1972. I then taught at Frankfurt International School in Germany for three years. From there, after seeing lots of the European continent, I took an overland truck trip with Encounter Overland from London to Kathmandu which lasted two and one half months.

In Nepal, I met Shyam Shrestha, who worked for Air France in their Kathmandu office. We were married in March 1976. It was my good fortune to find a small International School in Kathmandu which was started by the Americans in 1954 when USAID began in Nepal. Lincoln School is where I worked for forty years as a Physical Education teacher, a fourth grade teacher, and finally added Elementary Music. Our two children Robert and Cecile attended Lincoln School for their entire Education. Cecile is now in New York City working for Planned Parenthood. Robert is now in Los Angeles working for Sony Pictures.

Why did I want to join Rotary? I was inspired by my friend Isabella who is a member of the Mid-Town Rotary in Kath-


