


October Highlights

October 13: We were joined by Webster Rotary Member and Shelter Box Ambassador, Rich Comins. Avon Rotary is proud to annually support Shelter Box's mission. Shelter Box is a global organization made up of people who believe in shelter as a human right and that shelter

from the chaos of disaster and conflict is vital. When people are plunged into crisis, normality is suspended. But good, quality shelter can cut through the chaos. This is why they provide tools that enable people to rebuild homes and transform their lives.



October 27: We were joined by Joanna Collins, a local foster parent and foster care advocate for Glove House and Jane's Grace Foster Care Closet. Glove House is an

organization that provides foster parents with training and support, finds homes for foster children, and provides resources to foster kids to help with their transition to foster care. Jane's Grace is a foster care closet started by Joanna. Many times when a child is placed into foster care it can be immediate and traumatic and they must leave many personal items behind. Jane's Grace finds out the needs of these kids and parents and collects clothing, bedding, books, toys,






