on the mainland years later, and Eric has been organizing and investigating them. Masao, was born in the Territory of Hawaii. His parents



had immigrated to the Territory from Japan. He went to the mainland to attend dental college. There he met Florence, an American woman and a graduate of Barnard College. Though we don't

know the details of their courtship, we know that one month after their Massachusetts wedding, they were on the way to Hilo, where Masao set



up his dental practice. In those days, they would have been considered an "interracial" couple.

Once in Hawaii, they immersed themselves in the social life of Hilo. They had a well-known Hawaii architect design a large house on Wailuku Drive. She joined the women's civic organizations like the YWCA, and the United Council of Church Women. He joined the Masons and the YMCA. In 1931 he joined the Rotary Club of Hilo. Masao was 22nd president of the club in 1940-1941.

His papers included their wedding photo, pictures of both their parents, and picture of their house. We saw photos from various business and social events they had attended, including a 1940 picture of the membership of the Rotary Club. There was even an old "Lava Flow." Our club sponsored a Basketball team back then, and their picture was among the papers.

An interesting "slice of life" from Old Hilo!
