Rambling On Rotary—May

Service Above Self. Just words and ideas? Not for Rotarians ... these are words of action, we are people of ACTION! We are each part of 1.4 million members and 46,000 clubs in more than 220 countries. When Rotarians decide to work together on common goals and projects, imagine what we can accomplish together. Polio

has been almost eradicated from the world thanks to the efforts of Rotary since it started on this project in the Philippines in 1979. Can the health network Rotary has created be used to serve to vaccinate persons against COVID, which has killed more than 6.2 million people worldwide? Putting that number into perspective, 6.2 million deaths is more than the entire population of Denmark or Finland or Norway. More locally, 6.2 million deaths is more than the entire populations of the States of Connecticut, New Hampshire and Maine COMBINED. Imagine the people in those States no longer existing because of a virus; imagine those countries being wiped from the earth due to COVID. Because of the efforts of Rotarians, nearly 3 billion children have been saved from the scourge of polio. Rotary is Action.

We cannot ignore the humanitarian crisis created in Ukraine due to the invasion of its neighbor Russia. Since February 24, according to estimates by the United Nations, more than 13,000 persons have been killed. What is Rotary doing to assist in this crisis? According to information on the RI website, on April 5, 2022, Rotary announced that it has raised more than \$7 million to support locally-led relief efforts underway by Rotary clubs in Ukraine and neighboring countries. "The need for immediate humanitarian aid is increasing with each passing day," said John Hewko, CEO of Rotary International, who is of Ukrainian descent and is a charter member of the Rotary Club of Kyiv. "Rotary clubs in Europe and around the world, including our 1,100 members in Ukraine, have stepped up their relief work, with some on the ground helping those displaced by the war." Funds raised by the Rotary Foundation – Rotary's charity arm, go directly to those in need through local Rotary clubs in Ukraine and other countries where substantial aid is needed for refugees. Rotary clubs are also coordinating with partners to explore effective solutions to increased humanitarian needs.

Rotary's disaster response partner ShelterBox is collaborating with Rotary members in Eastern Europe to provide essential supplies and access to temporary housing for those who have left Ukraine, along with medical and shelter supplies for communities in Ukraine. Items include mattresses for people living in schools and sports centers, shelter kits with tools and rope, hygiene kits, winter jackets, solar lights, and water carriers to help people survive as they are forced to live in damaged buildings.

"It's amazing what one Rotarian talking to another Rotarian can accomplish," says Marga Hewko, president of the Rotary Club of Chicago and the spouse of Rotary International General Secretary and CEO John Hewko. The Hewkos lived in Ukraine for five years during the 1990s.

Supplies are streaming into a warehouse operated by the Ukrainian Medical Association of North America (UMANA) near O'Hare International Airport in Chicago. Rotary clubs in the States of Nebraska and Iowa are collecting supplies to fill several large cargo trucks that will drive hundreds of miles to the warehouse in Chicago. Two cargo planes packed with tourniquets, blood-clotting gauze, blood pressure equipment, and other items have already been flown from the city of Chicago in the United States to Europe, where members help unload the supplies and get them to Ukraine. "In the middle of the war, when some of the targets of the Russian army are hospitals, the fact that we have volunteers in Ukraine driving supplies across their country — if that is not Service Above Self, I don't know what is," Marga Hewko says.

"It is Rotary doing what Rotary does best," says Pat Merryweather-Arges, a Rotary International directorelect and member of the Rotary Club of Naperville, Illinois, USA. "It networks, pulls people together, and gets the job done."

As Avon Rotarians, there is much we can do internationally to get the job done through our donations to the RI Foundation; there is much we can do locally to get the job done through our hands-on efforts. President Tom's District Grant project will provide educational opportunities for Avon students and fresh produce for the "back-pack" children. When our members pull together, this project will be completed on May 14. Every one of us joined Rotary to give back to our community and to serve others. Our membership expands throughout the world. Rotary has seven areas of focus for its service. I encourage each of us to visit the RI website frequently to better understand where we are serving and how we can serve better; the Learning Center on the RI website has many opportunities to grow. We are people of action. We serve and together we accomplish wonderful things. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.

