October 21, 2021: We are heartbroken to inform you that one of our most committed and active members, Mark Evans, has passed away.

Mark grew up in Buffalo, but fully embraced the Avon community upon moving here. He was a teacher, librarian, avid political memorabilia collector and dealer, and Grover Cleveland and Jimmy Carter presidential historian. He considered Carter his personal hero and had several opportunities to meet with Jimmy and his wife Rosalyn on



his many pilgrimages to the Plains Georgia Peanut Festival nearly every September.

As an Avon Rotarian, Mark joined our club in 1994, served as president in the 99-00 year, and was our Rotarian of the Year in 2005. He served as a chairman or committee member on many club fundraisers, and was a long time member of both ours and the district's foundation committees. He was crucial in starting our Avon Honors program and most community members may know him as our yearly emcee for the Avon Corn Festival corn eating contest. Club members will remember him as the King of the Dad Joke which were often met with groans to which he would always jokingly re-



ply with his patented line, "It's a cruel club."

Most importantly, Mark was husband to Miss Pat for 32 years, father, grandfather, brother, son, and friend.

(She's the only car-owner I know who carries the name of her team on her license plate.) She did not permit her loss of sight and loss of mobility to hamper her socializing and participating, good-natured until the last meal we all shared. At that meal with Hallowe'en costumes increasing the enjoyment, she told me that "next year, I'll get the Corn Festus costume to wear".

Bruce Amey stated, "Regardless of her health situation, she did her best to attend Rotary meetings and events. She was there whenever she could be not just when it was convenient. She believed in Rotary and what it does to serve others."

Rambling On Rotary—November

It has been said of Rotarians that "Service is the rent I pay for the space I occupy on earth." As I have shared before, I knew of the value of service before I joined Rotary through the example set by my parents. Their service was mainly directed through our church but they also gave by driving for Meals on Wheels and

working with Habitat for Humanity of Rochester. President Tom's emails informing club members of the passing of Rotarian Mark Evans and Margo Harper truly humbled me as I thought of their years of service in our community and through our club. How can we honor the lives of service of other club Rotarian members who have passed away? Club members like Hoyt Mason, Tom Ippolito, Bert Croop, Charlie Pease, Ben Siragusa, Gladys Iler, Steve Vanderbilt, and others.

Service is why we join Rotary. We recently welcomed new members Mike Giso and Dan Oswald. Each of them commented that a reason to join Rotary was to give back to our community through service and to be a part of something bigger than themselves. As we know, there are 1.2 million Rotarians worldwide and the service we contribute to is definitely bigger than any one of us, which is why we join. RI President Mehta has challenged us with "Each one, Bring One". What better way to share the joy of serving others than to share it with new members joining Rotary? What better way to honor former Rotarians who have passed away than to invite others to become members?

As you know, November is Rotary Foundation Month. Our club has been focused on the Foundation for the past few months as we have honored community members with our COVID-revised Paul Harris Honors presentations to Norm Barrett, Louie Lee, and, in November, Mary Lou Marks. As Kirk reminds us whenever a Paul Harris Award is presented, it is bestowed "in appreciation of tangible and significant assistance given for the furtherance of better understanding and friendly relations among peoples of the world." The Rotary Foundation's mission is to "help Rotarians advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty." Because of donations to the Foundation, since it was founded more

than 100 years ago, the Rotary Foundation has spent more than \$4 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects. The Rotary Foundation transforms our gifts (yours and mine) into service projects that change lives both close to home and around the world.

October 24 we celebrated World Polio Day recognizing Rotary's commitment to eradicate polio from the planet. In the October Rotary Magazine, World Health Organization polio chief Aidan O'Leary commented, "The single most important relationship that the program (to eradicate polio) has is between a frontline vaccinator and the caregiver who answers the knock at the door." He continued, "The eradication program is not about achievements. It's about closing gaps: access gaps, surveillance gaps." Continuing our work as Rotarians requires each of us to make connections with others while inviting them to join us in our service towards others. And we truly are "this close".

As I started this Rambling, the rewards of serving others were shown to me before becoming a Rotarian but Rotary has given my service direction and purpose. The Rotary Foundation expands our service beyond our community to countries and peoples we will likely never meet. That truly is being a part of something much bigger than ourselves. That is a way to remember and honor Rotarians who have served before us. The Rotary Foundation needs each of us. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.


