Avon Rotarians Return to Nicaragua

With the support of our Avon Rotary Club, the non-profit organization Linking Hands for Learning returned to Nicaragua to construct another

school. A total of seventeen volunteers traveled to Nicaragua this past February 2017 to begin the construction effort. The group and its numerous volunteers raised just over \$14,000 to build a one-room schoolhouse in the remote mountain community of Taguezal. Our club donated \$1,000 to the effort. All the money donated to Linking Hands for Learning was used to hire masons, purchase building materials, school equipment, and supplies for the children. The benefitting community of Taquezal is located fifteen miles outside of El Sauce, Nicaragua. When completed, the new school will serve twenty elementary grade students. Previously, the children attended school in a dilapidated structure which was made of adobe. The teacher at the school said, "The adobe walls are a concern as they are not strong enough to resist a strong tremor or an earthquake." This project, like the previous projects, was a collaborative effort with the Nicaraguan Ministry of Education (MINED.) They will pay the salary of the

teacher and for the construction and installation of the roof. MINED representative Johana Gámez thanked the volunteers, which included Rotarians Tom Vonglis, Marcie Williams, and Rob Lupisella for their continued support. The community members of Taquezal worked side-by-side with the volunteers during the construction, including the children who will be studying at the school. At a recent meeting the traveling Rotarians, along with prospective member Tina Fortune, shared information about the recent trip and highlighted a number of Nicaraguans they have been able to get to know. The personal connections made during years of traveling there, have helped to build a strong bond with the community of El Sauce and the surrounding area.



District Training Assembly

On April 8 I had the opportunity to attend my first District Training Seminar at Newark High School in Newark, NY. Being a new member, I entered into this experience with both excitement and apprehension since this was my first experience with Rotary at the district level. The meeting began with all the attendees gathering in the auditorium for short speeches by Newark and Rotary leadership, an amazing and truly inspiring speech by 2nd place Oratorical Contest winner Athalie Fiegle (link to her video can be

found here: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VgluhWZTvpo&feature=youtu.be</u>), and a video and Q/A session with Don Alhart and Ellen Hughes about the Rotary Foundation.



After this Rotarians left to go to the first of two break out sessions. The first session I chose was for new members to Rotary. In this session most attendees were in their first three years of Rotary. One member from Bath was only a member for three days. In this session I got to learn how area clubs welcome their new members and get questions answered by people going through the same experience as a new member like myself.

The second session I attended was about ways to attract younger members into Rotary. This session was led by the president of RocCity Rotary, a club in the city of Rochester made up entirely of young professionals ranging from their early 20s to late 30s, and with the motto "Not Your Grandpa's Rotary." This session dealt with ways that clubs can attract young members and the misconceptions that Rotary is an "old boys club." They presented ways that clubs can bring in youth who want to serve their community, but have trouble finding time with the stresses of building new careers and families, so Rotary can remain strong in the future.

All in all this was a great overall experience. I had many questions answered, and got to meet Rotarians from all around our district. I can't wait to volunteer at next year's District Training Seminar which will be held right here in Avon in April 2018.

Rambling On Rotary—May 2017

At the end of March, I attended the National School Boards Association convention in Denver, CO. This was a first for me to attend the NSBA as an exhibitor rather than as a participant. As such, almost all of my time was spent on the exhibition floor and I was

not able to attend various learning sessions. However, I was able to attend the opening session where the keynote speaker was Captain Scott Kelly.

Captain Kelly has spent more time in space than any other American over 4 space missions; 520 days total. He is the twin brother of NASA Astronaut Mark Kelly (husband of former Arizona Congresswoman Gabrielle (Gabby) Giffords). His last mission he spent almost a full year (340 days) in the International Space Station with a scientific mission to better understand how the human body adapts to lengthy periods in space. Most ISS missions are only five to six months in length. Kelly also did a "twin study" with his brother to see if there are any genetic changes from spending long periods of time in space.

Many of Captain Kelly's comments hit home with me and caused me to think of Rotary. In the April issue of *The Grapevine*, DG Rogers spoke to "Rotary Supporting Humanity" and "District Supported Global Grants". He spoke to diverse projects District 7120 is supporting around the world. Captain Kelly commented, "Diversity brings so much to a team". Whereas our Avon Rotary

is not very ethnically diverse, we are quite diverse in our perspectives, politics, and opinions. However, when it comes to getting things done, as Captain Kelly said, "Teamwork makes the dream work."

That is what Rotary is all about. Teamwork for the good of our community, our country and our world. "To see what we can accomplish, we need to choose to reach beyond what we think we can achieve. We need to take risks and be willing to fail." Rotarians know the value of doing the hard things. We all know the feeling of accomplishment when we succeed at a difficult task. When Rotary embarked on its mission to eradicate polio, did anyone think it would be Kelly commented seeing China cities for the first time, that is, on his previous missions the lights of the cities were not visible. What changed? China had changed its policies on carbon emissions, which resulted in significantly less smog. Captain Kelly went on to say, "It's the only earth we have – we have to take care of it. Seeing the earth from space you realize we are all a part of one team and we need to act like it." Will this be an easy task? We know it won't, but it is a goal Rotarians can help resolve and have started to do so.

easy? Because we have come so far we need to remember we aren't done yet, though. Rotary supports water

projects around the world; are these easy projects?

While orbiting earth on his year-long mission, Captain

As Rotarians, we are world leaders. Rotarians lead because Rotarians focus on "getting it done" as a team and we put aside our personal egos. "To be good leaders, you need to be good followers"; we need to support the work of others when that work serves the goals of Rotary. At our April 18 meeting, we had a great

presentation by our Linking Hands For Learning team and the work that has been accomplished in Nicaragua. This project, very close to our club, demonstrates leadership. Rob and his wife Jeanine believed the adage, "If we dream it, we can achieve it." The dream is not yet realized, neither is the dream of eradicating polio in the world, neither is the goal of clean water throughout the world ... but as leaders we need to continue pursuing the

dreams until we achieve them fully.

Captain Kelly has seen what can be accomplished by persons working together as teams. He has seen it on and above our earth. In closing he stated he has learned that "The sky is <u>not</u> the limit". As Rotarians, we must continue to reach beyond the sky to build a better community, country and world. I am proud to say that I know we can! And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.







EPN Newsletter April 2017

Every year, Bill and Melinda Gates publish an annual letter to broaden awareness and interest in key global health and development programs. This year's Annual Letter mentioned polio among their foundation's ongoing efforts to fight disease and inequality, specifically, the incredible progress that's been made towards polio eradication. Melinda Gates offers these kind words to reaffirm the important role Rotary has had leading the way to a polio-free world:

"We're awed by the teams of vaccinators who take risks to reach each child. And we're inspired by the infinite persistence of Rotary International. They were leading this fight long before we joined it, and they've just kept moving forward."

She goes on to say, "They know going from 350,000 cases to 37 is amazing, but success is zero." Even though a handful of polio cases have been reported this year, there is a chance these are the last cases of polio in history. This June, Bill Gates will speak at the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, USA to discuss how we can — and will — end polio together.

Especially the part where you get to drink a beer while in there. Every home we went to had at least one sauna, many had two. Tim also went with Henry's host father, host brother and Henry. We might have to build one of our own!!
