## **President's Message**



As I was thinking about this month's newsletter and what area of inspiration to draw from as I put pen to paper, I was hit with the news of the untimely passing of two members of our Rotary fami-

ly, Steve Robertson of Lima Rotary and Liz Green from Avon Central School. So, it is with a heavy heart that I write to you this month.

I had the pleasure of meeting Steve, who was Lima Rotary's Past President, a few weeks ago in Inlet as he is an avid Snowmobiler. Laurie was wearing her Rotary pull-over while at one of our stops and Steve immediately connected with that. We had a great weekend with our new friend whom we quickly realized was a kind, genuine, gentle soul. We only spent about 8 hours with Steve over that weekend, but the connection we made with him was instant. I have learned that he had this type of impact on everyone that was lucky enough to meet him – he was just that kind of person.

As I was trying to digest the news of Steve's passing, I learned last night about Liz Green's passing. This one is especially tough to us all as she impacted the lives of so many in our community. Liz had been working closely with a few of us on this year's Grant and recurring project for Stone's Community Resources. Her kindness, love for children and passion to help those in need was evident in every interaction with her. She had an energy about her that was contagious and inspiring, which always made me reflect on how I can be better. Every time I talked with Liz,

she would share her immense gratitude for what Rotary was doing for the kids in Avon not recognizing that she was the reason we are able to do what we're doing. She was so selfless and did not look for praise or recognition, but rather was driven by the desire to help those that couldn't always help themselves. It's this kind of attitude that made her a Rotarian in my mind as she lived our motto day in and day out.

There is no way to make sense of these tragedies and losing people so young with so much left to give. The only thing we can do is live our lives in a way that honors their legacy and continues to keep their memory alive. These events also remind us that life is short and we need to live each day to its fullest, which gave me a different perspective on this month's Rotary theme of 'Peace and Conflict Resolution'. Normally, we view this on the global scale in terms of war or other large conflicts, but we can look at this topic through the lens of our own lives. Are we doing everything we can to create peace and unity in our communities, families, groups that we belong to, etc.? What else can we do to live a life that makes other people want to be better the way that Liz and Steve did? It doesn't take a lot to make someone's day - it could just be a warm smile, giving a compliment, or holding the door. You never know what people are going through in a given day, so if we all look for an opportunity to make someone's day a little bit brighter, it will have an endless ripple effect.

We did our in-meeting service project and packed bags of meals for Stone's Community Resource Closet at Avon Central School. Many hands help make this worth-while project quick and efficient.





#### GPEI joint statement of Chairs:

As the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) enters its 31st year, the Chairs of the effort's main global advisory bodies issue an extraordinary joint statement, urging all involved in the effort to excel in their roles.

"To succeed by 2023"- extraordinary joint statement to Polio Eradicators

In an extraordinary joint statement by the Chairs of the main independent, advisory and oversight committees of the GPEI, the Chairs urge everyone involved in polio eradication to ensure polio will finally be assigned to the history books by 2023. The authors are the chairs of the Strategic Advisory Group of Experts on immunization (SAGE), the Independent Monitoring Board, the Emergency Committee of the International Health Regulations (IHR) Regarding International Spread of Poliovirus and the Global Commission for the Certification of the Eradication of Poliomyelitis (GCC).

The Endgame Plan through 2018 has brought the world to the brink of being polio-free. A new Strategic Plan 2019-2023 aims to build on the lessons learned since 2013.

The joint statement urges everyone involved in the effort to find ways to excel in their roles. If this happens, the statement continues, success will follow. But otherwise, come 2023, the world will find itself exactly where it is today: tantalizingly close. But in an eradication effort, tantalizingly close is not good enough.

The statement therefore issues an impassioned plea to everyone to dedicate themselves to one clear objective: to reach that very last child with polio vaccine. By excelling in our roles. It means stepping up the level of performance even further. It means using the proven tools of eradication and building blocks that have been established in parts of the world that have been free of polio for years.

The Chairs remind us that as a global community, we have stood where we stand today once before, with smallpox. And we achieved the eradication of smallpox. And the world is a much better place without smallpox.

So, let us make the world again a better place. Together. Let us eradicate polio.
