
Well, it surely has been a busy September. I hope everyone had an enjoyable Labor Day holiday.

My dad was a teacher at Camden Central Schools for 29 years, while also volunteering as a coach both in Camden and Oneida. My mom was the director of the Madison-Oneida Chapter of the American Red Cross for 23 years. In addition to her paid work, she was a volunteer at the national and local level of Red Cross Disaster Services and was called away for months at time to assist those affected by natural and man-made disasters, including Hurricane Andrew, the Oklahoma City Bombing, the Northridge California Earthquake, and the 9/11 attacks to name just a few. She personi-

fied the Rotary mantra "Service above self."

I graduated from SUNY-Potsdam in 2000 with a degree and politics and spent several years working at Turning Stone Resort and Casino. In 2004 I began attending the Syracuse University College of Law, where I graduated magna cum laude in 2007. While at SUCOL I interned at the United States Attorney's Office and decided that I wanted to use my law degree in public service as an Assistant District Attorney. I was hired by the Honorable Thomas E. Moran in 2008 and have been with the Livingston County D.A.'s office ever since.

Throughout my life I have sought out volunteer opportunities wherever I could. Taking from the example set by my parents, I served as a Red Cross Disaster Services Volunteer through high school and college. During law school I also acted as a volunteer and board member for the Madison County Counsel on Alcoholism and Substance Abuse and Oneida City Democratic Committee. I currently serve on the board of and volunteer with the Friends of the Avon Library.

As a member of Rotary, I hope to pass on the same commitment to public service to my girls as my parents did to me. Rotary, more than any other organization I know, provides me with that opportunity.


No damage was reported, however the local restaurant did report a dip in their beer supplies after a Sunday afternoon visit by a portion of the group.

Avon Rotary Club, Avon Interact Club & Avon United Methodist Church join together:

1) The local clergy will develop a list of needy Avon residents who need some help with yard clean-up. This could be disabled, elderly and widows. They will get the list to our organizations by the end of Sept.

2) Each organization will pass this Team Sign Up sheet around. There will be a place for Teams and for a Team Captain. The Team Captain is the point of contact. The team size is really up to the individuals. Each team will have to obtain the supplies needed to rake and or a leaf blower to pick up assigned residents yards. Sheets need to be returned to Pam Hayes by October 14th.


