Rambling On Rotary—June

The May issue of the Rotary magazine had a feature story subtitled "How melodies can be medicine for memory loss." This story hit home to me on two accounts. I don't think it is a secret to any club member of my love for music. I love to sing; I love to play around on my guitar. I worked my way through college as a

disc jockey. When growing up, Ben and Madison used to hate it when I would play the oldies station in the car and continually ask them who the artist was for the song playing. They were particularly peeved when I would ask "Guess who the group is?" and after several minutes of guessing, I would tell them the group was the Guess Who. After awhile they used to answer the Beatles or the Beach Boys and that was likely true about 50% of the time. For me, music stirs memories of times past.

Clearly the second part of the article really hit home for me today. As many of you are aware, Diane has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease and her memory continues to decline with new occasions occurring every day. I think of fellow Rotarians Cathy Jo Murphy and Greg Deragon and the road they traveled through the disease with their spouses Mike and Chris. Unfortunately, memory decline is a common fact of life, but dementia and Alzheimer's accelerate the loss. Diane and I met doing community musical theater: "Guys and Dolls", "Fiddler on the Roof", "Godspell", to name a few. We used to sing duets in church and at weddings. Unfortunately, she doesn't remember many of those songs. But when I play my guitar and sing (at the other end of the house) she usually will smile and often hum along. Music tends to stimulate some memories and seems to make her happy.

When I was a High School Principal, I had to regularly fight to add or preserve arts programs in my school, especially during difficult budget years. I had been a math teacher but, in my experience, the arts completed the education for all children. In my case, it's music; if you want to win at Pictionary, you don't want me on your team because I can't draw my way out of a paper bag. Do you remember the music from your youth? Do you remember the song of your first dance with a significant other? As stated in the article, "The soundtracks of our lives resonate even more deeply because of the feelings that attach to certain music." So often the messages of the music are recycled years later. I think of "The Eve of Destruction" by Barry McGuire or Bob Dylan's "The Times They are A-Changin", among oth-

ers. The songs are still as relevant today as they were in the 60s.

At our meetings, many don't sing aloud because they don't feel they sing well. Cass Eliot, of the Mamas and Papas, had a recording "Make Your Own Kind Of Music". The lyrics are: "Nobody can tell ya there's only one song worth singing. They may try and sell ya 'cause it hangs them up to see someone like you. But you gotta make your own kind of music, sing your own special song, make your own kind of music even if nobody else sings along." It matters not how well any of us sings as long as we make our own music.

You are probably wondering what does this have to do with Rotary? For me, as Rotarians, we are making music every day in the ways in which we serve others. When I see the smiles on the faces of the children served by a new school in Nicaragua that our club has helped to build, that is music for me. When I know the lives that will be extended by DG Janet's Stove Project to which we have contributed, that makes me smile with the music I can hear them singing while they prepare meals over those stoves. When our club does an in-meeting service project creating a Party in a Bag for the Avon Food pantry, I can here a family singing Happy Birthday for a family member in our community. Music creates memories for me. And our service for others brings music to my ears.

I am hopeful every day that music can help stimulate Diane's memory to better times. If she doesn't remember what day it is or what her address is, that's okay. But my hope is the music will help her recall fond memories of her past with our kids growing up and will put a smile on her face. When we sing the R-O-T-A-R-Y song at our meetings, I hope for you that it stirs memories of past members singing along. Can you hear Mark singing "He profits most who serves the best" or "Where each one strives his best to give"? I pray that Rotary and our Rotary club may be music to stimulate memories and service in your lives. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.

Avon Elementary School Garden Project

Excited Avon Elementary School students were thrilled to take a stroll behind their school, to get a glimpse of the new instructional garden, which was recently installed there. All of the students will use this outdoor learning space as part of their educational experience, during their time there in Universal Pre-Kindergarten (UPK) through Fourth Grade. The garden came



to fruition through the hard work and perseverance of numerous Avon Rotarians, most notably Rotary President, Tom Vonglis, who led the charge with the planning, preparation, and construction. The garden will be used for innovative learning purposes, as well as for students to sample and enjoy the tasty food that it will produce. Well over thirty volunteers came out on a Saturday in mid-May to clear the area, construct the planting beds, and put up the fencing. In addition to Rotarians, school staff, students, Board of Education members, and the Superintendent of Schools joined in the effort. Peter Vonglis, owner of Vonglis Enterprises, volunteered his time and heavy equipment, which made the most difficult tasks with construction, quite a bit easier for the volunteers. His son Colin also assisted throughout the day. The school is also partnering with the Cornell Cooperative Extension to develop its use with students, and the school's STEAM Team will be developing curriculum this summer as



well. To kick-start the garden for this growing season, the entire student body was asked what they would like to see planted in the garden. They went to the polls last week to vote for the best candidates, their top choices, to fill the vacant seats. The winners were announced at a schoolwide assembly at the end of the week, which was met with enthusiastic cheers as each choice was revealed. The successful plants included strawberries, watermelon, carrots, cucumber, potatoes, peas, cherry tomatoes, and corn. The school Principal, stumped for corn, "because you can't go to school in Avon, and have a garden without corn growing in it." Especially if it's a garden paid for and built by Avon Rotarians!






M & M Foundation Drive

July 9—July 23, 2022


