Rambling On Rotary—September

September is Rotary's Basic Education and Literacy Month, which for me joins the beginning of our public school year in New York State. As you may recall, I was a public school educator in NYS for 41 years prior to my retirement. The beginning of the school

year was always exciting for me, the new beginning with new students arriving. As superintendent, watching the children at the Avon elementary school was especially exciting. Seeing the kids so happy to see their teachers from previous years and those same teachers ecstatic to see their former students. I really loved how the Avon PTA started the "boo-hoo breakfast" for parents, especially those of the new kindergartners. Basic Education and Literacy Month is very special for me.

Now, as a Rotarian, this Rotary month makes me think of Rob and Jeanine Lupisellla's Linking Hands For Learning projects in Nicaragua. I still recall sitting in Rob's office when he told me about their first school build project; he told me this was a one-time trip. In this country I feel we oftentimes take public education for granted, even though we get our school tax bills in September. I always felt privileged to be in Avon because of the teachers we have and all they do for the children of our community along with the education and lay leaders who provide and support and direction for the teachers and children. Linking Hands For Learning has become our club's reach into international projects. Per Tom Vonglis' celebration a few meetings ago, the LH team will be leaving to build another school,

and, in addition to our club's financial support, individual member's support is encouraged and appreciated. The Linking Hands For Learning projects "improve access to education by building schools, promoting literacy and fostering community relationships to allow children to learn and thrive." For me, that should be the definition of a Rotary Global Grant Project in this area of focus; however Rotary International does not allow global grant projects to support the construction of buildings.

Another outstanding project our club supports with our fundraising efforts is the Genesee Valley Rotary Camp (GVRC). Our club's visit on August 15 to the camp to meet with some of the campers and counselors was amazing. I feel that project not only brings us together as a club but serves our GLOW community tremendously. As Mike posted, these projects are some of the reasons we work so hard on our fundraising efforts like the Corn Fest and the upcoming Auction (thank you Nick and Tom); thank you to Cat for coordinating the fund raising efforts at Red Wings games. The funds we work together to raise go to support many worthwhile projects. I recall our district doing some fundraising to support the Rotary clubs in Kentucky after the significant flooding a few years ago. And the Rotary Foundation has worked

few years ago. And the Rotary Foundation has worked with the Rotary clubs in Ukraine to support the people of Ukraine because of the invasion of Russia into Ukraine. I have been asking what is our district doing to help the victims and to assist the Rotary club in Maui, I have not had any feedback regarding these requests. Service Above Self implies service where service is needed. I would like to encourage all club members to support the Rotary Foundation in any way that you are able and for our club to be making a connection with Rotary clubs in Hawaii to provide assistance to Maui. And, as usual, I have rambled on long enough.

Blaze Eppinger was born with sickle cell disease. As a child, Blaze would receive blood transfusions at least once a month.



Today at 28, he needs blood transfusions nine to ten time a year. Each time he requires trans-

fusions, he receives at least three units of blood. He has type A positive blood, but when his blood type is not available he receives types O.

"When blood is not available for me, I would have to stay in the hospital longer, basically fighting a sickle cell crisis." Blaze explained that a sickle cell crisis is very painful. The pain starts at one part of his body and migrates throughout his entire body. The hospital gives him pain medicine, but the crises often continue until he receives at least three units of blood.

"When I receive the blood donations that I need and my numbers go up, I feel like I'm back to myself," said Blaze. "I don't feel the pain. I don't feel drained. It's like putting gas in the car or batteries in your remote. I'm energized!"

Blaze is grateful for the American Red Cross and its volunteer blood donors.

"I feel like they give life more than they know," said Blaze. "Blood donors may not think about where the blood goes to at the time of their donations, but I consider them as silent heroes. It's just a task to them, an hour of their time, but that task helps save lives. If it wasn't for generous blood donors, I wouldn't be alive."

GVRC CELEBRATES 60 YEARS AT CAMP WITH A GROOVE

On August 13, Camp Sam Wood in Pike, NY, welcomed over 90 campers to its annual meeting of the Genesee Valley Rotary Camp (GVRC). Since 1963, GVRC has hosted campers with differing abilities from Livingston, Steuben, Wyoming, and Allegany County.



GVRC has met at Camp Sam Wood in every year since its inception, except 2020, making 2023 its 60th Anniversary. Fittingly, the theme chosen for this year's camp was "Sam Woodstock," with each tribe at the camp creating their own groovy name and banner. But even absent the 1960s theme, free love is in no short supply at GVRC, as their motto proclaims: "Here is Love."

Over 90 campers attended GVRC this year. They spent the week sleeping in tents, exploring nature, swimming, attending classes, tie-dying shirts, doing arts and crafts, performing skits, and making lifelong friends. GVRC hired 77 staff (nearly all volunteers) to provide a wholesome and enriching camp experience to all attendees despite their differing abilities. Many have been volunteering at GVRC for decades, and several former campers have returned to join the staff.

The camp would not be possible without the love and dedication of its staff, and to celebrate this, GVRC's affiliate clubs awarded four Paul Harris Fellows to camp staffers who have each been volunteering at the camp for over 30 years.

Melissa Fiorentino, Joe Martin, Meghan Woods Glieco and Clare van Durme received a Paul Harris Fellow for their service to GVRC.

Dr. Joan E. Flender, of Stony Brook Pediatrics, who was unable to attend, was also awarded a Paul Harris Fellow.

GVRC is a community service project of the Rotarians in Avon, Belmont, Caledonia-Mumford, Dansville, Friendship, Geneseo, Lima, Livonia, Mt. Morris, Nunda, Perry, Wayland and Wellsville. Our Avon Rotary Club contributes to this project by nominating two of its members to serve on the GVRC Board and through the donation of goods and services to the Camp.

This year marks the first time in several decades that our Club has nominated a new member to the GVRC Board. David Henehan, who served on the Board for multiple decades in various capacities, was replaced as Board member and Secretary by Collin T Hayes. Ernie Wiard was replaced as Board Treasurer by Betsy O'Mara, but he continues to serve as a Board Member.
