- Kirk announced that Avon Rotary's Foundation drive raised almost \$18,000, with an average \$203 per capita.


## WELCOME TO A NEW ROTARY YEAR!





## **Introducing Our New 2020 Fundraiser**



In lieu of our traditional Corn Festival, Avon Rotary is planning to offer the area a new adventure: a combination fun road rally and fundraiser.

It's something we never have done and there is very little like it nearby. We think people, tired of the pandemic lockdown, will jump at the opportunity to try something new and different, especially if it's outdoors and safe for all.

The rally committee, headed by Julie Carney, is actually planning a dual event, combining a rally with a chicken BBQ. All

plans are tentative but here is what we have so far: The rally itself will start and end at the Avon Middle School with teams consisting of at least two people, a driver and a navigator. Entry fee is \$35 per person, \$10 for kids under 16. Each team will get a clue sheet directing them around roughly the northern half of Livingston County. Each team will make two stops in all the larger towns where they must visit one commercial site and one scenic or recreational site. There they must either buy or pick up an item and take a photo proving they stopped at the site. Along the way they can accumulate extra points by accomplishing prescribed feats, such as photographing a squirrel or picking a dandelion.

Although mileage and times will be recorded, this is not a race. Safety is critical and posted speed limits must be observed. Prizes will be awarded based on points, times and mileage plus a few other fun things such as oldest car or best




costumes. Also included will be basket raffles at the Avon Inn, a 50/50 drawing and swag bags with presold T-shirts, snacks, etc,.

The Lions are helping with the chicken BBQ, which will be open to all, but only 400 presold tickets will be available. Lions will cook the food at the park and transport it to the school grounds. Rotarians will cook the sides. Interact will help.

As you can see, an event like this requires considerable planning and resources. Normally a rally is months in the planning and puts squads of people to work. We are trying to have this ready by Aug. 8, the corn fest date, and your rally committee comprises fewer than a dozen people, none of whom has done this before, so we are trying to keep it simple. This is at least as complex as the corn fest and we will need your help. You might be contacted shortly to pitch in so please try to find a way to contribute. Or step up and volunteer. As of now the subgroups are as follows: Publicity/Social Media, T-Shirts, Chicken BBQ, Road Rally/Scavenger Hunt, Raffle Baskets, Swag Bag/Eventbrite, Avon Inn.

This can be a fun learning experience for all; let's make it a big success, raise a lot of money and do it even better next year. - Julie Carney


