A September for the Books!!!

The weather is still blessing us with some sunshine and our Club also had some great heartwarming events in September!

In September, we launched the Adult Migrant Literacy Program in collaboration with the Avon Free Library, the Avon School District and the Interact Club. The project has been enabled through a District 7120 Grant we received at the last District Conference. The project is very dear to my heart as it resonates with my personal experience as a migrant coming to America about 25 years ago.

How did our project get initiated? Last Spring, as we were working on selecting our project for the year 2019-2020, we surveyed our local partners to understand the literacy needs in our neighborhoods. Through that process, I had the opportunity to meet the team of teachers in the Avon School District who support the needs of our students from Migrant families. They run a program called ELL (English Language Learners). The program is specially designed to support the 20 or so children in the District who are from Migrant parents. Through our interactions with them, I could sense the passion and motivation they have for the success of their students and we promised ourselves to build a program which would make a difference for them.

As we started to explore through the reading of multiple studies around the education success of migrant students, we discovered that one of the key success factors of the students was the ability for parents to support the edu-

cation needs of their children at home. Many students have parents at home with very limited ability to help them with school work due to language barriers. Attempts have been made at offering programs for the parents, but 2 major barriers have existed for parents to improve their English skills: Child-care for the children during English class and transportation to and from the classes.

As Rotarians, we do not give up! We promised ourselves to design, fund and launch a Program which would eliminate these barriers and build on the existing strengths of our Community and our Club. The MLP (Migrant Literacy Program) was born! For one Semester, we will offer the opportunity for the parents of migrant children to take free English classes at the Avon Free Library while we are watching their children. We even offer transportation if needed.

The Program was launched on September 10<sup>th</sup>. The parents are very excited, and we cannot thank enough Rotarians and Interact members for their support of the Program. I had the opportunity to drive one of the parents home last week and I can tell you that that they are very appreciative of our Program. THANK YOU!!!

Our Exchange student, Julia, shared with us a nice presentation about Brazil. Julia is such a pleasure to have in our Club meetings. Her energy and passion invigorate me at every occasion I meet her.

October is promising to be an exciting month with great meeting presentations. We hope to see most of you at meetings enjoying our activities and social time.

## September 6:



# Eastern Cities Dinner



On Monday, September 23, Rochester Rotary hosted its 94th annual Eastern Cities Fellowship Dinner at the Joseph A. Floreano Riverside Convention Center. It was attended by hundreds of Rotarians, Rotaractors, Interactors, and youth exchange students from across our district and beyond. This was my first time attending the dinner and all I can say was I was thoroughly impressed and inspired by the work done not only in our district, but the work Rotary does at the International level as well.

The evening began with a cocktail hour which gave all who attended a chance to partake in a cornerstone Rotary tradition...fellowship. For newer Rotarians like myself, it was great to see all these vastly different people, yet with so many common goals, brought together for the evening.

After cocktail hour, we were brought into the Lilac Ballroom for the night's dinner and to hear speakers from our district give updates on the Foundation, our work with polio, and other districtwide projects. The highlight though was Keynote speaker Rotary International President Elect Holger Knaack. PE Knaack spoke about Rotary's commitment to service above self: promoting peace, fighting disease, and supporting education, among other endeavors. The main focus of his speech, however, was how Rotary needs to promote new ways to not only make Rotary grow, but also retain our members. Knaack wants to make Rotary more attractive to younger generations by having clubs that may not have a traditional format (like our own District's Roc City Rotary), different meeting times/places, and even multiple clubs in towns so those looking to become Rotarians have several opportunities to join. As a younger Rotarian (and father of a future Rotarian), it was inspiring to hear one in a leadership position at the International level recognize the fact that Rotary needs to adapt to not only grow, but to thrive and survive.

## Rambling On Rotary—October

One Day. One Focus: Ending Polio. October 24. On World Polio Day, thousands of Rotary clubs around the world will hold events and fundraisers to recognize Rotary's progress in the global fight to end polio.

"Poliomyelitis, or polio, is a paralyzing and potentially fatal disease that still threatens children in some parts of the world. Poliovirus invades the nervous system and can cause total paralysis in hours. It can strike people of any age but mainly affects children under five. Polio can be prevented by vaccines, but it is not curable. Unlike most diseases, polio can be eradicated." (from the RI World Polio Day Toolkit) Rotarians have been working to eradicate the world of polio for more than 30 years. "With our partners, we have reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent, from 350,000 cases in 125 countries in 1988 to just 33 cases caused by the wild virus in 2018. Only two countries continue to report cases of wild poliovirus: Afghanistan and Pakistan."

"Afghanistan and Pakistan face unique challenges, including political insecurity, highly mobile populations, difficult terrain, and, in some instances, logistical barriers. With sufficient resources, the commitment of national governments, and innovations that improve access to remote areas, we are optimistic that we can eliminate polio." However, given the ease of mobility around the world, any disease can be transmitted very easily to those who have not been vaccinated. It is essential to continue the vaccination efforts for all children every year to ensure that the world is safe from transmitting this disease and others.

