So far this Rotary year we have had three Rotary Induction ceremonies and there is one more to be announced, whenever we can get Paul Phillips in town long enough to do so. We have had six (6) new members join our club: Chris Ferra, Rhonda Hirschler, Tom Honan,

Nick Lovullo, Karen Vanderbilt and TJ Vonglis. As I reflect on our new members, I recall President Heather's comments on December 18 from the January 2019 issue of the Rotarian as she read from the article "Survive the unimaginable". "There are no extraordinary human beings. There are only common, ordinary human beings, like you and me, who are able to do extraordinary things if we connect to love and to passion, if we do things that are more important than ourselves."

Elsewhere in the same issue, RI President Rassin commented, "Rotary emphasizes the dignity of every vocation and the worth of every calling. Remember that the four founding members included no doctors or peacemakers – just an attorney, a mining engineer, a coal dealer, and a printer. From the beginning, the diversity of those vocations gave Rotary a special strength."

The diversity of vocations within our club is very interesting. We have educators, psychologists, counselors, occupational therapists, attorneys, food servers and cooks, electricians, bankers, those in construction, apparel designers, funeral directors (folks are just dying to meet them), boat captain, physicians, land surveyors, financial planners, farmers, clergy, journalists, business consultants, caregivers, etc.

My comments during the induction ceremony, which you may know for memory by now, reminds us all of the com-



munity of Rotary of which we are a part. Over 1.2 million members, over 35,000 clubs in almost every country of the world. Another article in the Rotarian spoke of a Rotarian visiting Rotary clubs in 22 countries. The induction comments talk about being welcomed as a Rotarian all over the world; that we are all part of the world at large. Rotary is one family and visiting other clubs strengthens our family.

We definitely do not all always agree on everything; sometimes we may not agree on anything. But we are part of the same family. We are guite diverse in our vocations, our backgrounds, and our opinions; however we are connected by our commitment to Rotary's Four-Way Test and its Code of Conduct. It is because of our diversity that we can accomplish great things. None of us are extraordinary (Diane tells me that all the time). We are all ordinary human beings. But what makes each of us special is we have chosen to accomplish extraordinary things by being people of action TOGETHER. Together we accomplish so much more than each of us could do individually. Our strength is multiplied when we come together with the clear focus of serving others above ourselves. When we "connect to love and passion ... doing things that are more important than ourselves."
