#### Meeting Program: Winterdance Dogsled

**January 11:** We were joined via Zoom by Tanya McCready, of Winterdance Dogsled Tours in Haliburton, Canada. She and her husband Hank DeBruin left their careers in 1999 to turn their love of Siberian Huskies into a home-based business. Their first few years were a struggle – to find a banker willing to lend to them, to build a kennel, to build a house, and to raise four children. Now, on their 80 acres in Haliburton, Ontario, Canada, they have custom-built radiant floor heated kennel facilities for 150 dogs. They offer a variety of guided tour packages. Tanya is the business manager/promoter, while Hank is the lead guide, helped by their older children and other seasonal guides. Hank has also competed in two Iditarods & four Yukon Quests, typically using a team of 16 dogs over these long, gruelling, world-famous races. A huge amount of money, preparation, logistics, and training is needed to



participate in either of these races, where the weather, race conditions, and luck present a variety of challenges. After Hank's first unsuccessful Iditarod race attempt, which included frostbite and a disqualification, he and Tanya learned the lessons that sometimes one has to look after oneself before looking after one's team in order to achieve success and the only way one truly fails is if they give up. ### **Rambling On Rotary—February**

RI President Shekhar Mehta has challenged every club to plan at least one Rotary Day of Service in 2021-22 to "bring together volunteers from inside and outside Rotary and to celebrate and showcase the work of your club in your community." At our recent meeting when we put together gift bags for Avon Nurs-

ing Home residents, I was thrilled to be working with our local Girl Scouts/Brownie troop on this project; thank you new member Jaime Lovullo for the idea and coordinating this. But, it got me thinking, what else should we be doing to serve in our community? Is our club relevant to our community?

President Tom's District Grant project will be completed this Spring. That project will build a community garden on the school district property with the purpose of the garden being multi-purposed. One purpose is to teach students the value of composting food waste in gardening; another purpose will be growing fresh food stuff to be used for the student backpack program over weekends. This project is relevant meeting the needs of some students in our community. But how many community members will know of the project and how relevant will this be?

As a club we support many charity organizations and projects. Almost every year our club makes donations to ACS Drama Club, Avon Community Theater, Senior Bash, Avon Free Library, Honor Flight, Stones Closet, Chances and Changes, Avon Food Pantry, Avon Community Cares, Bivona Child Advocacy, Teresa House, House of Mercy, Avon Youth Baseball, Avon Lacrosse, Avon Boy Scouts Troop and Eagle Scout projects, Best Buddies, Ronald MacDonald House, and Focus on the Children. Additionally, our club provides a \$1,000 Linda Kime Scholarship to a graduating ACS student and the Board of Directors has just approved supporting two \$500 awards to provide financial assistance to two (2) students who enroll in an accredited career program or vocational program at a community college or trade school within New York State. Our club also supports the Linking Hands for Learning school-build project in Nicaragua and Shelter Box; this year we have plans to support the Cook Stove project we learned about during a club meeting presentation, along with supporting victims of the recent tornadoes in Kentucky. Our club serves our community and our world in many ways. But do these efforts make us relevant to our community? Is our community aware of how Avon Rotary serves?

Last year our club participated in the District 7120 Lake Ontario Watershed clean-up project and the tentative plan for this year is something similar on April 23, 2022. The Caledonia Rotary Club joined us in this endeavor last year. While we were out very publicly on this project, did our community see our service as relevant?

It seems to me that we all need to be more open and public about our service projects so that our community can't help but celebrate our Rotary service. Mike Ford has done a great job with our social media presence and many members re-post his postings which spreads the news of our club. If we were to plan and advertise an Avon Rotary Day of Service and engage non-Rotarians in the process, our community would better recognize our relevance. I challenge each of us to share everything Rotary in conversations with family and friends and in our business relationships. Invite friends and family to attend a meeting and our service projects. We all joined Rotary to serve; to give back to our community. Let's all share how good that feels to serve with others and encourage them to join us. Let's not be selfish about the joy serving others can be. Let us strive to be relevant in our community and our world as Rotarians. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.
