



speaker. She gave us a detailed summary of the purpose of the Friends of the Children's Justice Center of East Hawaii. A non-profit founded by Joe Hanley and our Rotary club nearly 40

years ago.

THE FRIENDS' VISION AND MISSION FOCUS ON HELPING THE CHILDREN OF ABUSE IN EAST HAWAII AND PREVENTING CHILD ABUSE IN THE FUTURE. OUR VISION: To help abused and neglected children of today break the cycle of abuse tomorrow. Did you know that 30%-40% of adult abusers were abused as children?

Research clearly shows that abuse can and is a learned behavior. Children who are abused and receive no therapy, no assistance, no support from the community can often repeat the abuse when they become parents and adults. The FRIENDS strive to help child victims of abuse with small but critical needs at crucial times in their lives. We hope to restore their self-worth and make them feel "normal." And by normalizing their lives, we hope to direct them away from repeating the same abusive behavior.

THE FRIENDS MISSION: To help sexually, physically, emotionally abused and neglected children.

They do this in partnership with the Children's Justice Center of East Hawaii, by providing funds and resources to support the needs of these The "Friends" offer children. hope, encouragement, and opportunity for victims of child abuse. In simpler words, its mission is to help abused children rebuild their lives by essential providing basic needs and enhancements that powerfully affect their wellbeing... "helping a victim be a child again."

THE FRIENDS HELP LOCAL VICTIMS OF CHILD ABUSE IN WAYS NO ONE ELSE CAN

THEY HELP EACH CHILD INDIVIDUALLY Child victims of abuse, neglect and violence can feel broken, "not normal" and isolated. The Friends help these abused children rebuild their lives by small but powerful needs. Where else would these children find this type of help?

• Emergency Needs – a child taken from his home may have only the clothes on his back; we help with emergency clothing, bedding, footwear, hygiene items, school supplies. The Friends also maintains a clothes closet.

• Life Enrichments – Sports equipment, tutoring, Senior photos and yearbook, new clothes to wear to school, summer camps, so much more.

• Empowerments – "Winners' Camp to provide leadership training for at-risk teens

• Critical Needs – gas coupons to enabling victims with transportation to counseling

## THE FRIENDS HELP EACH CHILD INDIRECTLY

They assist the Center where allegations of abuse can be investigated in a friendly, safe environment by trained professionals. By



supporting the Center, the Friends support the child.

• Maintenance of the child friendly building and its atmosphere

• Snacks and drinks for children who may be at the center for several hours

• Critical Training supporting the professionals who interview and work with the child

• Collection of stuffed animals and other small gifts for each child to claim when they first visit the center.

# BREAKING THE CYCLE OF ABUSE

Can the cycle of abuse be broken? Will an abused child be likely to continue the abuse when they grow up? How can your donation help break the cycle?

Help Guide offers the following information: "Child abuse is more than bruises and broken bones. While physical abuse might be the most visible, other types of abuse, such as emotional abuse and neglect, also leave deep, lasting scars. The earlier abused children get help, the greater chance they have to heal and break the cycle rather than perpetuate it. While physical abuse is shocking due to the scars it leaves, not all child abuse is as obvious. Ignoring children's needs, putting them in unsupervised, dangerous situations, or making a child feel worthless or stupid are also child abuse. Regardless of the type of child abuse, the result is serious emotional harm. Parents who were themselves victims of child abuse may only know how to raise their children the way they were raised."

By helping abused children at critical times in their lives, we can together begin to break the cycle of child abuse. Children can learn new ways to cope, new ways to handle their own anger and frustrations. Your support for the Friends helps them to help themselves.

Currently the funds that our club raises at the Brewfest helps the Friends support this worthy cause.

And with that, Da Prez reminded us to pay our dues and asked Genie Philips to lead us in the 4 Way Test of the things we think say and do.
