
cially nice to see the faces of the children as Jake and Heather handed these backpacks to them on our last day. Many thanks to Rob and Jeanine Lupisella

Johnathan has a Star Wars alphabet book and a book with Darth Vader reading bedtime stories to Luke and Leia. I think you get the picture.

The other day Johnathan asked me to do something and I said, "I'll try." His comeback in his best Yoda was, "There is no try. Only do or do not." Well I acquiesced ... and I did. Reflecting on Rotary, that is what we do, isn't it. We do! On April 14th, Avon Rotary hosted the District 7120 Training Assembly. At our April 17th meeting, we heard celebrations from Laurie, President Tom, President-elect Heather, Jake, Hans, Rob, and foreign exchange student Veerle about how they "did" in Nicaragua with the Linking Hands For Learning build a school project. As we have heard in the past as others have returned from this experience, "doing" this project almost does more for those doing than it does for the community.

Over three days from April 21-23, we had numerous club members (along with some spouses) join in serving our community by picking up roadside garbage and serving our earth by planting 120 trees. We were "doing".

Per the Board of Directors meeting Minutes from March, our club is supporting a local ACS education STEAM initiative. "As school districts across New York State devote resources to the integration of Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM), they are motivated not only by an understanding that these efforts will help prepare students for a changing economy, but also by the opportunities they can provide for teaching and learning. STEAM education engages students in an integrative approach across curricula and grade levels." I am very proud for what we are doing as a club to support the education for our community's children.

Club members are in the final planning stages for our June 2nd Blue Jean Ball with funds raised to support Stone's Community Resources (providing ACS students in need with backpacks filled with food, school supplies, and an emergency clothing closet), Chances and Changes (Offering people a CHANCE to escape the traumas of abuse, to heal the emotional and physical bruises, to live in an environment of comfort and protection, and to take the first step in making a CHANGE for a better, safer, happier life), and Gilda's Club Rochester (which is a place where people who have been impacted by cancer can find support, friendship and important resources in our community). Avon Rotary is doing!

April has been a very busy month for our club. As we gather each week for fellowship, it is inspiring to share all the things we are doing and to plan for future service projects to undertake. I know there are many times when I find myself saying I will try to do something, but, as Johnathan reminded me, for Rotary, "there is only DO!" Thank you to all Rotarians for all you DO. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.
