Rotary International Convention, Atlanta 2017

Having hosted exchange students, participated in our Milt Matthews host program, met Group Study Exchange teams, and attended every Eastern Cities Fellowship dinner since I joined Rotary in 2003, I thought I had a firsthand understanding of the international aspect of Rotary.

I was wrong. Attending the International Convention in Atlanta, June 9 – 14, 2017 was truly eye opening to the true international meaning of Rotary, and its reach. 40 Thousand Rotarians from 160 countries attended the convention and it was almost overwhelming. We had only been in Atlanta for an hour or so when I met Woo Soo Poo, a Rotarian from Malaysia. I watched a Rotarian from Africa walk a 3K walk to end Polio in his suit and stocking feet while carrying his shoes. I met a maggot farmer from the Netherlands (no, really), countless Aussies, and school teacher from Colombia. I watched an entire contingent of Kenyans sing a traditional song and met another Rotarian named Kirk from Napa Valley. In addition to the people, I was very excited to see the hundreds of booths with projects from all over the world. I spoke at length with a club that is selling special soccer balls to fund an educational program for young women in Viet Nam to give alternatives to the sex trade. I met a guy who developed a hand operated well drill that can go 90 meters deep. I spoke with an organization that provides "rocket" stoves that reduce smoke and increase efficiency for people who still need to cook on open fires. I could go on and on, but it was so fun and interesting to see these projects first-hand and it was inspiring

and energizing to meet the people behind them. And all of this was before the opening session of the convention.

The opening and general sessions of the Convention were impressive on many levels. From the sheer numbers (imagine 20 thousand folding chairs), to the flag ceremony, to the AV displays, to the fascinating quests, speakers, and celebrities and the inspiring and moving messages they brought, these sessions were truly a sight to behold. The excitement generated in that room as Bill Gates and dignitaries from all over the world pledged 1.2 BILLION dollars to finally end polio was absolutely palpable. I also believe we saw a glimpse into Rotary International's next target (after polio) and that is the goal to end slavery and human trafficking. From a candle-light vigil on Saturday, to hearing Ashton Kutcher, and Senator Bob Corker speak on Monday, we were made aware of this very real and surprisingly pervasive scourge in our world. We heard first-hand and heartwrenching accounts from trafficking victims, and it was devastating to learn that it goes on right here in the good ol' USA, right under our noses.

I could go on and on about who and what I saw in Atlanta, but what is more important perhaps was the feeling I had knowing that I was part of this pretty awesome Rotary Family. It was just me and 40 thousand of my Rotary buddies hanging out and catching up in the ATL for a nice long weekend. Friendships made, friendships strengthened, and some food, drinks, and plenty of laughs along the way. It's great to be a Rotarian. Special thanks to my traveling companions as well, Jerry, Tom, Laurie, Jake, and Heather. I couldn't imagine a better team with whom to share this awesome experience.

President's Message, July 2017

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

There are as many reasons to come to Rotary as there are Rotarians – maybe even a few more. But each of us has stayed in Rotary because it adds something to our own lives. Through Rotary, we are Making a Difference in the world;

and the more involved we become, the more of a difference Rotary makes to each of us. Rotary challenges us to become better people: to become ambitious in the ways that matter, to strive for higher goals, and to incorporate Service Above Self into our daily lives.

What kind of difference Rotary clubs and individual Rotarians make through their service will always be their own decision. As an organization, we are guided by the three strategic priorities our Board has set in our strategic plan: to support and strengthen our clubs, to focus and increase our humanitarian service, and to enhance Rotary's public image and awareness.

In the year ahead, our clubs will have the support of a greatly augmented array of online tools, including a refreshed Rotary.org, a simplified Rotary Foundation grant application process, an improved My Rotary experience, and a rebuilt Rotary Club Central. As we look to strengthen our clubs, two specific challenges stand out in our membership: our gender balance and our average age. To keep our clubs strong, we need to build a membership that reflects the communities we serve and that will continue to develop knowledgeable leaders for generations to come.

For many years, one idea has stood at the heart of all our service: sustainability. Sustainable service means our work continues to have a positive impact long after Rotary's direct involvement has ended. We don't dig wells and walk away; we make sure communities can maintain and repair those wells. If we build a clinic, we make sure that clinic has a way to keep running without ongoing support from us. And when it comes to polio, we aren't working to contain it; we're working to end it.

Eradicating polio is the ultimate in sustainable service. It is an investment that will yield not just a long-lasting but a permanent benefit, on a global scale. It is and must remain our No. 1 priority until the job is done.

For 112 years, Rotary has made a difference to more lives, in more ways, than we can ever count or will ever know. Today, each of us bears a torch, its flame lit by Paul Harris, that has been passed forward from generation to generation, in Rotary: Making a Difference.

At this session we learned to let go of insignificant problems.

The last full day we learned the IDEAL Problem

Solver. IDEAL stands for Identify, Define, Explore, Analyze, and Learn. You can use IDEAL as steps to find solutions to issues. We were taught "Don't fix blame, fix problems". This quote is essential in any case, because putting blame on one

person doesn't fix the ongoing issue. Everyone can learn from their mistakes, and it is important to always look for a solution rather than a scapegoat. On Thursday, we had a "Radical Careering Panel" to ask questions about the book we read, and how to get the best out of your future careers. We ended with a luncheon that our family attended.

My experience at RYLA was one I'll never forget. Thank you Avon Rotary for sponsoring me to attend RYLA. I learned how to better my leadership skills, made many friends, and lasting memories.
