Avon Rotary took a major hit to our fundraising abilities with the cancellation of both our Blue Jean Ball and Corn Festival this year. Our club gives tens of thousands of dollars each year to local, regional, and international causes with the monies raised from these events. With no end to the COVID 19 pandemic in site, how were we going to fill this fundraising gap so we could still support all the causes we do annually?

Never challenge a group of Rotarians. After throwing several ideas around, we came up with the idea of a road rally scavenger hunt to be held on the traditional date of our annual Corn Festival...The Cornantine Classic! A socially distant, family friendly, community event that took participants to wonderful local businesses and beautiful locations around Livingston County. Teams were asked to solve clues to take them from location to location while completing picture challenges and getting stamps from local businesses to accumulate points. We had an incredible 121 participants (38 cars) from all over Western NY and fun was had by all!

In addition to that road rally we teamed with the Avon Lions Club to serve their famous chicken BBQ with Avon Rotary Club's famous Corn Festival sides, sold tee shirts, held basket raffles and a 50/50 raffle. When all was over, we were able to raise \$10,395.14! Not bad for only 5 weeks of planning!

The event was such a success we're looking to add it to our fundraising schedule annually. So start getting your teams ready, and we'll see you in October 2021!


political conventions, debates, commercials all leading to the November elections. So thinking about our club and Rotary International gives me a sigh and a smile.


