A Brief Reflection of A Gutsy Woman & Civil Rights Activist: Claudette Colvin

Civil Rights in Montgomery, Alabama took a giant leap forward in 1955. Fifteen-year old Claudette Colvin refused to give up her bus seat to a white woman. Breaking the law of the time Colvin was arrested, handcuffed, and forcibly removed from the city bus. These series of events took place at least nine months before the famous Rosa Parks incident sparking the Montgomery bus boycott.

This gutsy young lady paid her bus fare and sat in the prescribed "colored only" section of the Montgomery City bus. The bus was crowded that day when Colvin was told to vacate her seat for a young white woman who just got on. Colvin, apparently exasperated with the unfair order refused to move. She shouted repeatedly that her constitutional rights had been violated. The bus was stopped until the police arrived, taking the fifteen-year old off to jail. Ms. Colvin said she was very lucky not to be brutalized on her way to jail that day.

Some sixty-six years later, Claudette petitioned the District Court to expunge her juvenile arrest record. Now in her 80's, Claudette received the news of her request being approved by a young black man who happened to be the sitting judge for her case. Claudette was vindicated at last.

Claudette recalled, "History kept me stuck in my seat. I felt the hand of Harriet Tubman pushing down on one shoulder and the hand of Sojourner Truth pushing down on the other."

Rambling On Rotary—February

On January 15th we recognized Martin Luther King Jr. Day; he was born on that date in 1929. February is Rotary's Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month. As I was reflecting on Dr. King and being a Rotarian, I realized I too Have a Dream. It is likely not as profound as Dr. King's "dream", but I dream of a world free of

polio in large part due to the work of Rotarians. Given the wars in Ukraine and Israel (and I am certain many other conflicts around the world), I dream of a world and our country that are at peace and able to resolve conflicts.


Within our country and the politics of today, we are a country divided. From Dr. King's speech of August 1963 on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial before thousands of citizens, he said, "In a sense we have come to our nation's capital to cash a check. When the architects of our republic wrote the magnificent words of the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence, they were signing a promissory note to which every American was to fall heir. This note was a promise that all men, yes, black men as well as white men, would be guaranteed the unalienable rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. ... Instead of honoring this sacred obligation, America has given the Negro people a bad check, a check which has come back marked "insufficient funds." But we refuse to believe that the bank of justice is bankrupt. We refuse to believe that there are insufficient funds in the great vaults of opportunity of this nation. So we have come to cash this check -- a check that will give us upon demand the riches of freedom and the security of justice." Whereas Dr. King was speaking mainly to African Americans, I suggest the same check is due to ALL citizens, regardless of their color, religion, or nationality and, as Rotarians, we should be actively striving for peace in all things and working for conflict prevention and resolu-

My dream is not only for an end to polio, but for water, sanitation and hygiene for all. From the RI's Areas of Focus Policy statement, "Rotary supports activities that encourage the management and protection of freshwater resources and provide universal and equitable access to safe drinking water, sanitation, and hygiene. The Rotary Foundation seeks to empower governments, institutions, and communities to manage their water, sanitation, and hygiene services through environmentally sound, measurable, and sustainable interventions." I have a dream. My dream includes participating with other Rotarians in "activities and training to improve maternal health and reduce mortality for children under five. Projects strengthen the health care system by improving access to and expanding medical services, providing medical equipment, and training health care personnel." I have a dream that there will be preventions and cures for all diseases ravaging peoples of the world.

Given my background in public education, I am sure it is no surprise to any of you, that I support Rotary's area of focus in basic education and literacy, "Rotary supports activities and training to improve education for all children, and literacy for children and adults" which is one reason why I applaud the work being done by Linking Hands For Learning, especially with their upcoming mission trips. I also applaud the work done every day in our own community by the teachers, administrators, and volunteer support personnel in our school systems. I have a dream when all children will be able learn and pursue their life's ambitions. Education is the real equalizer in opportunity within our society; I have a dream.

Dr. King continued, "From every mountainside, let freedom ring. And when this happens, when we allow freedom to ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual, "Free at last! free at last! thank God Almighty, we are free at last!" Let us strive to support this mission within our community, within our country, and within this world.

I have a dream! I encourage each of you to dream with me. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.


the four priorities of the Action Plan. Then they must ask themselves, Is there something we can do a little differently, or

January 29, 2024

In the early hours of Monday, January 29th, 16 Rotarians, Friends & Family members began their quest to the country of Nicaragua to begin another school build, making it the 13th (I think), in the remote communities near El Sauce, Nicaragua. Led by Rob & Jeanine Lupisella, these volunteers will spend 12 days living with local host families, emersed in the culture and traveling 45 minutes to and from the work site each day in the back of a large pick up truck. There will be a couple of days set aside to explore the village of El Sauce, visit the remote village of Ocotal high up in the mountains outside of El Sauce and unwind on the last day at a beautiful lagoon.

This year, the community of El Borbollon will be the site of the new school building. Last week, workers broke ground in anticipation of the Linking Hands for Learning group's arrival.

The experience is a mixture of very rewarding hard labor, and beautiful moments working side by side with local school children and families. This mission is a hand up, not a hand out. The communities are all in, helping our volunteers each day. It's hard to explain but the satisfaction at the end of the day is life changing.

I look forward to hearing all about this adventure when everyone returns home.
