2023-2024 Rotary International Theme Announced



Rotary International President-elect R. Gordon R. McInally called for members to capture the world's attention and lead the way toward possibilities far beyond our current expectations.

McInally, a member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry, West Lothian, Scotland, revealed the 2023-24 presidential theme, Create Hope in the World, during the Rotary International Assembly in Orlando, Florida, USA, on 9 January. He urged members to promote peace in troubled nations, help those affected by conflict, and maintain the momentum of initiatives begun by past leaders.

"The goal is to restore hope — to help the world heal from destructive conflicts and, in turn, to help us achieve lasting change for ourselves," McInally said at Rotary's annual training event for incoming district governors.

Rotarians Return to Nicaragua to Build School in El Carrizo

After almost five years away, a group of volunteers recently traveled to Central America to once again construct a school in an impoverished, rural community, in the surrounding mountains of El Sauce, Nicaragua. Largely due to the pandemic, but also the result of a period of civil unrest, the nonprofit organization Linking Hands for Learning, temporarily halted travel to the country. Earlier this month, among them were - Avon Rotarians Tom Vonglis, Heather and Jake Ayers, Rob and Jeanine Lupisella (HFM Rotary) and a group of nine other volunteers. Throughout the past year, funds had been raised totalling more than \$19,000 which allowed the construction to move forward. The Avon Rotary Club once again supported the project with a \$2,500 donation. In addition, numerous individuals, including Rotarians, from the Avon and the Honeoye Falls Mendon club generously donated to the cause as well.

In addition to the Rotarians, the volunteer group from the Rochester area included a large contingent of the Vonglis family. Tom's niece Jackie, daughter Ashley, sister Deb, and Paul Harris Fellow recipient, brother Peter were among the working crew. Rob and Jeanine's daughters, Elise and Caroline (This years' HF-L Rotary Interact President) along with area college students Jason Hofmann, Sawyer Tehan, and Paige Smith, were excited to join the crew as well. Each traveling volunteer was asked to raise at least \$300 towards construction costs and to personally pay for their own travel expenses, which included room and board, as host families in El Sauce take the group in during the trip. Volunteers typically raise far more for construction than the minimum required. When all expenses are accounted for, a trip typically costs each volunteer, with airfare included, approximately \$2,000.

The teams' collective enthusiasm resonated throughout the construction process even with an arduous hour and a half drive to El Carrizo. The first day was climactic as the truck arrived at the site, where a large number of community members were awaiting the teams' arrival. Men, women, and most importantly the young children who will be attending the new school clapped and waved as the team entered the area. After a few words together with the community, and a welcoming by their leader named Bernardo, the challenging task of digging the foundation began in earnest. The volunteers and community members quickly found themselves working hand-in-hand together in the hot sun. When it became apparent that a large tree root needed removal from the foundation path, it didn't take community members long to realize that in addition to the need for a pick ax, their favorite tool of choice - the machete, was also necessary. The tree root was eliminated and the workers were well on their way to completing the difficult task of digging the foundation.

Collaborating with the community volunteers is always special. The resourcefulness, grit and perseverance of the Nicaraguan people is admirable. Digging holes and trenches, bending rebar, cutting wire, sifting sand, moving blocks, shoveling and hauling the sand and stone are just a few of the many tasks needing completion. The level of involvement from the inhabitants of El Carrizo was exceptional, as each day numerous vounteers came to work alongside the visiting volunteers. Hauling water from a well, a good distance from the site, was one challenging task that the community fully embraced on their own, making sure there was always enough water to make concrete and mortar, as well as to moisten the block which had already been set. On numerous occasions, community members would bring oranges to the site, which resulted in a short break to consume the refreshing fruit.

Several days into the construction, due to the difficult road conditions, numerous volunteers would embark on a thirty-minute hike to and from the site, rather than take the bumpy ride in the back of the truck. As we walked along the narrow path we were often greeted by community members, who were heading to or from work in their fields. At times, children were just off the trail spying our approach. On one occasion, a woman graciously presented us with a sack of oranges, a gift from the community, and a token of appreciation for a hard days' work. Their level of gratitude for what we were doing, and how we were doing it, not for them, but with them, was greatly appreciated.

On the last day, as is the tradition, a celebration was held with the community, which included food, drink, and a pinata. One by one, the children took swings at a chance to crack the pinata and spill the candy for all. Bernardo thanked the visiting volunteers for coming to their community, and for the gift of a sturdy school, where students can learn in a safe environment. Linking Hands for Learning Co-Directors Rob and Jeanine Lupisella, with the assistance of interpreter Enrique Corrales, shared a few thoughts emphasizing the collaborative efforts from the people who were present, in addition to many others at home who are responsible for this school becoming a reality. Rob closed by saying, "Lastly, we thank God for bringing us to this community and for giving us the opportunity to work with you and get to know you. Thank you El Carrizo!"

I also believe our community is not familiar with the many ways we serve and the good that Rotary does. As a club, we need to promote our projects and what we are doing to serve our community and our world; we need to be more visible. As members of Rotary, we need to ask and determine the real needs of our community. Our guests from the Lima Club at our January 31 meeting talking about human trafficking and what things our two clubs could do together. The February Rotary magazine also

had an excellent article discussing signs of hope amid Lebanon's water crisis and the power of Rotary clubs working together to make change. Let's think of how we might enhance our commitment to Linking Hands for Learning projects in Nicaragua. Would some of those ideas make us better peacebuilders? I believe our support of the Nicaragua project; how linking our hands with other Rotarians and clubs can make an even larger impact and help us focus on being peacebuilders. Education builds peace within and among communities. I believe our Four-Way Test provides all the guidance we need. Of the things we think, say or do: IS IT THE TRUTH? IS IT FAIR TO ALL CONCERNED? WILL IT BUILD GOOD WILL AND BETTER FRIENDSHIPS? WILL IT BE BENFICIAL TO ALL CONCERNED? How can we as peacebuilders do anything less than this everyday? And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.

When I'm not doing any of that, I'm often spending time with friends or at my host family's new apartment building, helping to assemble and carry Ikea furniture into their new Airbnb rooms for the renters we are expecting early February. Overall, I would say this month has been everything I expected out of exchange and more, and the realization that I'm already half-way done with my exchange is a bit of a shock.
