We are entering the last month of our Rotary year and on June 25 we will have the smooth transition of leadership from Heather to Dom. I am always impressed with the preparation plan that Rotary and our club have developed that allows for the smooth

transition of leadership. A member is elected to serve as a club director with the understanding that she or he will follow a succession path to Senior Director to President-Elect to President and then to Immediate Past-President. Serving as a director is a 5-year volunteer commitment, other than the Member-at-Large position.

Our District 7120 helps in that leadership preparation by offering, among other things, the District Training Assembly, Global Grant workshops and, most importantly, the President-Elect seminars held throughout the final year of preparation. Our past president Tom Vonglis attended training this year as well as he moves into a new leadership role in District 7120 as he will begin to serve as a Assistant Governor (AG) on July 1. Again the training track is essential for smooth transitions and for the local, regional, and world leadership of Rotary to continue to serve others in the best ways possible.
