After all the oaths were administered, MC Gail called upon AG Doug Adams and Past Presi-Newton Chu to

Not to be outdone, AG Doug Adams came up and presented Nancy with over a million dollars worth (or so it seemed) of plaques and gavels to recognize her crowning achievements. IPP Nancy was on the verge of tears!

The room thundered with applause for 100 seconds as IPP Nancy took the stage and pledged not to cry. IPP Nancy was gracious and humble as she thanked everyone in the club for their incredible support during the pandemic, for without the members the club is nothing. She announced that the club won no less than six awards at the District Conference, in-
