

On October 28 EASTERN CITIES DINNER





Hear from women- in Africa- who were given the help to start their own businesses- to gain independence, self esteem, and provide for their families without relying on a handout.



- Remember Arch Klumph began the Rotary Foundation with a simple premise that still holds true today- "Do Good in the World"
- By giving to the Rotary Foundation- you have the opportunity to request funds from that Foundation for your <u>LOCAL</u> community. As we embark on the Future Vision plan- those opportunities may actually increase. In District 7120- more than \$10,000 a year has come back to local clubs for community projects ranging from books for libraries- to community pavilions. Your gift to the Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund opens the door for our district to do more- regionally,-and- around the world.

Quite simply, we must remember we are not just members of "Rotary". We are all members of "Rotary **International**". We gain strength from numbers. When we became Rotarians we accepted responsibility to help each other- around the world. Our inspired gifts to the Rotary Foundation fund the very programs that help us **do** that! 
