Rambling On Rotary—July

In my April 2019 Ramblings, I referenced the April issue of the Rotarian and the many articles relating to climate change. When I received the July 2019 issue of the Rotarian, I was pleased to see the articles on incoming RI President Mark Maloney; it provided the

opportunity to get to know him much better.

However, I was dismayed to read the many comments in the "inbox" chastising Rotary for commenting on and wanting to take action on the issue of climate change. Writers state that climate change is a "deeply political" issue. Because Rotary presented a position on the topic of climate change and stated that Rotary needs to become active regarding the issue, one writer stated his desire to "end immediately my subscription to what has become a political rag", referring to the Rotarian. Another writer commented that "climate change is nothing more than a narrative to create a world government that derives citizens of their personal freedoms." Another was "dismayed that Rotarians would suc-

cumb to the lure of alarmists." "Should we examine the motives of those that profit from pushing the climate change agenda or should we devote our daily lives to helping those around us?"

As I said I was dismayed to read these comments. It is a fact our earth's climate is changing and that humans are con-

tributing negatively to it. Humans have been polluting the earth's waters since the beginning of time with our sewage and other waste materials. Since the industrial revolution, humans have been polluting the air we breathe and our environment. And science has proven that humans use of carbon fuels are negatively impacting our atmosphere and have resulted in weather pattern changes. This is fact, it is not politics. How to address these facts have become political, but the earth's climate is changing, and humans are part of the reason.

Yes, our earth went through an ice age and then our globe warmed ... and humans had nothing to do with that change. Some might suggest that the climate changes we are seeing, and forecasting are just the earth going through another cycle ... and maybe it is. But it is irresponsible to contribute to that change by polluting our water and air ... which does not benefit the health and welfare of any human.

What if Rotarians considered polio (or any disease) as nature's way of culling out the weak within the human race? Who were we to intervene and change the natural

course of events? Darwin's Theory of Evolution stated that is the course of nature. Stuff happens, so what? Yet Rotary has been striving to eradicate this "culler" since 1979 ... 40 years!! Was that decision to go after polio a political decision? Was it a decision to line the pockets of pharmaceutical firms that might profit from making and distributing the vaccine? I don't believe so. Possibly we should be asking who profits by not addressing climate change rather than the other way around.

When some state that Rotarians addressing climate change does not comply with the Four-Way Test, I must disagree. Possible test #2, "Is it FAIR to all concerned" might not work as carbon-producing, pollutionproducing businesses might not think it is fair that they need to change their practices. But climate change is the TRUTH (test#1) ... it is happening. "Will it build GOOD-WILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?" (test#3) ... maybe not for some for the same reason as test #2 but, when the world has clean water to drink and clean air to breathe, we have seen how Rotarians have built goodwill and bet-

> ter friendships around the world. Acting on climate change issues and acting to change our behaviors that negatively impact our environment can reverse some of the severe climate issues we have seen. I used to smoke cigarettes. Science proved that smoking was harmful to us, although I'm certain some tobacco farmers still dis-

pute the facts. When I quit smoking (a 2-pack-a-dayer) on July 17, 1977, my body started to heal itself. When we stop doing things that harm ourselves and our environment, it will be "BENEFICIAL to all concerned." (test #4). As I stated in my April Rambling article, "If we don't get climate change right, it doesn't matter what we [Rotarians] do in our six areas of focus." Nothing will matter for our children or their children. Because Rotarians chose to take a stand to find a cure for polio and immunize the world, more than 2.5 billion children have been spared that devastating disease. As incoming RI President Maloney stated, "Rotary allows us to connect ... across our differences." Let us come together to act on climate change. As Rotarians, we must act to address climate change "to help those around us" and around the world. It has nothing to do with politics; it is a fact ... just like polio was and still is. As we strive in this way, it will be the truth, it will be fair, it will build friendships and goodwill, and it will be beneficial to ALL. And this time, I really have rambled on long enough.
