Rambling On Rotary— April

April is RI's Maternal and Child health month. From the March Rotary Magazine interview with incoming RI President Gordon McInally, he stated, "He would like his year ... to spotlight mental health." Avon Club President Steve's District grant project will need to be erected shortly at the UR Medicine

Noves Mental Health and Wellness Facility in East Avon, which has been dedicated in honor of Liz Griswold Greene. Liz was a social worker who worked with children and family in the school district and Livingston County. When the school district founded Stone's Closet, following the death of first grader Stone Steger in a tragic accident, Liz was instrumental in making the donations "work" for needy students and their families. The initial intent was to offer back packs with school supplies for students at the start of the school year. Liz helped the program grow to provide food and clothing for children throughout the school year. During Club Past-President Heather's year, her goal was to support the closet; that year, all proceeds from the Blue Jean Ball went to support Stone's Closet. On March 18, club member Joe Yantachka's company Partyman Catering provided a fun gathering fund-raiser where all the proceeds went to support Stone's Closet. It was also great to see former club member and Stone's father Chris Steger at the event. Mental health is a real issue in our community. Good health has always been a focus of mine; family and friend's health are a constant prayer for me. Given my health experiences at the end of 2022, when I was told the cost of my medications to assist with my blood infection episode, I "blew a gasket". My daughter Madison, who was with us at the time, said to me, "What would your reaction be if it was mom who needed that cost for medications?" As the saying goes, "From the mouths of babes", and I think my daughter is a babe, she put things into perspective for me. If I did not take care of myself then I would not be able to take care of my wife Diane, so I conceded and did what was necessary to afford the many weeks of medications. As I have shared in the past, the medications resolved the blood infection after 8 weeks and I am now "cleared" of the infection. We are blessed in this community to have excellent health facilities nearby. However, are all the services available to all residents? That is, can they afford them and get to them?

In the Rotary magazine interview RI President-elect went on to say, "My core value ... is caring. ... If the world was a more caring place, a kinder place, then it would be a much happier place and much more peaceful place. Peace is one of the issues that I particularly want to see us [Rotary] move forward." My recollections of our friends and club members Jerry Dougherty and Doc Hayes were that they were always demonstrating CARE for others. Mr. McInally went on to say, "It all comes down to the service. We are a membership organization and a service organization. It's not either/or. We need to be out there doing service, because not only will we enjoy that more, we will also see more people want to come and join us because they can see us." He asked, "How can we reignite members of Rotary who

appear to have lost their spark? I think the way to reignite the lost spark in certain members of Rotary is to make sure that the Rotary experience is as good as it can be and suits everybody." When we share at meetings and elsewhere, we need to be caring and concerned about each of our members' perspectives and backgrounds. We are a very diverse organization charged with accepting ALL members and the varied backgrounds make us all better. At times, our attempts at humor may be very off-setting to other members. Each year, I hear organization leaders talk about increasing membership where, from my perspective, I think we need to continue to inspire and "ignite" the members we have. Doing that will have the effect of more persons wanting to join Rotary.

If you have not had the chance to read the Rotary magazine when it arrives, I would encourage you to do so each month. The magazine offers much about what RI is doing around the world and reminds us where and what dues and donations support. Quoting PE McInally, "I'm a great believer that everything starts with hope." Me too! Where would you like to see our club go or do? Please speak up to President Steve or PE Mike or any other

Board member. As you speak up, don't forget to also listen. We have two ears and one mouth for a reason. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.
