

### **Avon Rotary Honors Program**

A pair of innkeepers, a multitasking volunteer and avid gardener, and a food bank director were among residents honored April 9 for their contributions to the Avon community.

Three people, Jennifer Palmer, C. Thomas Moran and Ginny House, received Paul Harris Fellows, which recognize those who exemplify the ideals and professionalism of Rotary International. It also means that \$1,000 each has been donated to the Rotary Foundation, which enables Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty. Avon Rotary also bestowed two Building Awards for building renovation and new construction, one to the Avon Inn owners and one to Evening Star Coffee Roasters.

Palmer, who began as a volunteer in the Avon food pantry, eventually took over as its director. During her time there she has seen the service grow from delivering food to about 30 families to serving 85 families in its store where shoppers choose the groceries they need. A staff of about 30 volunteers helps her with this mission.

Moran, a lifelong resident of Avon, was honored posthumously. Before his death last year he had spent years as a volunteer parent at St. Agnes School and had been a long-time volunteer for youth sports. A highly respected member of the community, he was employed by the Village of Avon for 40 years.

An Avon Lions Club member for 42 years, he held leadership positions including two terms as president, three terms as secretary and two as treasurer.

House, an Avon teacher for 30 years, now serves in retirement as a member and past director of the Avon Preservation and Historical Society along with being an active member of the Avon Garden Club. Every spring she helps plant flowers and shrubs in the Circle Park and then continues to care for them throughout the summer.

She is also active in the Avon United Methodist Church, being part of the choir and the bell choir and contributing extensively in church fundraising activities that allow the church to better serve the community. Ginny and her husband Bob also pick and donate bushels of apples each year for church dinners and help deliver holiday food baskets and Meals on Wheels.

Building Award winners Jim and Jennifer Krause were honored for their commitment to renovating the gracious Avon Inn and returning it as a viable part of the village.

Built about 1840, the Avon Inn was extensively damaged by a fire in 1979. It was restored and changed ownership until being bought by the Krause's, then underwent extensive renovations before it reopened last New Year's Eve.

Also receiving a Building Award were Jody and Christine Wolfanger, whose Evening Star Coffee Roasters grew from a business in their garage to a new dedicated building. Their business began in 2008 and, according to its web site, moved in 2017 to Tec Drive where they built "one of the most modern, clean and organized business designs in all of New York State."

### Rambling On Rotary—May

Each of our meetings has Rotary's Four-Way Test posted on a banner. "Is it the TRUTH? Is it FAIR to all concerned? Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS? Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?" During the induction of new members, I also refer

to Rotary's Code of Conduct. "AS A ROTARIAN, I will: (1) Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life, (2) Deal fairly with others and treat them ... with respect." [The first 2 of the 4 principles.] These statements create a commitment on our part as to how to act and behave in all of our daily activities.

When I received the May 2019 edition of The Rotarian that had a cover with "The Four-Way Test in a Post-Truth Era" I was intrigued. In Joseph Epstein's article he references politicians, news persons, and corporate leaders who have been less than truthful. Then he states, "Everywhere you turn, the first of the Four Ways – "Is it the truth?" – would seem more and more in danger of going by the boards." That hit me hard.

What is truth? Is it an opinion? Is it something factual? What makes something factual? Mr. Epstein continues that "Truth and fairness are most elusive where passions are engaged... You're likely to build goodwill and better friendships, to be beneficial to all concerned only if ... you keep your eye on the goals of truth and fairness."

It is very disheartening when we are confronted by someone who is less than honest with us. When I have trusted someone and then find that trust betrayed, I feel betrayed. When I believe what someone has told me and then find out it is a lie, it makes me angry. This is a "posttruth era" and in many respects that in and of itself is disheartening. What has happened to our society and our world, and what can be done to change this? Where have ethics, morality, and honesty gone?

I believe as Rotarians we are persons of action. Our actions make a difference throughout our community and the world. I do not need to repeat to you the impact we, as Avon Rotarians, have had because of our commitment to various projects and activities. So how do we change the dialogue regarding a "post-truth era"? I believe we change that by living in a "truth era" every day. And we do that by constantly keeping our Rotary Four-Way Test and Code of Conduct at the forefront of what we say, think, and do.

When we act with integrity and high ethical standards, when we treat others with respect, our actions will be beneficial to all concerned and will build goodwill and better friendships. The way to return to a "truth era" is by being truthful and fair in our daily activities. The acts of honesty and fairness demonstrated as we devote ourselves to serving others will come back as good will to each of us. As persons of action, when we act and behave as in a truth-era, we can change the world one person, one community at a time. Our Four-Way Test is the map and we need to follow it. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.
