Rambling On Rotary—December

"In order to live in the kind of society you want, you have to help build it." Inspiring words from David Jones, shared by his sister Rotary International President-Elect Designee Jennifer Jones.

Several of our club members had the opportunity to join more than 200 participants in a 4-District zoom meeting on Tuesday, November 24, 2020 to listen to Jennifer and then have a break-out with close to 60 other Rotarians from across District 7120. The evening generated approximately \$4,350 just from our district for the Rotary Foundation. Ms. Jones focused on the work of the Foundation, where she has served as a Trustee of the Foundation for a number of years, and on RI's focus on Diversity Equity and Inclusion (DEI) where we need to welcome diverse perspectives. She also implored clubs to focus on Rotary's public image; "We've done things in the shadows for too long." What echoed for me in those words was how they are a goal of our club president Julie wanting to make Rotary more visible in our community.

The Foundation is an important part of how Rotary does good in the world. Rochester Rotarian Don Alhart answered the question asked by many of, "Why should I give to the Foundation which funds projects around the world when there are needs at home?" His reminder is that one-third of our donations are returned to our District and thus to our communities through district grants. Last year, past-president Dom wrote a district grant for funds to provide literacy education for migrant parents in our community. This year president Julie wrote a district grant for funds to purchase new bleachers for the Little League fields at the Downs. Our donations to the Foundation not only serve needs around the world, they come back to help us serve needs within our own community.

The December issue of the Rotary Magazine had a great article, "Good, and Good For You", which connects with David Jones quote, as well. "When we do good, it doesn't only benefit other people. It helps us, too. Studies show that helping others boosts oxytocin, serotonin, and dopamine, neurotransmitters that make us feel satisfied." We just inducted three new members into our club and when asked, "Why did you want to join Rotary?" each of them (just like most of us) responded, to the effect, they wanted to give back to their community, to do good in our world, to serve others. And what is the net result of that? In essence, they wanted the good feelings that serving others brings. "In a 2016 study, researchers asked participants about scenarios in which they either gave or received support....MRI tests showed that only the instances of giving [emphasis added] correlated to reduced stress and enhanced activity in the brain's reward centers - which suggests that giving support ultimately brought greater mental benefits than receiving it." In other words, GIVING is good for our health. How often have we heard that giving a gift is better than getting a gift?

For me, this is what being a member of our club, being a Rotarian is all about. Rotarians all over the world are building the

kinds of societies we all want to live in. I've said before, when our club supports Rob and Jeanine's project of building schools in Nicaragua through Linking Hands For Learning gives the gift of education to others. In most of those villages, the schools become the community centers because all parents want better lives for their children and they know education is a key to that start. When I see the water projects that Rotary helps fund throughout the world, it is incredible. Where would we be without clean, safe water. Yet Rotary clubs along the southern shores of Lake Erie are also engaging in projects to clean the water there. Rotary is not just helping in third world countries; it is in our own back yards.

During the zoom meeting, PDG Dave Hannan reported that there have been 133 new cases of polio in the world this year, down from 176 last year. Those cases are in Pakistan and Afghanistan. But, as was reported earlier this year, the entire continent of Africa has now been declared polio-free. The good news is we are almost to the finish line but the better good news is the infrastructure that Rotary has built to get the polio vaccine around the world can also be used to help distribute the COVID vaccines once they are widely available. Rotary is serving the world. As Rotarians we are serving our neighbors wherever they might live and, in so doing, we are helping to build the kind of society, the kind of world, in which we want to live. And that giving helps improve our health, well-being, and happiness.

During this season of giving, I regularly see our hearts open with gifts, our homes open for food and warmth for others...and it makes me feel good. I love this time of year. One of my favorite Christmas songs that I like to play on my guitar is "The Secret of Christmas". The closing line is, "So may I suggest that the Secret of Christmas is not the things you do at Christmastime, but the Christmas things you do all year through." Regardless of your faith, I think we all understand that those "Christmas things" are the acts of giving, of service to others. And those selfless acts oftentimes become very selfish because we know that giving to others makes us feel better than getting from others. During this season of giving, I give thanks to be able to be a member of a great club and a phenomenal organization like Rotary. I give thanks for the wherewithal to give. I give thanks for each of you. I make a pledge to do my best to do "Christmas things the whole year through". And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.



Literacy Committee Update

Can you imagine what it is like learning to read and write nowadays? Some students have the benefit of going to school everyday, so maybe for them it is not so different then when we were in school. However, many elementary students are going two days a week while some are completely virtual learners. Teachers are being creative with their lessons, but there is reason to worry about the capability of younger students learning literacy skills in our "new normal." Therefore, our literacy goal for the year to provide reading opportunities for students whether they are in school or not, takes on unprecedented importance.

Greg and I both work in schools and have collected books from teachers over the past year. Greg's mother donated several books for adults including cooking, gardening, and crafting books. We put those books on the shelves at the laundromat in August.

The challenges faced by the Rochester City School District are well documented in our local media. Avon Rotary took action with the Rush-Henrietta and Brighton Rotary Clubs by donating funds to John James Audubon School #33 for their Principal's Book of the Month Club in September. The school's librarian uses the money to buy several copies of popular books so students have access to engaging literature. Students read the books and talk about what they enjoyed about the story. Each December, School #33 invites us in to show their appreciation for the donations. Not sure what that will look like this year, but we will let you know if there is going to be a presentation. It is usually very entertaining, with a skit, songs, pictures, gifts and refreshments.

Thanks to Dave Hannan, we just completed our third activity. Dave was so impressed with our club's ESL migrant literacy program last year that he donated money for our literacy program this year. The Children's Librarian at the Avon Free Library recommended popular books to buy for infants to

teens. We purchased these books and library staff will encourage parents and children to take the books home to keep.

We are always looking for new ways to improve literacy in our community. If you have ideas, let us know.