District 7120 Conference Reflections



RECONNECT in OSWEGO District Conference April 29 – May 1 was just that, a chance to reconnect with fellow Rotarians from District 7120 after not having been able to do so since 2019. It was a great experience starting with the golf match on Friday, which Avon team of Tom, Laurie and Cat won with a 4 under score; Bruce and Jim came in at 1 over. It was a cold and windy day, but it was fun.

Friday evening had the Parade of Flags for the Youth Exchange Program, which is always impressive. Since there were no inbound students this year, the only flags presented were those of the countries for the upcoming outbound students. Our Jacob Davis (of Livonia) led the parade and was the first to receive his Youth Ex-

change blazer, as well. Our keynote speaker for the evening was Terri Hall on the topic of Women In Rotary. Ms. Hall joined us from Anchorage, Alaska. But as has been said in the past, Rotary is a reconnected network of people serving others that helps the world come together. Ms. Hall became a Rotarian in 1989 when she joined the Canandaigua Club and then served as the first female 7120 District Governor in 2003-2004.

Saturday offered opportunities for learning during two breakout session. Then there were opportunities to learn more about our host city where some attendees went on a bicycle tour, others toured the history of Fort Ontario while others participated in a Poker Run visiting various establishments within the city. Many attendees participated in 2 or 3 of these opportunities.





The Governor's Ball on Saturday evening included the

winner of the student District Oratorical Contest Thomas Yu. His speech, delivered totally without any notes, was a reflection on the meaning of the 4-way test. For me, the highlight of the conference, however, was the presence of the RI President's Representative Richard King,

Mr. King spoke briefly on Friday and again on Sunday morning; just ask any attendee about a bedroom trampoline for reasons of fitness and how PDG Tom Rogers tried to emulate Mr. King. Mr. King, joining us from the Rotary Club of Niles-Fremont, CA, is a past world president of RI. His experiences are vast as an attorney, a distinguished graduate of the University of California and having served as a captain in the US Military Intelligence. However, each time he spoke his humor and his message were inspiring. He mentioned a quote by John Adams, (I paraphrase) there are only two creatures of value on the face of the earth:

those with conviction and those with the commitment to follow through with that conviction. And Mr. King said, "As Rotarians we need to be both." He reminded us that Rotary Brings Peace through our service to others. He shared an experience with a man from Budapest who he encountered in Evanston, IL, RI's world home office. The man said he needed to visit the site where the idea of serving others was born. The man described how he became a Rotarian before WWII, but how his club needed to go "underground" for four years during the Nazi occupation. Then they were able to re-establish their club after the war ended, only to be forced to go underground again, this time for 40 years, as the Communists occupied his country until the falling of the Berlin Wall, after which they re-established their club. The man implied that his experiences made him something less than a real Rotarian. Based on his conviction and commitment to the ideals of Rotary, with tears in his voice as he recollected the experience, Mr. King assured the man he and his fellow members were the essence of Rotary. Mr. King stated that "nothing can compensate us if we fail in the business of humankind." He went on to say, we belong to an organization that gives more to us than we give to others because in giving to others, we always get more in return from the act of our service. "Conviction and commitment direct us to Serve Others to Change Lives. Following his comments, there many moist eyes.

Sunday's Celebration of Life Memorial Service is always a memorable portion of the District Conference for me. Since we have not been able to hold this event for three years, more than 80 Rotarians were honored, including our members who have passed: Mark Evans, Margo Harper, and Steve Vanderbilt.

During the closing session it was announced that the Rotary Auction raised \$4,720 for the Foundation, including one bottle of bourbon that garnered \$250. DGE Ralph Brandt announced that District Conference 2023 will be a one-day event held in Bloomfield Saturday, May 6.
