Rambling On Rotary—Reflections on Rotary International Convention 2018

I had the pleasure and truly awesome opportunity to attend the Rotary International Convention this June as it was held in Toronto, Ontario, Canada. As I arrived, I quickly found out that you pronounce the host city's name like "Trono". It was similar to when I went to New Orleans, Louisiana and learned it is pronounced. "Nawlins, Lose-iana".

Upon arriving, I learned there were more than 24,000 attendees registered from 75 different countries. For those of you who do not know, Rotary was started in 1905 with the vision of one man – Paul Harris, a Chicago attorney. His vision for the club was for "professionals with diverse backgrounds [to meet to] exchange ideas, form meaningful, lifelong friendships, and give back to their communities." Today, Rotary has more than 1.2 million members and 35,000 clubs worldwide. I've known those numbers for a few years but to see people from those countries and have the opportunity to interact with them was AWEsome and mind-blowing.

During the opening session there was a Parade of Flags that lasted for about 20 minutes. Have you ever heard of Eswatini or Nauru or Palau or Vanuatu? These countries all have Rotary Clubs in them. Eswatini is one of the smallest countries in Africa. Nauru is an island in Micronesia that is the third smallest state in the world, behind Vatican City and Monaco. Palau and Vanuatu are both small island nations in the Pacific. It wouldn't surprise me that U.S. Rotarians have performed service projects in these countries, but these countries have seen what Rotarians can do and have formed their own clubs. For more than 110 years, Rotary members have been addressing challenges around the world and we continue to do so today.

The opening session held presentations from current president lan Riseley and Ontario Lieutenant Governor Elizabeth Dowdswell along with dances of the indigenous people of Toronto and their Chief Stacey Laforme. Chief Laforme reminded us that we "gather to do the right thing for our people, our children, and our future." President Riseley welcomed us stating that Rotary, like Toronto, is a cultural mosaic. He stated Rotarians make a commitment to something larger than themselves ... serving not only our communities, but our world. He paraphrased W B Yeats emphasizing the need to support educational projects with, "Education is not the act of filling a bucket but that of lighting a

fire." He noted that this is what Rotarians do; we inspire others by lighting their fires for service. Lt. Governor Dowdswell stated that "the work of Rotarians is more important than ever in this ever-changing geopolitical landscape." She continued, "Rotarians continually demonstrate that great challenges to humanity are not overcome by isolation but through collaboration. The first and simplest place to start solving problems is through dialogue. We need to bring people together around the same table and listen to each other." And there we were more than 15,000 Rotarians from all over the world being inspired together.

I was awed by the sense of unity of purpose that was in the room and wondered, how do we bring that sense to the governments of the world. For me the answer was getting the parties together in the same room around the same table and making sure they listen to each other. I believe Rotarians can make that happen ... we can change governments while we change the world when our focus is on serving others rather than serving ourselves.

There was a House of Friendship, which had examples of various Rotary projects being conducted by clubs around the world, each project addressing one of the Rotary Areas of Focus: Peace and conflict prevention/resolution, Disease prevention and treatment, Water and sanitation, Maternal and child health, Basic education and literacy, and Economic and community development. Again, I was amazed to see all the good that Rotary is doing around the world and to talk with others about their projects.

The 2nd General Session had a wonderful panel presentation by three Rotaractors from Australia, California, and Pakistan, a presentation by the Director-General of the World Health Organization, and the President and CEO of UNICEF USA. Some very powerful and inspirational messages were offered such as:

- We must measure the impact of our work so we can prove our value
- The power of your compassion (of Rotary) and the force of your commitment can truly change lives and change the
- History will record that we were the generation that eradicated polio or the generation that did not get it done when we had the chance. We must not stop; we are on the brink of history. If we do not eradicate polio now, the WHO predicts that in 10 years, 200,000 children will again be dying each year. If we do not ensure that all children are vaccinated, then an outbreak is just a plane ride away.
- Let's make the health and safety of all children a political priority ... they are 100% of our future.

The third general session addressed the "Intersection and Impact" of clean water and education. "Together they

change everything." The featured speaker of the day was former First Lady Laura Bush who has had a passion for children and literacy throughout her adult life. "Every child deserves a quality education and a safe and healthy childhood. Literacy is an essential foundation for democracy." Other presenters continued to address the need for literacy education and Water and Sanitation Health (WASH). I was reminded that, "Rotary is an enabler of dreams for all people." The fourth general session featured Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau.

Some of the breakout sessions I attended truly stuck with me. As many of you know I believe the Rotary Foundation is one of the greatest tools to bring change to the world and I strive to give as much as I can to the Foundation. I learned about the Rotary Endowment program and will try to find more information to share with you at other times. As someone put it, our general fund giving to the Foundation helps us provide programs for today as we perform Service Above Self. The Rotary Endowment allows the Foundation to continue, in perpetuity, to provide programs for Service "After" Self.

A session "Membership Models for the Future of Rotary" expanded the thinking of how to make Rotary more available to others. It made me think of how colleges have taken programs to their students in multiple ways of traditional day classes, to evening classes, to on-line courses and a combination of all three to allow students to be involved when they can, not just when it's convenient for the college. Are there ways to better reach potential Rotarians that allow them to be involved even when they cannot attend our traditional meeting times.

One of the most inspiring sessions I attended addressed "Communicating the Value of Our Club Experiences and the Value of Rotary". Simon Sinek was quoted, "People don't buy what you do, they buy WHY you do it." Do you know WHY you are a Rotarian? Do you share your WHY with others? A survey was conducted asking Rotarians why they joined and stay in a Rotary club and the #1 reason was "making a positive impact on my community". When inactive Rotarians were asked why they left, the #1 reasons were the cost and time to "belong" and the club not satisfying their expectations for service.

We talk about attracting members under 40, one panelist in this session described how Rotary is what millennials need. She said that "Rotary excels in teaching global citizenship, which so many of today's jobs require. Rotary allows its members to practice empathy. Rotary offers young millennials to learn Board experience ... how to handle governance, mentoring, etc. very early in their professional lives and that has helped her advance in her professional life. Rotary offers unique opportunities and experiences." Now, I ask, how often do we trumpet those opportunities of belonging to Rotary? To attract younger members, we need to sell or expertise that older members offer. We need to share our WHY!

At the convention, I could see that we are truly international. Only 16 years after being founded, Rotary had clubs on six continents. Today, members in nearly every country work to solve some of our world's most challenging problems. Rotary perseveres in tough times. During World War II, Rotary clubs in Austria, Germany, Italy, Japan, and Spain were forced to disband. Despite the risks, many continued to meet informally, and after the war, Rotary members came together to rebuild their clubs and their countries. We are committed to service, and we're not afraid to dream big and set bold goals. We began our fight against polio in 1979 with a project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines. Today, polio remains endemic in only three countries — down from 125 countries in 1988.

I will close this Rambling by going back to the Opening Session. After the Parade of Flags, Canada's flag was presented as the host country. That was followed by Australia's flag being presented as the country of the Rotary International President Ian Riseley. Then the announcer said, "And now for the flag that unites us all, the flag of Rotary International." The applause was deafening. The statement was so true. Everyone in the arena, everyone attending the conference is united in what Rotary International stands for. If 24,000 representatives from 75 countries can come together united in purpose, we must use that unity and that focus to make our world a better place. Attending the International Convention, we were all united around one purpose represented by one flag. And now I truly have rambled on long enough.