World Polio Day is October 24. Rotary's Foundation Month is officially November. However, I would like you to commit yourself to making a donation to the Rotary Foundation on or before October 24 to the Polio Fund to help eradicate this disease. As DG Dave Hannan said to our club when he attended our meeting on August 27, working with the political structures in Afghanistan and Pakistan, Rotary is continuing to make progress towards our goal. Remember for the disease to be considered eradicated, there must be no new cases reported for three consecutive years so this task will be on-going for at least two more years. Also, remember when you make your Foundation donation to the Polio Plus fund, its value is tripled as every donation is doubled by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation; that is, your \$100 donation becomes \$300 contributed toward the eradication of polio. Our club's goal is to have every member become a Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member which would mean donating \$100 annually; however, it is more



important for EVERY club member to commit to donating some amount to the Rotary Foundation ... to have some skin in the game. Donations may be made on a monthly basis; a \$9/month donation would make every club member a Sustaining Member of the Rotary Foundation. Donations can be set up using your My Rotary account on the Rotary International webpage, or contact our club's Foundation Committee Chairperson Kirk Vanderbilt.

Service Above Self requires we get our hands and feet dirty by participating in various projects and fund raising activities. But our service also needs to support global activities which the Foundation is helping address around the world every day. Remember Rotary's World Polio Day on October 24. We are so close but the work requires all of us for support. Let's close this out this year. And once again, I have rambled on long enough.

## She Just Wants to Make a Difference

Avon Rotary's new exchange student, Julia Pinheiro Leandro, says she came here for that simple reason. But when she says she would

"really like to know new places and meet new people, and then know more, do things that I have never done," it's apparent she is not talking about something simple.

So because she always wanted to live in another country she "thought Rotary Exchange was perfect." The U.S. became her target "because I always wanted to have the American way of life, like go to the high school, because we have a lot of movies in Brazil that show this scenario. And I always dreamed about that. And because of the language—I would like to improve my English—and because it's a beautiful country, and here you can live well. It's a developed country."


She knows what she is talking about, having been in the U.S. before in surprisingly many places: New York City, Pennsylvania, Nevada, California, Florida, Arizona, Los Angeles, Las Vegas.

Clearly a well traveled 17-year-old, Julia comes from Guarulhos, a city of more than one million near São Paulo in southeastern Brazil. But "it's ugly," she says. "It's not beautiful at all. The houses are too close. And there wasn't a plan to do that so people just came in. And then it's like, ugly and big and a lot of people."

Comparing it to Avon she said, "the most different thing is like everything is so close. Like the school is right there. The stores are right here. You don't have to take a bus to go to a place where I need to go.

"It's like, 'Oh, let's go to lunch.' Then you go and you meet everyone there. You'll see the Rotarians. You see your father, your mother, everyone there. And I was like, 'Oh my god, that's so little that everyone goes to the same place to have lunch.' And that's the most different thing. It's really beautiful here, and safe."

But then her thoughts took a darker turn. "You can use the phone to walk in the street" in Avon, she said. "I can't do that at all (at home because it) can be stolen. You need to always put your cell phone in your pocket. And always pay attention of the person who is next to you to see if he does something that can



be suspicious. And then you have to take care. So it's always be prepared for the worst. I have never seen anybody not worried walking on the street.

"So here you can have a little relax. You can use the phone, you can show the phone. Nobody's going to take it from you. So it's quite a difference. It's good. I like that.

As bleak as the picture she paints of her home town, she already misses some of her life there, such as the food, Latin music and especially her friends. In trying to make friends in Avon, "I see that it's different (from) doing friends in Brazil. So I'm trying to understand how that works. But yeah, I (made) some friends in volleyball. They are great. And I have my next host family with a kid with my age."

It's harder here, she says, because teens are "totally different. If you want to make friends in Brazil, you just talk two minutes with someone and you're friends. Here you take a while to get to know. It's not as fast and it's not that easy. You need to go slow. And Brazil, you just do it. Two minutes conversation, you are best friends. So that's the difference. It's not good or bad. It's just different."

She is looking forward to attending school here, and not just because it's a great place to make friends. "They have some different things that I don't have (in Guarulhos), like French classes that I'm taking. And I'm excited because I really want to try that. Computer graphics. There is something about the yearbook so I'm doing a class for that. Psychology, I have never had that before. Gym, it's quite different. So it's like the new experience. I don't have anything here that I had there. So I'm looking for new things.

Already Julia is involved in volleyball at Avon High, something she started in Brazil, but "just for fun," she said, "because we don't have competitive sports there. If you want to play in a competitive you need to go out of school and find other places who give classes for this."

But what she really likes is not sports but theater and acting. "I saw that in here in the school, you can do whatever you want. Because they take seriously, you can be a sport player, or you can be an actress or an actor," she said. "They take this very seriously. We don't have that in Brazil. You just need to study and go to college and do something that is

going to pay well.

“So to be an actress in Brazil, it's hard. Because there's no expectations for that. You have to know a lot of people and do whatever you had to do to be there and not like just because you are good.”

Among the things Julia said she might like to try here has its origin in Guarulhos, where “Interact and Rotary together every year, we collect food and then we go to a school. And in this school, we take three or four professionals to do a presentation about business or Rotary, or drugs, suicide. And then poor people in Brazil, there's a lot who come to this public school for three presentations. We note when you see three presentations, and then you can get the food.”

Because of the coming year, Julia said she expects to become more independent and active. “I think I just stay there and do nothing and people do for me back home,” she said. “And here I need to do what I want. So I need to get up and do what I need to do to have what I want. And there I don't need to do that. So definitely be more active. Exchange helps you in a lot of things, but I think I'm going to come back a completely different person than I am now.”

But in the meantime while living in Avon and working toward that point, she says, “I'm just here to help Rotary and everything. So I'm here to make the difference. Yeah.”
