Foundation Giving = Investing in our Future



After the obligatory hair pulling associated with dealing with professional contractors, attending a seminar or 2, and a small pile of paperwork, our "Scout House" has a new roof!!! This has been a long-term plan of our club for several years and I'm glad to see it done. For our newer members, it may

help to know that we (Avon Rotary) own the Scout house and have for 68 years. While we have built our storage building on the property, the Boy Scout Troop 26 has had exclusive use of the "Scout House" for as long as anyone can remember. Many of our own members (myself included) attended our weekly Scout meetings in that building as kids, and it is a tremendous asset for both our club and our community. Our Board of Directors has been saving money for 8 or 9 years to be proactive and replace the roof before it became an "emergency" replacement, and I'm confident the new roof will last for may years to come.

While our club had saved more than enough money to pay for the roof replacement on our own, we decided that a project like this might be a great opportunity to apply for a District Simplified Grant (DSG) from our Rotary District to help defray the cost. We were happy to receive the good news that our project was awarded a grant at the District Conference last May in Erie. The award amount of \$4000



was announced earlier this Rotary year. This was our 4th DSG that we have received in the last 8 years or so, bringing our grant funding well over \$10,000 for projects right in our own community, or in 1 case, a project in our adopted community of El Sauce, Nicaragua.


The reason I bring all of this to your attention is not to toot our own horn, but to make you aware of the fact that these grants are all made possible by our Rotary Foundation (RF). When we (our club and as individuals) donate money to the Annual Fund of the RF, half of that money is made available (after 3 years of investment) back to the Districts to fund small community projects of the member clubs. Many clubs use these grants to fund small scholarships (up to \$1000) or grants like ours (up to \$4000). The other 50% of that money of course goes towards other projects of Rotary Foundation including Global Grants (\$30,000 minimum), Peace Scholars, and other global initiatives within their 6 areas of focus.

So as we enter "Foundation Month", please be aware when we ask you to consider making donations to the Rotary Foundation, that your donations are not only an investment in developing communities around the world, but also an investment in our own communities here at home.



Trunk or Treat—October 31st

Our 50th Auction



In 1967, the Avon Rotary Club held their first auction in an effort to raise funds for the good of the local community, and area. Some of our "vintage members" who were just kids, believe that auction was held behind Clark Chevrolet on West Main St. After that, it was moved to the circle park for one or two years, and then up to the Avon Primary School. Tom Coyne served as the auctioneer for many years, and was always a source of not only professionalism, but of entertainment as well! Our current auctioneer is Ralph Garnish, who comes from Bergen to help out with the event, and is very adept in keeping the auction moving at a well timed pace.

The auction has changed over the years, not only with the location and auctioneers, but with the type of

items that are collected. Early on, it was not uncommon to find items that were of a 'lesser value' that were no longer wanted, than it is today. We still get some of this merchandise, but rather than try to auction them off, we added a table for 'Garage Sale' items, and created 'Box lots' so that items that were worth less than \$10 could be sold without slowing down the auction.

More often than not, people and businesses donate items that are brand new that they purchase specifically for the auction. Realizing that businesses constantly get asked for donations, Rotarians especially have come up with creative ideas to provide for sale, such as dinners for small groups, access to vacation homes, and boat cruises. Food lots are a big part of the event, with Rotarians baking all sorts of desserts and treats. The Interact kids also provide not only food lots, but also serve food and drinks to the audience. The Boy Scouts provide another valuable service by keeping items for sale moving to the stage in an uninterrupted flow. They also move the items out to the winning bidders.

The clerking of the auction has also morphed into a much more sophisticated system. Early on, bids were recorded, and then transferred to index cards for each bidder. When someone wanted to check out, the items had to be added up and the attendee was given an amount that they owed. It then went to an Excel based system using filters to quickly present the bidder with an invoice and list of items that was totaled up. Today, we have a professional system that connects the bid recorders to the clerks and the registration table for faster collection of names, addresses, and bids.

Auction chairmen (and women) have changed over the years as well, with some Rotarians taking on the task for many years. Changing leadership injects new ideas and practices, and

keeps the event fresh.

The auction this year is the club's 50th, and with gratitude to my predecessors and their teams who have honed this to a successful event, I'm confident that this milestone auction will be a great auction once again. This is one aspect of the Avon Rotary Auction that has NOT changed!
