Rambling On Rotary—July

July is Rotary's Installations Month. So here we are again at the start of a new Rotary year and some new faces on our Avon Club Board of Directors and in District 7120. We transition from "Serve To Change Lives", RI President Shekhar Mehta's presidential year theme, to "Imagine Rotary", 2022-23 RI President Jennifer Jones' theme. And locally we transition from President Tom's year into

President Steve's year.

One of Steve's goals for his 2022-23 year is to increase membership to at least a net of 65 members. I say "net" because, wherein we had new members join last year, we also lost some members due to inactivity or death. Past RI President Mehta challenged Rotarians to "Each One, Bring One" in order to grow our membership. As our club membership "ages up", i.e., gets older, it would also help us to try to encourage younger community members (under 40?) to join our ranks in Service Above Self. We must continue to purposely engage current members so they want to continue in Rotary, but we also need to invite others to join us.

Steve has stated he would like to have every club member lead the Pledge of Allegiance at a meeting this year, although with a maximum of 48 meetings in the year, I think he may have to have duets in some months. He would also like to have us recite the Rotary Four-Way test at each meeting, as well, to continually remind us of our Rotary focus. "Of the things we think, say, or do: Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it build goodwill and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned? With so much fake-news and false information barraging us every day, the Four-Way Test is even more important. Is it in the fore-front of the things we "think, say, or do"?

As a club, we have a very busy year ahead of us. Our Past-President Julie Carney is the District Governor-Elect. That is, she will be the 7120 District Governor in Rotary Year 2023-24. As DG for 2023-24, our club is responsible for planning and executing the District 7120 District Conference in May (or April) 2024. Julie is already engaging some club members in beginning preparations for the conference but as the subsequent year's District Conference theme is presented at the current year's DC, plans and preparations have to be well underway by that time. DG President Ralph Brandt has already announced his DC will be held May 6, 2023; which means, in support of Julie, our club has to have most of the planning for the 2024 District Conference done by that date. All club member hands will need to be on deck for this. Julie will be Avon Rotary's first District Governor and, as her club, it is our responsibility to help make her year a successful one.

President Steve's District Grant application was approved for our club project for this year. His grant project is to build a pergola and furnish some outdoor furniture for the new UR/Noyes Hospital Mental Health Facility in East Avon. The concrete pad is already in place; Steve is hopeful we can complete that project by October of this year, depending on delivery of some materials which cannot be ordered until after July 1st. Many club members were able to attend the facility's ribbon cutting/dedication ceremony on May 25th. The facility was dedicated to the memory of Liz Griswold Green, long-time Social Worker in the Avon Central School District and in Livingston County. She was our club's main contact for our fundraising activities for Stone's Community Resources, formerly known as Stone's Closet. This district grant project will continue our club's community-visible support for the children and adults in our community. Be listening for opportunities to assist with the construction/installation of the project.

As you know, one of my Rotary passions is the Rotary Foundation. I was very proud with our M&M Foundation drive during our May 31 meeting where club members donated more than \$2,000 to the Foundation Annual Fund in memory of club members Mark Evans and Margo Harper, who both died in October 2021. As John Germ RI Foundation Chair has stated, "Until hungry people are fed, families have access to clean water, and children everywhere are educated, we won't truly have peace in the world." Donations to the Annual Fund help address these needs and other Rotary Areas of Focus through global and district grants ... well done Avon Rotarians. But the mission of the Foundation is on-going and a club goal is to have every club member donate at least \$25 every year, hopefully more. Giving to the Foundation can be done on a monthly basis or annually through your MyRotary account. If you need assistance creating or accessing your MyRotary account, please let Kirk know and assistance will be provided. Let us continue to lead our world to peace by helping fund projects in our community and around the world through your Rotary Foundation donations.

As I started this article, July is Rotary's Installations Month; new beginnings for a new Rotary year. RI President Jennifer Jones stated, "There is nothing that can't be accomplished when Rotary members unite – and we are ready to get started." She continued, "Dream Big and Take Action. We all have dreams but acting on them is a choice." Will we as Rotarians choose to act? Are we ready to grow our Service Above Self and to invite others to join us? Those questions are rhetorical because I know for Avon Rotarians the answer is a resounding, "YES!" And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.
