## **Rambling On Rotary**

In February 2017 issue of The Rotarian, there was an interesting article entitled "Why We Cheer" by Steve Almond. In the article, Mr. Almond stated that he has "come to see my fandom as a place of refuge, one that distracts me from my anxieties." He goes on

to say, "More broadly, I worry that our global obsession with sports has distracted us from traditional sources of connection – to our families, our civic duties, even our religious devotion." Elsewhere in the article he commented "almost as many Americans watch the Super Bowl as vote in presidential elections" and that the "athletic-industrial complex has become one of the largest most profitable sectors of our economy." [Speaking of the Super Bowl, the sure bet for this year is that the Bills won't win it.]

I got to thinking, how can we as Rotarians create a fandom atmosphere and experience around Rotary? Mr. Almond commented, "Fandom provides us an instant source of social legitimacy, a way of plugging into a shared narrative that is unscripted, thrilling to watch, and most of all, convenient." Our Rotary meetings provide an escape from our daily activities for many of us. What better source of instant social legitimacy than doing good in our community, our country and our world. To provide the financial support to cure polio, to provide financial support and hands to build schools, to provide financial support to provide shelter boxes in areas where natural disasters cause devastation ... what better examples of social legitimacy is there? But how do we get others to rally around these missions? How can we use social networking to inform others of what we are doing so they will become fans of our "sport"? How do we even get all fellow Rotarians (all fellow AVON Rotarians) to become members of the fanbase to cheer on and get involved? [It is still not too late for those members who have not yet contributed to the Rotary Foundation. Go to myRotary.org, create an account and log in. It is easy!]

Mr. Almond reports that "the fan mindset has profoundly shaped our popular culture. Americans, in particular, have turned virtually everything into a sport: singing, dancing, cooking, even courtship." We need to transform Rotary into a sport. We need to advertise our activities. We need to build our fan-base to increase our fandom. Even if community members choose not to join Rotary, we need them to cheer us on from the couch by supporting that which we do. At our January 17 meeting, Jake talked about his role as social-media chair and mentioned how we are not "tweeting" yet. I am not a techo-aficionado but it is clear that social media can make anything happen; the recent presidential election has made that clear. We need to build our fan base by inspiring others with what we can and are accomplishing.

#### **POLIC** GLOBAL ERADICATION INITIATIVE

#### WWW News Story

27 January 2017, Geneva, Switzerland – Ministries of health gathering at this week's Executive Board of the World Health Organization (WHO) reviewed the latest global poliovirus epidemiology and concluded that the world has never had a better chance to complete the job. Amid discussions on Ebola, Zika and pre-elections for the new WHO Director-General, delegates stressed the urgent need to secure a lasting polio-free world, by fully implementing the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) Polio Eradication Endgame Strategic Plan.

Endemic polio is now restricted to a handful of areas of Pakistan, Afghanistan and Nigeria, all of which are implementing regionally-coordinated emergency plans to reach and vaccinate the remaining pockets of under-immunized children.

Despite more children being reached in these traditional 'reservoir' areas for the virus, delegates cautioned that risks remained, as underscored by the detection of polio cases in Borno state of Nigeria, the first in two years anywhere in Africa. Countries are now focusing on making sure there are no surveillance gaps at a subnational level so that virus cannot circulate undetected, while working to increase population immunity levels.

Delegates commended the successful global switch from trivalent oral polio vaccine (OPV) to bivalent OPV in 2016, and emphasized that strong surveillance to detect any type 2 poliovirus from any source is now critical. A global stockpile of monovalent OPV type 2 (mOPV2) remains on hand for potential response as needed. A critical global supply shortage of inactivated polio vaccine

(IPV) continues to pose a risk, but is being managed by prioritizing available supply to high-risk areas and implementing new measures to stretch available supply, notably use of fractional IPV, as recommended by the Strategic Advisory Group of Experts on immunization (SAGE).

At the same time, countries expressed appreciation at the ongoing efforts to fully implement global laboratory containment activities. They also encouraged plans to transition the infrastructure of the GPEI for the long-term, to ensure the assets and infrastructure established to eradicate polio will continue to benefit broader public health efforts even after the disease is gone. At the World Health Assembly in May, the GPEI will present a strategic roadmap towards polio transition and the development of a post-certification strategy.

With all technical and programmatic building blocks in place to achieve success, ministries urged all stakeholders to ensure that the necessary financial resources to fully implement the Endgame Plan are rapidly mobilized.

Closing the discussion, partners from civil society addressed the ministries through Rotary International with a clear call to action: "We must protect hard won gains by sustaining immunity levels and careful monitoring of virus transmission. An additional US\$1.3 billion is needed through 2019 to reach more than 400 million children in up to 60 countries and to ensure high quality surveillance. The eradication of polio will be a monumental achievement by a global partnership. Such achievements exemplify what we can do when united for a common purpose. Together we can end polio and forever build a better future for all children."

## 17-18 Rotary International Theme Announced



Rotary International President-elect Ian H.S. Riseley made the case on Monday that protecting the environment and curbing climate change are essential to Rotary's goal of sustainable service.

Riseley, a member of the Rotary Club of Sandringham, Victoria, Australia, unveiled the 2017-18 presidential theme, Rotary: Making a Difference, to incoming district governors at Rotary's International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA.

Environmental degradation is one of the major threats listed by the UN's High-level Panel on Threats, Challenges, and Change. Riseley added, "The time is long past when environmental sustainability can be dismissed as not Rotary's concern. It is, and must be, everyone's concern." The president-elect challenged every Rotary club to make a difference by planting a tree for each of its members between the start of the Rotary year on 1 July and Earth Day on 22 April 2018. Trees remove carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases from the air, which slows global warming. "It is my hope that the result of that effort will be far greater than the environmental benefit that those 1.2 million new trees will bring," Riseley said. "I believe the greater result will be a Rotary that recognizes our responsibility not only to the people on our planet, but to the planet itself."

In his address to the 2017-18 class of district governors, Riseley also urged clubs to improve their gender balance and lower the average age of their members. Only 22 percent of Rotary's members are women, up from 13 percent 10 years ago. At that rate, Riseley said, it will take another three decades for Rotary to achieve gender parity. "Three decades is far too long to wait to achieve a Rotary that reflects the world in which we live. We need to make it a priority now," he said. Noting that 103 of the 539 incoming governors are women, Riseley said they are the type of women we need in Rotary, "leaders who will help Rotary connect with, and represent, and better serve, all of the members of all our communities." Riseley also believes it is imperative that clubs find ways to attract and engage younger members. Today only 5 percent of reported members are under 40, and a majority of members are over 60, Riseley told the audience. "Consider what Rotary stands to look like 10 or 20 years from now if we don't get very serious, very soon, about bringing in younger members," Riseley said. Clubs will make a difference this year through their own decisions, said Riseley, but it will take teamwork on a global scale to move Rotary forward and secure its future. "We know that we can do more together than we could ever hope to do alone," he told incoming governors. "I ask you to keep that spirit of teamwork and cooperation always in your minds and to take it back with you to your districts."
